Here's Your Candidate

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg is a candidate for associate justice of the Oregon State Supreme Court, Position Number One, (write in).

He was born in Chicago, Illinois in 1899 and spent his boyhood on a farm in Wisconsin. At the age of 14 he moved to Portland, Oregon where he attended Columbia University, now the University of Portland. He later attended the University of Oregon, and is a 1924 graduate of the Northwestern College of Law in Portland. That same year he was admitted to the Oregon Bar and came to Klamath County as deputy district attorney.

In 1925 he was married to Veronica McCawley of Portland and they are the parents of six children.

He practiced law in Klamath County for 16 years and was elected to the Circuit Court Bench in 1940. He is now completing his 16th year as circuit judge.

He has been unanimously endorsed for the supreme court post by members of the Klamath County Bar Association, with the endorsement stating:

"The Honorable David R. Vandenberg has served the people of the State of Oregon, as Circuit Judge for 16 years and is eminently qualified, experienced, and a capable trial judge. His record shows his impartial and courageous administration of justice and we feel he is well qualified to serve as an associate justice."

U.S. Accuses Red Diplomat

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The United States has accused the second secretary of the Soviet U. N. delegation of helping to spirit little Tanya Chwastov out of America and has demanded his recall.

Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., chief U. S. delegate to the U. N., delivered a note to the Russian delegation saying that the actions of Second Secretary Konstantin P. Eki-mov "constitute an abuse of the privilege of his residence in the United States."

The note continued that Eki-mov's actions "were outside the scope of his official capacity . . . and therefore in violation of the provisions of the headquarters agreements between the United States and the United Nations."

Russia in the past has complied promptly with such requests.

Tanya, 2½ years old and born in America, was taken to England Oct. 3 by her Russian-born father Alexei Chwastov over the protests of her mother, Mrs. George Dieczok of Detroit. Chwastov was trying to take the child to Russia, but a custody suit brought in England by Mrs. Dieczok halted the flight in London. The child is being held there as a ward of the court until the suit is decided.

Resourceful California Children Take Off Again

SAN JOSE (UP)—San Jose's wandering children, Delphia Fluss, 11, and her 10-year-old brother Larry, are being sought by police again, for the fourth time in six months.

However, authorities are not quite as concerned this time. The children have proved in the past that they're very well able to take care of themselves.

They've been gone six days this time, about the same length of time they were off adventuring in September. The last time they were found "keeping house" in an abandoned shack, complete with pots and pans and a good supply of bacon and eggs.

The tiny wanderers are two of the six children of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Fluss, who live in an apartment in a municipal housing tract.

Pluss, a mail carrier, said the children usually take some money from the house and disappear on their own. After they were picked up last time, the children told authorities they bought some food and stole a little.

One thing is certain. They are never easy to find.

Delphia is only 4-feet, 11-inches tall, and Larry stands just slightly over four feet.

Juvenile authorities described the children as "well behaved," but with very little to say.

"They don't even talk much to each other—there just seems to be a mutual understanding between the two," a spokesman said.

Mrs. Stella Sullivan, of the police juvenile bureau, admits that the children pose quite a problem.

"We have no idea where to start looking, because they are very resourceful," she said. "All we can do is ask police officers to be on the alert, and hope for the best."

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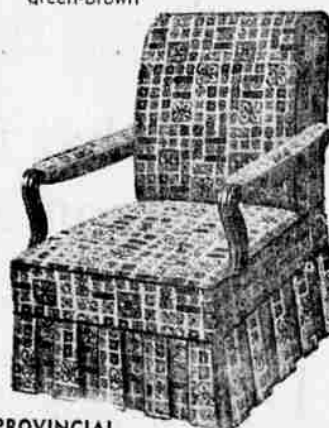
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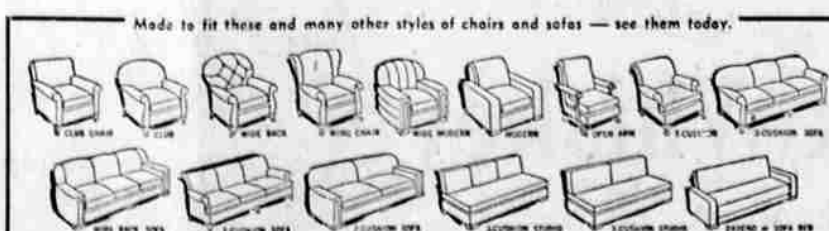
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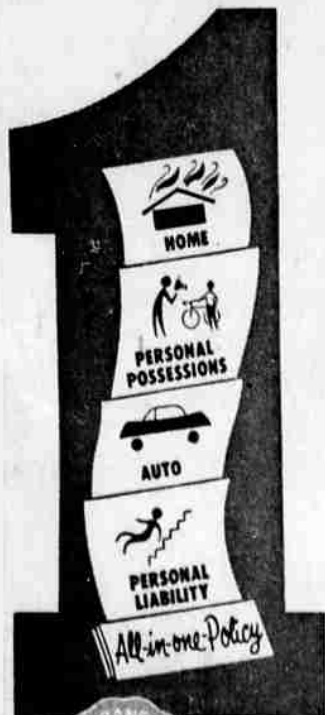
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
