Contempt Of Court Asked

PORTLAND — The attorney general's office has demanded that Teamster official Clyde C. Crosby be cited for contempt of court.

The motion was made at a hearing here Saturday on Crosby's motion to have a number of indictments thrown out. He said he was notified of his rights at his appearance before the Multnomah County grand jury investigating newspaper charges of vice and corruption in Portland. Crosby was charged with conspiracy to commit a felony, with extortion and with illegal possession of a firearm.

He testified at the hearing that he had not been notified he could

withhold testimony which might incriminate him.

But then Asst. Atty. Gen. John Nichols, who is opposing the motion, had read into the record part of the jury deliberations which he said gave proof that Crosby had been advised of his rights.

At this point Nichols asked the contempt citation. Another prosecutor who is handling the cases of Circuit Judge Frank J. Lon-

gan, who is hearing the case, said he would announce a decision later.

According to the Herald and News' Dorris reporter, Murray had gone out hunting Sunday with friends whose names were not reported. About 9 a.m. he was re-entering his car when a stray bullet struck him in the back near the spine, going completely through his body and dropping into his clothes. The accident happened about two and one-half miles from the John Parsons ranch in Red Rock Valley, 12 miles east of Macdoel.

Dr. B. R. Drader of Dorris is summoned and he called Kaler's Ambulance Service in Klamath Falls which brought Murray to the hospital.

Dr. Drader said Murray was hit with a rifle bullet but the identity of the person firing the gun is not known.

Boivin Asks Hunt Revision

State Senator Harry Boivin, Democratic candidate for reelection, Monday requested the Oregon State Game Commission to re-examine its deer program, particularly the open season on does.

In a letter to P. W. Schneider, state game director, Boivin stated he had received many complaints from hunters about the present disappointing deer season.

"I have been informed that in many areas, deer of both sexes are scarce," Boivin said. "In past years they have been abundant. Conditions have been favorable with ample moisture and adequate food."

Boivin added that the biggest complaint he received had been concerning the legal killing of does over the past few years.

"I am not being critical of the commission's policy," he concluded, "but with the serious decrease in the deer population, I believe it is time a re-examination of this program be made, particularly with reference to the open season on does. The facts should be determined and a program instituted to bring the deer population back to that of previous years."
