

Major Bowl Games To See New Faces Comes The Annual Big Games

Whatever happens during the remainder of the college football season, there are bound to be some unfamiliar faces in the major bowl games on Jan. 1.
Old faithful Georgia Tech should win the Southeastern Conference title and thus play host in the Sugar Bowl. But beyond the Ramblin' Wrecks, the potential bowl teams will cause many a coach to raise an eyebrow and ask: "Who they?"
The fight for the home club in the Rose Bowl, for example, has developed into a scrap between Oregon State and Stanford, a couple of teams that have spent most of their time in the dungeons of the Pacific Coast Conference.
Southern California, UCLA and Washington all are ineligible for assorted subsidization infractions, so the Nov. 10 game between Oregon State and Stanford at Palo Alto probably will be the big game of the conference season.
Actually, both Stanford and Oregon State added considerably to their stature last Saturday. The Indians turned back Southern Cal 21-19 while State defeated UCLA 21-7.
The situation is much the same in the Big Ten, which produces the visiting team, Michigan State is ineligible, having played in the last game there. Ohio State, the logical choice, is being punished for making life too easy for its players, and is ineligible.
That left Michigan the favorite. But the Wolverines were horribly embarrassed by Minnesota Saturday 20-7. And upstart Iowa whipped Purdue 21-20, leaving Minnesota Saturday 20-7.
Then there is the Cotton Bowl, which uses the winner of the Southwest Conference (after a league vote) as the host. The favorite for this one is Texas A&M, which got over its big hurdle, Baylor, by a 19-13 count Saturday.
The last time the Aggies won the crown was 15 years ago and they were ranked outsiders in the race this year. Now they appear to have fairly clear sailing.
Remember how the Orange Bowl promoters rubbed their hands in glee when they signed the Big Seven and Atlantic Coast Conference? They figured they had a natural and in years to come, they'll probably have the top game more often than not.
This year, however, it looks like Colorado against Clemson, hardly a match to cause palpitations.
The Big Seven has a rule which prohibits a team from playing the game two years in a row. That eliminates Oklahoma, which appeared last New Year's, Colorado is the logical second-place team, especially after its 16-0 triumph over Nebraska.
Maryland and Duke, usually the best of the AAC, are just two more clubs these days, the Clemson seems to have scrambled to the top of the heap.
So the Sugar Bowl, this time, should get the gold star as the No. 1 attraction, especially if the sponsors can line up a top team to go against Georgia Tech — say, Penn State.
Up at the top of the heap, Oklahoma will go after its 38th straight victory this week. The opposition will be supplied by Colorado, which has hopes of doing nothing more than making a respectable showing. The Sooners won No. 35 Saturday, a whopping 40-0 victory over Notre Dame.
Michigan State, the current leader in the weekly Associated Press poll, will be out to make amends for its 20-13 defeat by Illinois — the shocker of the season so far — and Wisconsin is the target.

US Track Team Doing OK In Early Tryouts

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Head coach Jim Kelly of the American Olympic track and field team reiterated today that the off-season games in Australia will not handicap this nation's title hopes.
The white-haired pilot from the University of Minnesota was even more pleased after another trial by the U. S. team two days ago in nearby Santa Ana.
In this tuneup meet the team merrily broke three world records, and while two of them probably will not stand up for recognition, due to technicalities, the fact remains that the United States team is in top condition.
While Kelly would not comment, there still is an open question in two events. One involves world record holder Bud Held, San Diego, in the javelin throw, and a possible opening in the pole vault. Bob Gutowski, Occidental College star, could possibly take the place of Bill Mattos, who has been hampered by injuries since the tryouts.
Gutowski two days ago tied Bob Richards at 15 feet 5 inches, which is far better than Mattos has ever done.
Parry O'Brien exceeded his own world record mark in the shotput with a throw of 62 feet 8 1/4 inches. But this remarkable effort was nullified when it was discovered that the landing area of the shot was 9 inches lower than the putting ring.
Harold Connolly let loose with a hammer throw of 224 feet 8 1/4 inches which bettered a brand new mark set a week ago by Russia's Mikhail Krivonozov at 220 feet 10 1/4 inches.
However, it was discovered that Connolly's hammer apparently weighed one-quarter ounce light. Further weightings were ordered to determine whether he had beaten the Russian's mark.
In the 100-meter dash Leamon King, an alternate on the team from California, bettered the world record in defeating in order Thane Baker, Ira Murchison and Bobby Morrow in the time of 10.1.

