

Business Leaders Betting On Another Good Year

NEW YORK (AP) — Leaders of finance and industry were betting this week on at least another year of good business.

Consensus was that the outcome of the November elections would not alter the over-all business trend perceptibly — and that the basic economic facts of life would remain unchanged.

No matter how the battle of the ballots turned out, said economists, you could count on three things: Big spending programs by government and business, plenty of jobs, and steadily rising wages and prices.

Those who worried out loud were concerned primarily with inflation.

A group of 221 leading economists, polled by F. W. Dodge Corp., gave this picture of things to come: Next year will unquestionably be the biggest business year yet. But a good part of the rise in such basic economic indicators as gross national product, retail trade and the like will be accounted for by rising prices.

In a talk to the Los Angeles convention of the American Bankers Assn., Theodore V. Houser, board chairman of Sears, Roebuck & Co. said: "There is a slow and seemingly irresistible inflationary trend... The alternatives seem to be either the development of controls not now in existence to hold the line, or profound changes in the whole concept of pensions, insurance and annuities, to take such dollar depreciation into account."

On the consumer front, living costs as measured by the U. S. government's Bureau of Labor Statistics were still inching upward to new peaks. The bureau's cost-of-living index for September rose .3 of 1 per cent to 117.1 per cent of the 1947-49 average. Government statisticians said you paid more for clothing — and for practically all other kinds of consumer goods and services with the exception of food.

Chances were, however, that your income was higher, too. Factory wage rates set new records last month: average take-home pay of a factory worker with a wife and two dependent children

Group Honors Dead Trucker

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Robert J. Short, Salem, Ore., truck driver who lost his life by steering his runaway truck away from others, has been honored by the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission.

His widow, who lives at 3214 Brown Road, Salem, will receive payments of \$80 a month and a bronze medal honoring her husband's deed.

The act of heroism occurred Aug. 20, 1955, when the brakes of Short's log truck failed as he was approaching the West Linn-Oregon City bridge.

He steered the speeding vehicle past two intersections and onto the bridge where pedestrian and vehicle traffic was at a nontime peak.

The truck's speed increased to 50 miles an hour on the bridge downgrade and had picked up an additional 10 miles an hour as it passed through an intersection at the east end of the bridge.

Then, still sounding the horn and steering, Short climbed out of the cab onto the runningboard as the truck approached a concrete wall and an entrance to a pedestrian tunnel.

He swerved the truck away from the tunnel as two boys emerged. Then, only 40 feet from the wall, Short leaped from the truck which crashed into the wall three feet from the tunnel entrance.

But the chains which held the load of logs broke under the impact and buried Short, injuring him fatally.

The commission said that Short, 28, "died saving an indeterminate number of persons..."

JUSTICE DIES

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Annette Abbott Adams, who retired in 1952 as presiding justice of California's third District Court of appeal, and the first woman assistant attorney general of the U.S., serving under President Wilson, died Friday.

Four Perish In Air Crash

NEWVILLE, Pa. (AP) — An Air Force C119 Flying Boxcar slammed into a fog-capped 1,000 foot rise of the Blue Mountain range in central Pennsylvania Friday night, killing its crew of four. One was a flight nurse.

The bodies, buried under the wreckage, were left for removal after daybreak. Air Force authorities, which said an investigation would be started to determine the cause of the crash, withheld identification of the dead pending notification of relatives.

The giant cargo plane bore into the side of the mountain in heavy rain while en route from Sewart Air Force Base near Nashville, Tenn., to Olmsted Air Force Base near Harrisburg, Pa. It was three hours overdue at the time of the crash.

The mountain is located in Pennsylvania State game land, seven miles from a residence but about two miles from hunting cabins. A spokesman at the Olmsted base said the plane was to have picked up cargo and returned to its base at Sewart.

Richard Nixon Blasts Morse In Medford Speech

WITH NIXON IN CALIFORNIA Vice President Nixon flew into his home state of California Saturday after a gloves-off attack of Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) in a brief invasion of the Pacific northwest.

Nixon, making his third campaign visit to California, is speaking for two Republican congressional candidates trying to unseat Democrats in the San Joaquin Valley and Sen. Thomas Kuchel (R-Calif) who is seeking reelection against the opposition of Democrat State Sen. Richard Richards.

Nixon plugged hard for GOP Senate and House candidates in speeches Friday in Montana, Washington and Oregon, but he reserved his heaviest fire for Morse.

Morse, once a Republican, is opposed by former Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay.

Speaking Friday night at Medford Ore., the Vice President said any supporter of President Eisenhower who also backed Morse

would be "casting two votes which are diametrically opposed." Voters, he said must decide whether "they want to give the President a full vote or half a vote."

An Eisenhower voter who marks his ballot for Morse "is voting to send to the President in the future work against the President's programs," Nixon declared.

He also asserted Morse was one of the few Democrats who did not support the President on foreign policy issues. Morse has been proved "dead wrong," Nixon said, in voting against the 1955 Formosa resolution in which Congress went on record as backing moves Eisenhower might consider necessary to protect Nationalist China.

The Vice President's schedule Saturday took him from Medford where he spent the night to rallies in three California cities—Santa Rosa, Fresno and Bakerfield.

The two latter are valley towns in districts now represented by Democrats.
