

Sooners Replace Spartans In Poll

Oklahoma's one-week exile from the top spot in college football is over. To the surprise of no one, a 40-0 wallop of whipping boy Notre Dame coupled with Michigan State's loss to Illinois regained for the powerful Sooners the No. 1 ranking in the weekly Associated Press poll.

The weekend activities, in which form suffered its worst relapse of the season, drew out the heaviest vote of the year from the nation's sports writers and sportscasters.

Roughly 77 per cent, 143 out of 186, named Bud Wilkinson's Sooners first. Among other contenders, only Georgia Tech, which moved up to second, and Tennessee, now third, got more than a handful of first-place support.

Tech was named first on 31 ballots after making Tulane its fifth straight victim 40-0. Tennessee,

Gophers Win With New Way

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—A new kind of Minnesota football, brash as well as beefy, has shouldered the unbeaten Gophers back into the Big Ten's upper echelon after years of hopeful plodding.

The play-it-by-the-book that so long was the Minnesota trademark has yielded to the unpredictable capers of quarterback Bobby Cox and the willingness of Coach Murray Warmath to give his green No. 2 platoon plenty of action.

With a line averaging better than 245 pounds and a mine of fullback talent, Minnesota remains basically a power team. But where the Gophers once had all crum, they now go in for calculated gambling and some occasional cuteness.

The combination has brought Minnesota four victories and a tie and has made it a powerful candidate for the Rose Bowl.

Against Michigan last Saturday, Cox ran for it on fourth down twice near midfield, and made it both times.

In the second half he worked like a carnival hustler keeping a "quick huddle" Gopher offense rolling at break-neck speed.

Oddly, Cox has energized Minnesota without doing much passing, for which he drew acclaim as a sophomore at Washington two years ago.

Against Northwestern, for instance, he hit only 1 pass in 10 tries. He was 3 for 9 against Illinois, and stayed on the ground almost all the way against Michigan.

His reputation and obvious passing gifts, however, have kept enemy defenses shaky enough to give Cox plenty of running room. Moving on rollouts and sneak plays into the line, the 192-pound junior has piled up 169 yards in his last two games.

Michigan State, which displaced Oklahoma a week ago as the national leader after a 47-14 whacking of Notre Dame, slipped back to fourth place with a nary a top vote. Last week, the Spartans had 96.

On the basis of 10 for first, 9 for second, etc., Oklahoma wound up with 1,766 points, Georgia Tech with 1,614, Tennessee with 1,302 and Michigan State with 1,029.

Behind them the shuffling continued as a result of Texas A&M's 19-13 victory over Baylor, Ohio State's 21-0 victory over Wisconsin, Iowa's 21-20 squeaker over Purdue, Minnesota's 20-7 upset of Michigan, Miami of Florida's 14-0 victory over TCU and Stanford's 27-19 victory over Southern California.

The Aggies moved up to fifth, followed by Ohio State, Iowa, Minnesota, Miami and Stanford.

Oregon Tech and Klamath Union High School both pack their bags for weekend football battles on foreign soil as the Owls are scheduled to meet Oregon College of Education at Monmouth, and the Pels travel to Ashland for a prep encounter.

Coach Rex Hunsaker's Owls from the Mice High Campus will take part in the third Homecoming Game of the season when his high-spirited club meets the Wolves Saturday afternoon. Already this season, Tech has played its own Homecoming against Southern Oregon, and when the Technicians meet EOCE, that game too was for the "old grads."

The Owls, currently holding a 4-3 season record and a two-game

winning streak will try to knock over the Wolves of coach Bill McArthur for the first time in the history of the two schools. Never before has an OTC team beaten an OCE club, and this weekend, the Wolves are expected to be strong favorites to keep the Owls from turning this trick.

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Medford continues as the No. 2 team. It obtained four first-place votes after overwhelming Ashland.

Marshfield, the defending state champion, and Medford have been one-two in the poll since the season started. Medford, which battled Marshfield to a 20-20 tie earlier in the season, will play Grants Pass for the district 6 title at Grants Pass Friday night.

Gresham defeated Astoria, 6-0, to retain its No. 3 spot while McMinnville beat Oregon City, 24-7, to hold its No. 4 rating.

Benson of Portland surged from 10th last week to fifth as it defeated Lincoln, 33-7. Benson and Lincoln are the only schools yet certain of berths in the state playoffs.

Benson forced Eugene down to sixth and Beaverton to seventh, despite the fact that Eugene and Beaverton won games rather easily.

Grants Pass, steadily improving and pointing for its big game with Medford, won again to advance to the No. 8 spot.

Pendleton cracked the top ten for the first time this year after a 48-0 victory over Baker. Astoria's loss to Gresham dropped it two places to No. 10. Albany fell out of the select group for the first time this year as a result of being tied 13-13 by North Salem.

Gresham and McMinnville are the only teams in the top ten who are undefeated and untied. Marshfield and Medford are un-

beaten. Benson has lost only to Marshfield, which also handed Eugene its sole defeat.

Marshfield, Medford, McMinnville, Grants Pass and Pendleton can sew up district titles with victories Friday night. Albany also will win the district 4 championship if it defeats Corvallis.
