Tulane Using 'Ushers'

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Tulane football surprise of the South offers a new gridiron entertainment twist these days—seven ushers for each sleight-of-hand performance by quarterback Gene Newton.

From the French Quarter to Lake Pontchartrain it is freely said much of the startling success of Tulane's Green Wave, now the 15th ranked team in the nation, rests with its line.

The line is called the upset ushers because the linemen insist on opposing players sit down while Newton entertains with some of the fanciest ball-handling since pirate Jean Lafitte pitched musket balls at the English in 1815.

After last week's 10-3 victory over Mississippi, Coach Andy Pilney put it this way:

"Our ends won the ball game for us. They turned Mississippi plays in toward center and kept 'em from going wide on us."

He grinned. "Boy, this team has a lot of hustle. They had bigger backs than we did—Paige Cochran and the rest—they ought to have run over us. But, the boys just kept fighting back."

And Pilney is the first to give credit for the usher system to Line Coaches Jack Green and Mike Karmazin, who have taken a group of guys with hardly a press clipping among them, and turned them into barbed fence.

Pilney also praised Backfield Coaches Bob Whitman and John Mazur for turning Newton into a nonpareil. He's little. His hands are small. He isn't supposed to be a passer, but he's thrown five touchdowns passes this year.

But, Newton is the key to Tulane's success, if the linemen are the door through which the Green Wave moves. He calls the plays like a Phi Beta Kappa and he runs like a streak—86 yards for the game's only touchdown against Mississippi.

Running with Newton is fullback Ronnie Quillian, tied with Cochran as second best yard gainer in the Southeastern Conference despite an ankle injury that has kept him limping all season.

Cocky after two upset victories in a row, Tulane will not concede anything to next Saturday's opponent, third-ranked Georgia Tech. They figure their ushering ushers up front will keep their Atlanta adversaries sitting down throughout the show.

Plante Tops Goaltenders

MONTREAL (UP)—Stingy Jacques Plante, hockey's top goaltender last year, has picked up right where he left off and leads all National Hockey League backstoppers with an almost near perfect "fielding average" of .975, after the first two weeks of the new season.

According to figures compiled by United Press, the wiry Canadian goalie has handled 116 of 119 shots. Trailing Plante, just as he did at the end of the previous season, is Lorne (Gump) Worsley, New York's squat backstop, at .948.

And strangely, the standings at the end of the second week are identical to the final standings of the 1955-56 season. Glenn Hall, Detroit's rookie of the year, was still third with a .935 mark, followed by veteran Al Rollins of Chicago, .930; Terry Sawchuk of Boston, .910; and Toronto rookie Ed Chadwick, .894.

Ed Brown, Casares Top N.F.L. Backs

PHILADELPHIA (UP)—Rick Casares and Eddie Brown of the Chicago Bears led National Football League backs in running and passing, respectively, today with one third of the pro season behind them.

Casares moved into first place past Ollie Matson of the Chicago Cardinals by posting a total of 401 yards on 76 carries for a 5.3 average. Matson has gained 372 yards on 66 attempts for an average of 5.6 yards. In addition, Hugh McElhenny of San Francisco moved from fifth to third place with 345 yards.

Brown retained his position as the NFL's leading passer with 33 completions in 52 tries for a total of 569 yards and an average of 10.94. He also has tossed six touchdowns. Cardinals' quarterback Lamar McHan jumped from an also-ran a week ago to second place among the passers with a 9.48 average gain in yards. He completed 16 of 33 passes for 313 yards and four touchdowns. Bill Wade of the Los Angeles Rams dropped to third place with an average of 9.14 yards.

Bill Howton of the Green Bay Packers continued to set the pace in pass receiving, snaring 22 passes for 516 yards, an average of better than 23 yards per catch. The New York Giants' Frank Gifford ranked second with 20 catches for 239 yards.

Bobby Layne of the Detroit Lions moved into a slim first place margin in points scored with a total of 38. Casares and New York's Mel Triplett were tied for second with 36 points each.

Michigan, Minnesota Vie In Big Ten Meet

Coach Bennie Oosterbaan said Tuesday he expected a "plenty rough game" Saturday when Michigan and Minnesota meet in their traditional "Little Brown Jug" game.

The Wolverine coach commented as Big Ten teams buckled down to hard drills for the next games on their schedules.

Michigan concentrated on a new passing series, working for 90 minutes with halfbacks Jim Pace and Bob Placek and quarterbacks Jim Van Pelt and Jim Maddock handling the aerial chores.

Minnesota's Gophers underwent a lengthy defensive drill as Coach Murray Warmath sent his freshmen running Michigan plays against the varsity.

The Spartans of Michigan State practiced until dark Tuesday. They ran signal drills and pass defense plays in preparation for their game with Illinois.

Illinois was bolstered by the return of two injured players—Harry Jefferson at right halfback and Capt. Jim Minor at center.

Wisconsin went through a tough session with the first string operating defensively against reserves. End Jim Reinke—sidelined with a hand injury—worked out with the squad and may be ready to play against Ohio State Saturday.

The Iowa Hawkeyes held a long scrimmage behind closed doors, and were reported working on defenses for Purdue's varied offense. Tackle George Kress was about the only serious injury on the squad with an ailing knee.

Purdue sharpened its running game as the first string backfield worked together for the first time in 10 days. Jim Shea, who was impressive against Wisconsin, was considered a likely starter against Iowa Saturday.
