

Highway Commission, County Courts OK Lake Of Woods Road Project

Agreement on a plan to complete the final link in a new all-weather highway route between Klamath Falls and Medford via Lake of the Woods was the highlight of a meeting of the Oregon State Highway Commission and members of the highway department staff from Salem conferring with Klamath County and Klamath Falls officials and civic leaders of this area. The dinner meeting was held in the Winema Hotel Thursday night.

announced that the county courts of Klamath and Jackson counties and the highway commission are in agreement on a plan to construct the needed link by using national forest road funds which will be allocated to the state. Chandler said Oregon can expect to receive about \$4 million per year from this source for the next several years.

Formal requests from the two county courts asking the State Highway Commission to intercede with the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads and the U.S. Forest Service for approval of the plan were revealed by Chandler. He said that Forest Service approval of the plan is necessary because the final link in the proposed route runs through national forest land. And the Bureau of Public Roads must approve any road plan in which a federal agency is involved. Chandler also said that under the federal regulations governing the use of the forest road funds the State Highway Commission has the power to recommend what state highways will be constructed with the federal funds. And, Chandler added, the State Highway Commission is very much in favor of completion of the route.

At present, the route is state Highway 420 from Klamath Falls to the Rocky Point junction and is a modern all-weather paved road. After the state completed construction of the highway to Rocky Point junction, the county paved that portion of the highway into the Lake of the Woods junction. This leaves only six miles of the road to be built in Klamath County and eight miles in Jackson County.

The highway is now paved in Jackson County to a point near McAllister Springs. The road runs through (traveling from Klamath Falls) Lakeview and Brownsboro and connects with State Highway 62 (the road from Medford to Crater Lake) at Eagle Point.

Oregon State Highway Engineer W. C. Williams stated that processing of the proposal by the state and federal agencies is now needed and it is possible that allotment of some of the forest road funds could be made on the project next year. Williams predicted completion of the route within the next three or four years.

Chairman Chandler stated that the present rather crooked portion of the highway running along Lakeshore Drive near Klamath Falls would be used until traffic counts show sufficient use of the road to warrant re-routing it. The new route probably would be around the back of the lakeshore hill and would connect with highways 66 and 97 in the vicinity of the Weed - Ashland junction.

Last year the highway commission attempted to work out a plan of joint county-state participation in the construction of the highway link with Jackson and Klamath counties. Agreement on this plan, which would have meant the two counties would have had to use some of their federal highway aid funds on the project, was not forthcoming. The county courts and the highway commission then worked out the present plan using the federal forest road funds. Forest roads built on national forest lands are constructed using 100 per cent federal funds with the state assuming maintenance responsibility upon completion of the road.

HUNGARIAN REVOLT SPREADS

Day's News

Here is the latest word, as this is written, from Hungary: The ANTI-COMMUNIST civil war spread over much of the nation today despite orders from the GOVERNMENT for an all-out effort to crush the REBELS. Three Belgian diplomats who arrived at the Austrian border after leaving Budapest (Hungary's capital) this morning said:

"The whole of Western Hungary is in the hands of the rebels."

The GOVERNMENT radio is pleading with the rebels to stop fighting. It is making all sorts of promises — amnesty, a new government, better living conditions. But apparently it is making little headway, for word from Hungary tells not only of continued fighting but of a general strike.

And — Note this: The Tito-type communist government is BEING SUPPORTED BY RUSSIAN TROOPS.

That is to say: In the pinches, ALL KINDS OF COMMUNISTS STICK TOGETHER.

Summing up: On the basis of this morning's dispatches, it looks like the silent masses in the background, which were spoken of in this space yesterday, may be desperately attempting a life-or-death rebellion against the cruel tyranny of Russian communism.

If so, only time can tell what will come of it.

Historical snapshot: The silent masses of Hungary have never known much liberty. They have been oppressed by the Tartars. They have been oppressed by the imperialist Germans. They have been oppressed by the Turks. They have been oppressed by the imperialist Austrians.