Golfers Pile Up Third In Row In Golf

MEXICO CITY (UP)—The United States' third straight victory in the Americas Cup tournament left little doubt that the Yanks boast some of the world's best amateur golfers.
After collecting 11 1/2 of 12 possible points in Saturday's opening matches, the U.S. squad won 18 of 24 points in Sunday's concluding three-team matches for a winning total of 29 1/2 points.
Mexico finished a surprising second with 13 points, while Canada was third with 11.
Ken Venturi, captain of the U.S. team, did not play in the concluding matches because of illness. However, Bill Campbell of Huntington, W. Va., proved an able replacement by garnering four points.
BOSTON (UP)—Edward Potgeiter, seven foot, two inch heavy-weight from South Africa makes his American debut at the Boston Arena on Nov. 8 against Jeff Dyer of Springfield, Mass. Potgeiter, who is undefeated in 10 pro fights, scales around 330 pounds, while Dyer, who stands six-four, weighs about 230.

Gene Fullmer Picking Up Points In Favor As Bout With Ray Robinson Nears

NEW YORK (UP)—Young Gene Fullmer had a surprising amount of backing today as he headed toward his middleweight title bout with Ray Robinson and most of it apparently was based on the question of how far the dancing man from Harlem can go.
Fullmer is no worse than a 6-5 underdog at the moment as he preps for the championship event at Madison Square Garden on Dec. 12. There are those who feel that, when the bell rings, he'll be even money or better.
It's somewhat akin to prejudging a race between an aging thoroughbred and a young claiming plater.
Not that Fullmer hasn't got his share of class. But there's no debating the fact that he is, in essence, merely a tough club fighter with plenty of stamina and courage. He is of the Rocky Marciano school, a relentless windmill oblivious of the boxing sciences, but without the Rock's paralyzing punch.
ROBINSON'S COMEBACK
Robinson, throughout his comeback has lost only one bout. That was an early reversal at the hands of Tiger Jones. In the important bouts since then he has won 15 rounds, in winning the crown back from Bobo Olson he knocked out the amorous one in two beats and then, in the rematch, put Bobo away in five rounds.
But if he has to go 15 rounds against the young slugger who never has been knocked out, the theory is that Sugar Ray's 36 years—11 more than Fullmer's—might spell the difference between victory and defeat.

Idaho, UW Frosh '11's Mix In Tie

MOSCOW, Idaho (UP)—Idaho's freshman football team gained only one net yard Friday but managed to salvage a 6-6 tie with the University of Washington yearlings in a rain-soaked, tumble-filled opener for both squads.
The Husky Pups bobbled the ball 11 times, losing it on six occasions, and Idaho fumbled six times, losing half of them.
Washington took advantage of an Idaho miscue to score early in the first quarter. Guard Kurt Gagner pounced on a Vandal fumble on the Idaho 32 and eleven plays later Garver Gayton plunged over from the one for the Husky Pups only score. The conversion attempt was wide.
The Idaho yearlings put across the equalizer in the second quarter with quarterback Jim Norton sneaking over from the two. He had set up the score with a 14 yard run on the previous play.
The Pups outgained Idaho 129 yards to one, although they were unable to cross midfield in the second half.

Hungary On Spot To Date For Olympics

LONDON (UP)—The status of Hungary, which has produced some of the greatest distance runners the world has known, in the Olympic Games was still clouded today although Radio Budapest announced the team was being withdrawn.
Efforts to reach Olympic officials in revolution-torn Budapest have been unavailing, and authorities here were not quite certain whether to believe Radio Budapest.
The broadcast, monitored here, said the entire team had been withdrawn because "their training had been interrupted" by the revolution.
Another report from a reliable informant said that Jozsef Csermak, the defending Olympic champion in the hammer throw, had been killed fighting as a rebel against Russian troops.
The same informant said that Ferenc Puskas, one of the country's greatest soccer stars, also died fighting for the rebel cause.
In Melbourne, where the games open Nov. 22, the chief of the Hungarian team, B. Fehervari, told The Associated Press he has not given up hope of the athletes making the trip.
"We expect news today," he said quietly, "and we hope it will be good news."

Horse Pile-Up To Be Aired At Meet

YONKERS, N.Y. (UP)—The New York Harness Racing Commission will conduct a hearing today on the six-horse pile-up that occurred at Yonkers Raceway Saturday night and caused the management to refund \$194,051 in wagers.
The refunds were made after 300 fans vaulted the fence and stood on the track in a mass protest when only two of the eight starters in the opening race survived the pile-up.
