Floyd Wynne Addresses Soroptimist Club Women

"The United Nations has been a boon to mankind in many ways, visible and invisible," declared Floyd Wynne of KFLW, speaking before the Soroptimist Club luncheon at the Winema Hotel on Thursday noon.

"To name but three of the fields in which the UN has benefited the world, there is the world health organization, working to improve sanitary and health conditions throughout the world; the educational pursuits which have resulted in rebuilding war-damaged libraries and a worldwide cultural exchange; and work in the food and agricultural fields to improve farming practices, stamp out famine and provide better nutrition for all people," Wynne said.

As the 11th birthday anniversary passes of the founding of the UN by the 50 nations meeting in San Francisco, Wynne suggested taking inventory of the changes in the organization during that time. He pointed to the fact that those first representatives labored under the impression that all of the five major powers would remain on a friendly basis and were unaware that the first atomic bomb was then in the process of construction.

"Even the ardent supporters of

UN have begun to forget the idea of world government," the speaker said. "Today, of course, we have come back to the thesis that a nation that is strong can only protect itself. The world has divided into defensive blocs.

"We are faced with the fact that the security council of the UN did not work on the basis for which it was set up. One of the major changes in the 11 years of its existence is the lessening of the importance of the security council and the increased importance of the general assembly which is taking up as procedural questions many of the questions previously reserved to the security council.

"Anyone who says what the UN

will do in the future had better have a very fine crystal ball because things change very fast in the world today," Wynne said.

The United Nations and its allied activities cost us as individuals between 75 cents and a dollar a year, the speaker commented. The United States has assumed the larger proportion of its cost which runs from 160 million dollars to 170 million dollars a year.

Wynne was introduced by Rita DePew, program chairman for the day. Naomi French, vice president, presided in the absence of Margaret Larkin.

Mary Bothwell, program chairman, announced that the No-
