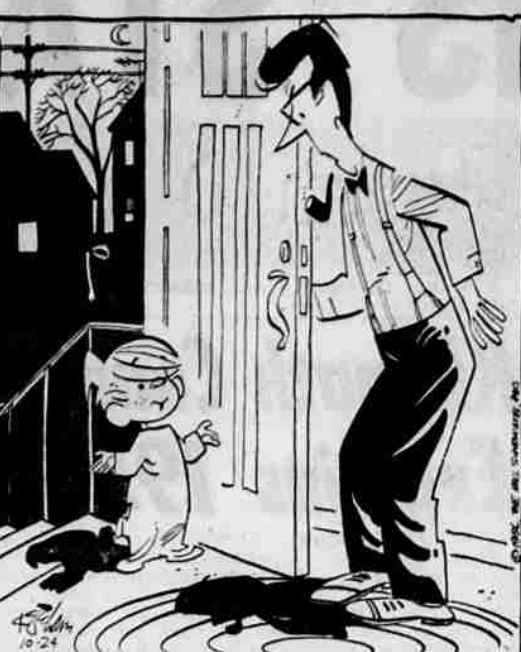

Here's Your Candidate

A Republican party candidate for the office of legislative assembly representative for the Thirtieth District, Klamath County, is Paul O. Landry of Klamath Falls.

Landry has been mayor of Klamath Falls since January of 1953 and was a city councilman from 1945 to 1948, and was president of the Oregon Insurance Agents' Association during 1952-54.

Landry is 62, a native of Louisiana, and was educated in Louisiana public schools and Tulane University. He has lived in Klamath Falls since 1924, and has been engaged in the general insurance business for the past 31 years.

He has been active in Klamath Basin community betterment programs, as well as spearheading numerous industrial expansion efforts within the Basin. He is affiliated with the Scottish Rite, Knights Templar Shrine, Rotary Club, American Legion, Moose Lodge, and has been a member of the Elks lodge since 1914.

Landry is married and has two adult daughters, one married living in Eugene and the other is a civilian employe with the U.S. Army in Germany.

"I feel," concluded Mayor Landry, "that my experience as a mayor, city councilman and as vice president of the League of Oregon Cities along with extensive business understanding, qualify me to do a good job of legislatively serving the people of Klamath County."

Planners Get Tentative Slate

DUNSMUIR—A tentative budget has been submitted by the Dunsmuir planning commission to the local allocation division, state department of finance, in Sacramento, requesting matching funds for street and other planning projects.

This action was taken at a special meeting after H. H. Jaquet, division chief, stopped in Dunsmuir to confer with members of the commission. He advised the group to submit their request, stating funds were appropriated but a method of allocation had not yet been determined.

Dunsmuir's planners also decided to invite a member of Harold Wise and Associates, a planning firm, to meet with them at their next regular meeting, the evening of November 14.

Storms Hinder Antarctic Work

AUCKLAND, New Zealand (AP)—Blizzard conditions and subzero temperatures in the antarctic are retarding American plans for air-dropping men and materials at the South Pole to establish a scientific base.

Wind-driven snow on the McMurdo ice landing strip on the Ross Sea is reducing visibility enough to force some U. S. Air Force globebusters carrying equipment to turn back to their Christchurch base.

The U. S. Navy icebreaker Glacier is battling through a 200-mile barrier of pack ice 1,200 miles north of McMurdo. First priority when weather permits is the building of an intermediate airstrip on Beardmore Glacier enroute to the South Pole to aid Navy aircraft attempting to land Seabee teams and equipment at the pole.

Lake Store Renovated

SILVER LAKE — The hundreds of hunters seeking the elusive goose in northern Lake County are pleasantly surprised this year by improvements made in the Silver Lake Mercantile Store. The owners, Mr. and Mrs. J. K. Graham, completed modernization and enlargement of the store in time for the influx of hunters for the deer season and those arriving now to hunt birds.

Since purchasing the store a year ago, the Grahams have doubled store display space and have installed an 8x14-foot walk-in cooler with a display front. The cooler, completely stocked with fresh meats, produce, dairy foods and cold drinks, has tripled business in those lines, Graham states.

Enlarged space has permitted the addition of a frozen food display case, large drygoods, hardware and variety departments. The store has been changed to self service and carts put in for the convenience of shoppers.

The sales staff of Mr. and Mrs. Graham and Mrs. Ernie Moran is supplemented by the addition of three part time assistants during the fall hunting months.