In 1945, they reached a point where they could take the oppression of the Hapsburgs no longer and REVOLTED under the leadership of Lajos (anglicized name Louis) Kossuth.

But — RUSSIA helped the Hapsburgs to put down the rebellion — bloodily.

Always, you see, the sinister hand of Russia has been busy taking away from common ordinary people the rights to which common ordinary people are entitled. Everywhere — throughout the centuries — Russia has been the Foe of human liberty.

The explosive situation in Eastern Europe — which has IM-MENSE possibilities — has, at least taken our minds off what was becoming a tiresome and disillusioning political campaign.

On the Democratic side, it has been full of insincerity and claptrap. Mr. Stevenson — who four years ago seemed to have the makings of a statesman — has this year degenerated into a common scold. Apparently his advisers told him he had to get down to the Truman level if he wanted to get elected, and in his efforts to do so he has obscured (or maybe lost) the qualities that distinguished him in 1952.

What is happening in Europe is REAL. In Hungary, men are facing tanks bareheaded and saying: "Give me liberty or GIVE ME DEATH!"

Things like that make us THINK.

UN Study Of Revolt Requested By U.S.

WASHINGTON — The United States has started consultation with Britain, France and other friendly governments on "the feasibility and advisability" of taking the Hungarian situation into the United Nations.

This was announced Friday by State Department press officer Lincoln White. He said consultations are being conducted in various capitals and that one question under discussion "is whether Soviet troops are in Hungary legitimately under the Warsaw Pact."

Two other lines of action are also getting urgent consideration within the American government — and presumably in Allied consultations —

1. The possibility of making a strong protest directly to Moscow against the intervention of Soviet forces in the Hungarian civil war.

2. The possibility of giving financial and economic help to Eastern European countries which successfully assert their independence of Moscow control.

PROTEST OR APPEAL

Either a protest or an appeal to the United Nations would apparently be based on the charge that Russia acted illegally in throwing its two or more divisions in Hungary into action against the thousands of students and workers who revolted against Soviet communism and demanded Western style freedom.

Although White refused to go into any detail on U.S. policy, President Eisenhower had established the policy line already with a public statement Thursday in which he said Soviet troops should have been withdrawn from Hungary under terms of the Hungarian peace treaty in 1947. The Western powers and Russia are parties to the treaty.

The Warsaw Pact of last May set up a system of mutual alliances among Russia and Eastern European governments, but Hungarian revolutionaries are contending that under the pact Soviet troops could go into action in Hungary only against an enemy attacking from outside the country.

ANNOUNCEMENT

The announcement at the State Department here came after it was learned that Paris that the three Western powers might take the Hungarian case to the U.N.

The dilemma in which the United States finds itself in the Eastern European uprising is of developing a policy line of support and sympathy without raising any false hopes of an all-out American commitment to any revolutionary movement there.

John Robinson is superintendent of the department which works three shifts around the clock.

Bob Elliott, safety engineer for the plant, stated that the hams are being purchased locally from a grocery store rather than from any wholesaler.

Safety awards are given by departments at Weyerhaeuser and the shipping department men were given their safety award a short time ago.

At the end of 100,000 hours of accident-free working time, the men were given a steak dinner. At the end of 200,000 safe hours they were honored with another dinner and the award for 300,000 safe hours is being made in the form of a gift to the family.

Crater Park Road Open

Crater Lake National Park rangers reported this morning that Highway 82 is open through the park with chains advised. Chains or abrasive snow tread tires are required for travel from Angel's Spring to the rim.

Six and one-half inches of new snow fell during the 24-hour period ending at 8 a.m. today bringing snow depth to 15 inches. Precipitation was 2.15 inches. Snow depth on this date last year was two inches.

Skies were completely overcast this morning and a gusty wind was rising.

Maximum temperature Thursday was 32 degrees; minimum last night was 32 degrees and at 8 a.m. today it was still 32 degrees. The rangers said the thermometer is in accurate working order.

