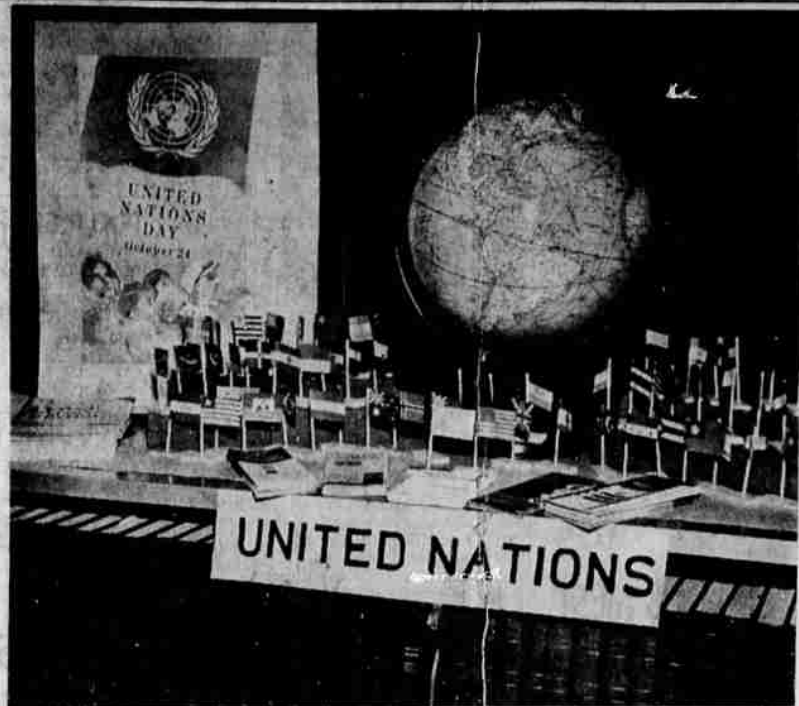

World Observes Eleventh United Nations Birthday

In the comparatively brief but violent history of the human race man has organized many efforts toward universal peace, from tribal treaties to international conferences, from the exchange of tokens to declarations of human rights, man has shown a great desire for peace. The record of bloodshed testifies to the lack of success with which most of his strivings have met.

October 24 is the eleventh anniversary of the United Nations, the most recent attempt the citizens of the world have made to live together in peace with one another as good neighbors. Throughout the world people celebrate this day as a symbol of hope and faith; hope that the shaky peace we now know will be strengthened and preserved, and faith that in acting together, nation with nation, good will result for all and war will become only a memory instead of a threat.

OPPOSITION
Skeptics scoff at the complex parliamentary procedures which the UN is forced to wait upon, and defeatists claim that the solutions toward which the organization is striving are unattainable. Others, who are opposed to the group on different grounds, seem to take the attitude that war is an incurable disease affecting mankind for which there is no remedy and the search for one should be abandoned. Such a point of view in regard to actual diseases would result in the negation of a long history of medical progress. Simply because we have found no sure cure for cancer is no reason why we should cease to search for one, and by the same token, we should continue to seek after world peace even though war seems to be an inherent part of man's nature.

The purpose of United Nations Day is, in part, an attempt to educate the peoples of the world as to the structure and workings of that organization. Here in Klamath County we have a chapter of the Oregon United Nations Association working to that end. Discussions are held among members of that group regarding the great issues facing the UN, literature explaining the structural organization and functions of the various bodies within the main institution is distributed by them and films illustrating the UN in operation are circulated among our schools.

This group of 50 interested citizens is headed by Ross Ragland

with Mrs. Ann Barnett acting as secretary. They study as a group and discuss their ideas regarding the problems of the United Nations. Resolutions arrived at in their meeting are sometimes submitted to the UN as an expression of public opinion. During this election campaign they have attempted to clarify the attitudes toward the world organization exhibited by the political parties in their platform statements and other declarations.

WORLD PEACE

Community groups such as these bring the United Nations close to the public and the idea of world peace has captured the imagination of the people as a result. The setbacks and failures, problems and times of tension are now the common topic of conversation of all men and not merely the property of professional diplomats. This is as it should be if the UN is to be truly a world organization devoted to the fundamental belief that all men desire peace, inter-

national cooperation and understanding, and a better way of life for the entire human race. If this idea prevails and more of us take part in the active support of the United Nations it cannot help but succeed, and the necessity for success has been forced upon us by the new elements of warfare. In each era one or two new ideas have dominated and colored the thinking of generations at a time. Exploration may motivate men for a long period which will be followed by a time of artistic development. The twentieth century has ended with our generation.
