



Driver Freed On \$250 Bail

LAKEVIEW — Ben Lohf, 20, appeared before Justice of the Peace O. C. Gibbs in Lakeview Monday morning, to answer a charge of violation of the basic rule. He was released on payment of \$250 bail with orders to appear for trial on November 23.

Lohf was driving his car when it plowed into a parked automobile on North G. Street, Sunday about 5 a.m. in front of the home of Mr. and Mrs. V. G. Hahner. The automobile, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Jack Bailey of Portland, was forced by the impact into a power pole about 75 feet ahead and almost totally wrecked. The front end of Lohf's car was considerably damaged, but he and two men riding with him, were unharmed. Investigation by State Policeman Nick Barry resulted in Lohf appearing for arraignment Monday morning. The case was continued until the November date, with the understanding specified by the judge that, in the meantime, the defendant arrange for repairs to the Bailey car.

Mrs. Bailey is the daughter of the Hahnners, and she and her husband and two children were visiting with them.