Elsewhere in the state mostly rain was reported. There is rain over Highway 97 north of Klamath Falls and over the Green-springs to the west. Skies were overcast but pavement bare over the Willamette Pass. The barometer was up so no immediate storm was in prospect.

Packed snow on the highways over McKenzie and Santiam passes was the report from those highways. Bare pavement was reported from the Warm Springs and snow flurries with the snow not sticking to the highway at Government Camp.

Eisenhower's Sickness Rumor Hit By Hagerty

WASHINGTON — Press Secretary James C. Hagerty Friday described as "the most amazing document of falsehood that I have ever seen" a report by columnist Drew Pearson that President Eisenhower suffered a "mild relapse" on his Western campaign trip.

Hagerty said it is "absolutely and categorically" untrue that Eisenhower suffered a relapse at any time on the trip. Hagerty told reporters there has been no relapse on that or any other occasion.

Hagerty said a news conference he obtained a copy of the Pearson column from newspapers which queried him about it. The column was distributed for publication Saturday.

Hagerty said that on one page alone there were 10 misstatements of fact—three in one sentence.

Pearson, who was out of town, responded with a statement through his office here which said: "My story was carefully checked, and I believe it to be true."

Wet Weather Upsets Plans

Wet weather upset the carefully laid plans of the foresters this weekend and required several changes in the agenda for visiting members of the Columbia River Section, Society of American Foresters, meeting being held in Klamath Falls today and tomorrow.

The proposed field trip to the new logging areas in Lake County, under the direction of Supervisor John McDonald, has to be cancelled due to impassable roads.

In the clay soil over there the rain rendered roads impassable. A substitute trip was launched this morning to the Klamath Indian Reservation where pumice roads make travel possible despite the wet weather. The trip is under the direction of Earle Wilcox and Connie Schelland.

A hunting trip in the Klamath Falls area has been planned for those wishing to go Saturday morning, with an alternate trip through the Lower Lake Reserve for others.

Many of the group attending the two-day meet came directly to Lakeview from the northern areas around Seattle and Portland and joined the field trip party this morning at Beatty.

The banquet will be held tomorrow night at the Willard Hotel with Section Chairman Dan Robinson in charge. Frank Jenkins, publisher of the Herald and News, will be the speaker.

Two Killed In Accident

TULELAKE — A speeding car that careened off California State Highway 139, shortly before noon yesterday, took the lives of two men, one of them a longtime resident of Malin.

Dead are Sam Grubb, 33, Malin, and Charles Maier, about the same age, believed to be recently of Montana. Both men were employed in the potato harvest by S. M. Streeter, also of Malin.

California State Highway Patrolman Bill Skellon who investigated the accident, stated that the car, apparently traveling at a high rate of speed left the highway, struck a California Oregon Power Company pole guy wire and hit the corner of the Crawford and Wolfe warehouse, about two miles south of Tulelake.

Glenn Taylor, Yreka, deputy coroner, was called to the scene in the absence of Deputy Sheriff F. A. Dobson.

Rebels Conquer Western Regions

VIENNA, Austria — Hungary's anti-Communist civil war spread over much of the country Friday despite orders from the government for an all-out effort to crush the rebels.

Three Belgian diplomats who arrived at the Austrian border after leaving Budapest at 11 a.m. said: "The whole of western Hungary is in the hands of the rebels."

Heavy fighting raged throughout Thursday night and Friday in Budapest, with scores of Russian tanks taking part.

"The dead and dying were lying about everywhere in the streets," the diplomats reported.

Rebels controlled the highway to Vienna, from Budapest to the border. Rebel civilians and Hungarian soldiers who had deserted to the revolution stopped the Belgians six times en route to the Austrian frontier.

Several thousand persons were believed dead or wounded in fighting that had flamed for three days in the Danube capital and spread to the western countryside and such major cities as Győr, Szeged, Szolnok and Pécs.

Three radio stations apparently were in the hands of rebel forces. All were heard faintly here, calling themselves "The Freedom Radio."

