



John Day Hassle On

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP) — Was 19th-Century explorer John Day a Revolutionary War hero? Is he really buried on Birch Creek, along southern Idaho's Highway 28?

No to both questions, says the Eagle Rock Chapter in Idaho Falls erected a monument near the grave. Members of this group are certain that the grave contains the body of the explorer who tramped through the Northwest in 1810. They're also convinced that Day was a fighter in the Revolutionary War.

But a resolution, signed by Old Fort Hall Chapter President Jack Halliwell Jr., Pocatello, says flatly that day's body isn't in the grave and that Day did not fight in the Revolutionary War.

The resolution, forwarded to the State Highway Commission, asks that agency to "remove from Highway 28 any reference to the grave as an historical site, and remove from its highway road maps any reference to the grave

of John Day."

It also asks the department to correct "any of its records, files and proceedings referring to John

Day so that it clearly appears therein that the Birch Creek grave is not that of John Day, and that it is not the grave of a Revolution-

ary War soldier."

The resolution climaxed an investigation that began last July when a party led by J. A. Har-

Nash Unveils Newer Lines

DETROIT (UP)—The 1957 Nash Ambassador goes on sale at dealerships across the country featuring increased horsepower and a four-lamp headlight system designed to give up to 100 extra feet of illumination.

New engines generating 255 horsepower, up 35 from 1956 models, power all four models in the new line—the custom country club hardtop, super country club hardtop, custom four-door sedan.

Power brakes are standard equipment on custom models and optional on supers. Power steering and power window lifts are optional on both series.

The new headlamps are mounted in vertical pairs in the front fenders. Each lamp measures 5 3/4 inches in diameter, compared with 7 inches for conventional lights.
