SAN FRANCISCO (U.S.D.A.)—Cattle salable 25; cutter-high utility slaughter cows about steady at 9.00-11.00. Calves salable none; market untested; early in week good-choice 300-500 lb slaughter calves 17.00-18.00. Hogs salable 50; market not established; Wednesday No. 1-3 grade butchers 17.00. Sheep salable none; earlier in week choice shorn slaughter lambs 20.00.

CHICAGO (U.S.D.A.)—Demand was slow for hogs Thursday and butchers dropped 25 cents while sows sold weak to 25 cents lower. Salable receipts totaled 9,500. Buyers obtained most 200 to 270 pound butchers at \$15.25 to \$15.50. A few lots sold as high as \$16.00. This was off 75 cents from last weekend.

A limited number of 170 to 195 pound butchers moved at \$15.50 to \$15.75 to \$15.00. Steers sold steady to weak while heifers were weak in the cattle section, where salable receipts totaled 1,500. Top on steers was \$28.00 for low prime and on heifers \$25.00, also for low prime types.

A few standard to high good steers brought \$15.00 to \$21.50 while utility and standard heifers were taken at \$11.50 to \$17.50. Cows jumped 25 to 50 cents. Utility and commercial sold at \$11.00 to \$12.50 and canners and cutters at \$8.50 to \$10.75. Salable sheep receipts totaled 2,000. Buyers paid \$19.00 to \$22.00 for most good to prime woolled offerings, going to \$22.25 for a few prime.

GRAINS CHICAGO (U.S.D.A.)—Wheat firmed toward the close on the Board of Trade Thursday and carried the rest of the grain market along with it. Late buying in wheat followed reports the Agriculture Department next week will predict exports in the current season will go above 400 million bushels for the first time in five years. During the greater portion of his adult life he has been engaged in machine work, and for the past 12 years has operated his own machine shop. In addition, he has operated the Kalder Ambulance Service during the past eight years.

Kalder has been active in community work, scouting programs, and is a member of the Foot Printers and the Elks organizations.

Concerning his candidacy, Kalder has this to say: "I believe that my business experience and knowledge of the county qualifies me to serve the people and if I am elected I will advocate that all county purchases be on a competitive bid basis with a primary consideration for local businesses; I will encourage free and open court meetings for the public and the press; I will stress the completion of a secondary state highway via Lake O' Woods and Medford; I will stand for the improvement of recreation and hunting areas and will oppose the closing of access roads leading to these areas, I will do all within my power to get the fish ladders built at Copco Dam, and I will give people direct answers to their questions with consideration for the majority."

Kalder added that if elected he plans to dispose of his business interests except for the ambulance service, and will arrange the latter detail so he can give the maximum time to a commissioner's job.

Pate Defends Ouster Rule

HONOLULU, T.H. (UP)—Gen. Randolph Pate, Marine Corps commandant, has defended his edict ousting Marine wives and dependents from Japan.

He told reporters Wednesday that he had held several conferences on the subject during his recent tour of Far Eastern installations and said the talks served to "confirm my judgment" that a Marine wife's place is in the states.

Pate said he understood only 24 wives were still defying the order to go home and it was "up to local commanders" to decide what steps to take in the event any of them refuse to leave Japan.

The Marine Corps feels that leathernecks in the Far East "must not be encumbered by dependents" because they "must be in constant readiness to move elsewhere."

The general's statement came a few hours after 65 Marine wives and children arrived in San Francisco from Japan, angrily denouncing the corps edict ordering them to leave their menfolk.

The Marines wives said they were forced to accept the order because it was "suggested" their husbands would face "punitive action" which might harm their careers "if they failed to comply."

The women asked reporters not to quote them by name because "the Marine Corps might possibly take it out on our husbands even now."

Here's Your Candidate

A Democratic candidate for the Thirtieth District assembly seat, representing Klamath County is Carl Yancey. He is 51 years old, a native of Merlin, Oregon, and has lived in Klamath County since 1914. He was graduated from Pelican Bay School and Klamath County High School and attended Ashland Normal for two years.

Yancey adds that he is not a politician, but received a large write in vote in the May primary to place him on the ballot.

"I believe," said Yancey, "that most politicians have forgotten they are servants of the people; rather, it seems as though some politicians are of the opinion that the people are working for them... especially the ones who go back to the Legislature year after year."

Yancey believes that there should not be a sales tax, that the people should never permit the taking from them of the initiative, referendum and recall, that everyone should work to defeat SJR 4 which would permit the Legislature to affix emergency tax measures, and that more of the tax dollar should be given to state institutions such as the school for boys, the schools for retarded children, and the mental and tuberculosis hospitals.
