

Albert Says QB Now Boss

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Coach Frankie Albert Saturday gave "the ball game back to the boys" with the announcement that the quarterbacks—not the coaches—would call most of the plays in today's San Francisco Forty Niners-Chicago Bears football game.

Albert and his aides have been using this system, without too much success, the so-called Paul Brown system of calling the plays from the sidelines or the stands and sending in the word with a shuttle system. Where Brown used guards to carry his messages, the Forty Niners used ends.

So today it will be Y. A. Tittle, or his fellow quarterback Earl Morrall, who will take the lumps when a play backfires, or the cheers when they succeed.

They have to succeed today if the Forty Niners, now boasting a 1-3 record, plan to stay in the running for the National Football League's Western Division championship.

The Bears, one of the favorites to take the division title, roll into Kezar Stadium with a 3-1 record and boasting a ground attack that crumbled the Forty Niner defenses 21-7 in the two teams first meeting of the season a fortnight ago.

Heading the Bears drive will be Rick Casares, the Chicago fullback who paces the NFL in the ground gaining department after four games with 401 yards total and a 5.3 yards per carry average.

Bucking up Casares is a great corps of speedsters including little Perry Jeter, the rookie from Cal Poly; halfback Bobby Watkins, who stands 10th in the ground gaining department, and big John Hoffman, the 215 pound right halfback.

N.Y. Swaps Walt Dukes

The New York Knickerbockers have made good their promise to trade big Walt Dukes, the tallest player in the National Basketball Assn.

On the eve of Saturday night's opening games in New York, St. Louis and Rochester, the Knicks sent the 7-foot Dukes to the Minneapolis Lakers for veteran Slater Martin, a former Texas star.

The 5-foot Martin, smallest man in the loop, floor generated the Lakers to four division titles and four league championships in his seven seasons with the club.

Dukes was one of the nation's highest rated prospects at Seton Hall in 1953. He signed with the Harlem Globetrotters, who sold him to New York last year for a reported \$25,000.

Vince Boryla, Knick coach, upbraided Dukes on several occasions for his indifferent attitude and two weeks ago suspended him for failure to report for training on time.

Hunter Bags Three-Legger

AUBURN (UP)—Jack Jessie, Lincoln, reported Friday he killed a forked-tooth buck with only three legs while hunting in Tehama County.

49ers Get LA Halfback

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The San Francisco Forty Niners have picked up defensive halfback Bob Holladay of the Los Angeles Rams on waivers to replace the injured Paul Goad.

Holladay, who played through the first four games of the season for the Rams, is a 175-pounder from Tulsa University. He pulled a leg muscle in last Sunday's game against the Green Bay Packers.

Goad was placed on the injured reserve list by Coach Frankie Albert after doctors ruled Goad out of action for four or five weeks. The rugged rookie suffered a fractured jaw in last week's game with the Detroit Lions.

Bahama Scores With KO

NEW YORK (UP)—Middleweight Yama Bahama's reward for stopping Tony (Tex) Gonzalez in 59 seconds of the third round Friday night at Madison Square Garden, is another session in the gymnasium.

Bahama goes right back to work to prepare stablemate Ralph (Tiger) Jones for his Nov. 19 date in Paris with France's Charles Humez.

If things work out right, Bahama also may make the European trip. Bobby Melnick, his manager, hopes to close "in a day or two" for a London bout between Bahama and Peter Waterman, conqueror of Kid Gavilan.

Bahama, 153½ pounds, made short work of Gonzalez, 159, dropping the East Orange, N.J. middleweight with a right to the jaw for a nine-count and then leaving him draped over the bottom rope.

Lions Slim Choice To Topple Rams

Three teams won places in the Oregon high school football playoffs as a result of Friday night action.

Benson, ranked No. 10 in the Associated Press poll, and Lincoln became the Portland city league's two representatives in the class A-1 championships.

Benson racked up Lincoln, 33-7, to remain unbeaten in league play but Lincoln backed into the playoffs when Grant surprised Cleveland, the league's third place team, 26-6.

It was Cleveland's third league defeat and Lincoln has lost only once. Only one round is left in the league.

Pleasant Hill captured its first class A-2 district 5 title when it whipped St. Francis of Eugene, 19-0, for its seventh victory without a defeat.

Other teams moved closer to district championships and playoff spots.

While Marshall, No. 1 in the poll, was downing Prineville, 32-19, and Medford, No. 2, was swamping Ashland, 47-0, third-ranked Gresham and Astoria, No. 8, fought it out in a class A-1, district 3 contest.

Gresham won, 6-0. Beaverton, No. 6, beat down Parkrose, 20-6. But The Dalles retained a chance when it beat Milton-Freewater, 27-0.