As being at Pécs, near the Yugoslav frontier, and Miskolc, near the Czech border.

LEAFLETS

Leaflets proclaiming establishment of a "revolutionary government" were being distributed.

Reports at the Austrian border indicated Hungarian workers had gone out in a general strike, paralyzing railways, transport and other industry.

The pledges of the new government of Premier Imre Nagy, for a new deal with eventual withdrawal of Soviet troops from the country, apparently had not gotten anywhere. The Budapest Radio broadcast repeated urgent appeals to the rebels to give up their arms and cease the bloodshed.

These broadcasts pledged reforms of all kinds, amnesty for rebels, better living conditions, independence from Moscow, and a new popular front government "today or tomorrow."

The radio appeals were addressed especially to "young soldiers" who apparently had deserted the government to work with the rebels and even "old Communists."

Some of the dead in Budapest had been shot down by Russian tanks when demonstrators advanced with only Hungarian flags and no weapons.

WOUNDED CAPITAL

Budapest, a city of 1½ million, was a capital of gaping and blackened wounds in its buildings. Debris littered its streets.

Pécs and Miskolc are cities of 60,000 and 130,000. Győr and Szeged, where other anti-Soviet disorders were reported, are places of 60,000 and 130,000.

The news that Russian and Hungarian troops had launched the all-out attack was the last report received from inside the embattled city from Associated Press correspondent Andre Marton before his temporary telegraphic communications were broken early Friday.

The capital on the Danube was without telephone connections to the outside world.

An Austrian coming across the border at Nickelsdorf said he saw Russian soldiers fire on about 100 Hungarian demonstrators at the small town of Magyarszabolcs, about 10 miles from the border, when the Hungarians attempted to tear down a Soviet flag. Many were killed and wounded, he added.

FARMERS REVOLT

An Austrian border official said Hungarian farmers had revolted in Sopron and had been put down by Soviet reinforcements.

Budapest broadcasts warned people to stay off the streets most of the day.

It added: "Anyone found bearing arms will be shot"—apparently without the formality of even a summary court martial.

Later, the radio urgently appealed for blood donors, and called for all doctors, nurses and hospital attendants to report for emergency service. The radio began repeating these calls every 10 minutes.

The Central Committee of the Hungarian Communist Party was said to have met and to have ordered the "complete smashing" of the revolt by mass assault.

Singapore Mobs Riot; Seven Dead

SINGAPORE, — Police opened fire in many parts of Singapore Friday night as rioting mobs attacked police, stoned government buildings and set government efforts to quash a Red-inspired students' strike.

Casualties rose to 7 killed and 52 injured, by official count. Those killed and 37 of those injured were rioters. The injured included seven police and eight Europeans.

Mobs stoned a theater, a public building and set fire to a police crowd. Police opened fire on a crowd of 300 which attacked a radio patrol jeep. The crowd fled.

Despite a curfew, rioters took over a two-mile length of the city's main thoroughfare, setting up roadblocks and preparing piles of stones for attacks on civilian cars and army police vehicles.

Royal Air Force and Navy helicopters dropped tear gas bombs on mobs who continued attacks on public and civilian property. The RAF and Navy joined rioters after arsonists burned mail and cold storage trucks.

The leftist Peoples Action Party called on the labor front government to resign as fighting spread through the colony.

Police gunned down four demonstrators in scattered outbreaks. The riots began on the east side of Singapore Island near the Chung Cheng High School. About 2,000 Communist-led students at this and another Chinese school have been on a sitdown strike since Oct. 10 protesting the government's ban on their student union and the arrest of four union officials.

Police chased them out Friday morning with clubs and tear gas. Later the students joined striking workers and hoodlums in clashes with police.

Six Europeans were injured when their cars were attacked by rioters.

As dusk settled, High Commissioner Sir Donald MacGillivray at Kuala Lumpur ordered 1,000 Malay police to cross to Singapore to reinforce hard pressed police and British troops.