Albany, No. 7, was battled to a 13-13 tie by North Salem. Albany can win the district 8 title by defeating Corvallis next week. South Salem, its chief rival in the district, was idle.

Silverton remained unbeaten in district 8 of class A-2 with a 38-0 victory over Gervais. Central Union of Monmouth-Independence stayed undefeated in district 4 when it blanked Estacada, 19-0.

In other games West Linn retained a chance for the district 4 berth by drubbing Newberg, 33-6. St. Helens trampled Forest Grove 41-19.

Springfield edged Roseburg in district 5, 6-0.

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Fuss Still Stirring Over Gold Cup Race

DETROIT (UP)—The fuss kicked up by the Gold Cup speedboat race, run on the Detroit River 57 days ago, still isn't over.

The American Power Boat Assn.'s Inboard Commission has awarded the cup to Seattle's Miss Thriftway. But in Detroit Saturday, two moves are being made against the decision.

The Detroit International Regatta Assn., sponsor of the race, voted Friday night to appeal the APBA commission's decision, which reversed the verdict of race judges and switched the cup from Detroit's Miss Pepsi to Thriftway.

Joe Schoenith, owner of three unlimited speedboats bearing the name Gale, moved for the appeal to the APBA and asked the question be reopened. None of Schoenith's big boats figured in the controversy.

Schoenith's motion to ask reopening of the basis of "additional evidence and a claim of misinterpretation of the rules" won unanimous endorsement.

George Simon, owner of the racer Miss U. S., said that preliminary testing of a paint sample taken from the sponsor of Miss Thriftway indicated it was the same color as the paint of a course buoy which Thriftway allegedly hit. The APBA commission held that the Seattle boat did not hit the buoy.

The Detroit owners insisted on Friday night's meeting that neither the paint samples from Miss Thriftway's sponsor nor a five-foot long scrape on her bottom were considered by the commission.

Also in Detroit, Circuit Judge James A. Moynihan ordered the APBA to "present your witnesses before this court for a hearing on its merits" of a suit brought by Detroit's Horace Dodge to have the 1956 Gold Cup race declared "no contest." No trial date was set.

Dodge insisted that Gold Cup rules were violated which prohibited boats qualifying the day of the race.

The APBA has set its own hearing of Dodge's complaint for today at the New York Yacht Club.

Ex-Coach Dies

FLORENCE, Ore. (UP)—Lee Weber, who coached athletic teams at a number of Oregon high schools in years past, died of a heart attack at his home here Thursday night.

Weber was high school coach at Eugene, Estacada, Hermiston, Junction City and Florence.

Rookie Jim Gentile batted in six runs with two homers and a sacrifice. Gino Cimoli and Don Demeter got the other homers, giving Brooklyn a total of 10 in seven games.

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Rose Sets Mark

MELBOURNE (UP)—Murray Rose, 18-year-old Australian, set a world long-course record of 4 minutes, 27 seconds for the 400 meters freestyle Saturday night, the second night of the Australian Olympic swimming trials.

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Navy Releases Johnny Podres

PORTSMOUTH, Va. (UP)—After mulling it over seven months, the U.S. Navy has decided it can't use baseball star Johnny Podres and is returning him to the Brooklyn Dodgers, who undoubtedly can.

The nagging backache which has afflicted the southpaw pitcher for years, and which once resulted in his being classified 4-F for the draft, Friday brought him a medical discharge at the Naval hospital here.

Diagnosed by the Navy as a form of spinal arthritis, the back ailment presumably won't prevent Podres, 24, from taking up where he left off in major league baseball. Naval doctors, though, wouldn't hazard a guess on this point and Podres himself, who left Portsmouth immediately after his discharge, couldn't be reached for an opinion.

Brooklyn officials couldn't contain their jubilation over the release of Podres, who whipped the New York Yankees twice in the 1955 World Series to help the Dodgers win their first world championship.

"That's wonderful news," said Brooklyn Manager Walter Alston in Koto, Japan, where the Dodgers stopped off in their 20-game tour for an exhibition tilt with the Kanto All Stars. "There's nothing I'd rather have heard."

Brooklyn vice president Buzzie Bavasi, just as happy as Alston, had a sober note: "All I hope is that the injury isn't any worse than when he went in the Navy."

Bavasi said he'd like to spot Podres in the Puerto Rican winter league "where he can pitch about once a week and we can keep track of his progress."

Friday night's Navy announcement Podres had been discharged came unexpectedly, though Podres had been in the Naval Hospital since Sept. 19 for further treatment of his ailing back. When the announcement was made, Podres had left town and not even his parents in Witherbee, N.Y., had been notified.

His father, Joseph Podres, said the first order of business for Johnny will be to "get in a lot of hunting" in the Adirondacks this fall. Papa Podres said he felt "glad all over" and mama Podres was "tickled pink."
