Ike Cancels Election Tour

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower Tuesday canceled his scheduled campaign trip to Dallas, Oklahoma City and Memphis Wednesday because of the Middle East crisis.

Eisenhower sent identical messages to supporters who had arranged for his speeches in these states which supported him in 1952. The message said: "The turn of events Monday leaves me no option — in the interests of working for peace — but to remain at the White House Wednesday to deal with the situation developing in the Middle East."

The President said it was "with exceeding regret" that he canceled the talks.

Press secretary James Hagerly, who announced the decision, said he did not know whether Eisenhower would be able to reschedule the visits before election day.

Also uncertain at the moment, Hagerly said, is whether Eisenhower will be able to keep his date in Philadelphia Thursday evening for a major address on radio and television.

Hagerly said "everything will be decided on a day-to-day basis."

Fleet Speeds To Mideast

LONDON (AP) — Britain sent a massive fleet churning through the eastern Mediterranean Tuesday and began emergency talks with the United States and France on the new fighting in the Middle East.

Both Prime Minister Eden and French Premier Mollet held special cabinet meetings, and Mollet and Foreign Minister Christian Pineau arranged flights to London Tuesday to meet with Eden and Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd.

Mollet was to return to Paris to report Tuesday night on the situation to a special meeting of the National Assembly.

Both governments were in frequent contact with the State Department in Washington.

While the diplomats conferred, a huge British fleet steamed through the eastern Mediterranean toward the trouble zone. An Admiralty spokesman said it was engaged in "a full-scale replenishment and communications exercise."

The fleet left Malta Monday. It included two cruisers, two fleet aircraft carriers, destroyer and frigate squadrons, submarines, marine transports and supply ships.

Two French warships were understood to be sailing with the British vessels.

The United States also has its powerful 6th Fleet in a state of perpetual readiness in the Mediterranean.

Family Of Four Kidnaped During Store Holdup

STOCKTON (UP)—A family of four were kidnaped and held at gunpoint for more than an hour and a quarter Monday night by two gunmen who robbed the local Safeway store of \$500.

Charles W. Erickson, 35, manager of the store, his wife, Blanche, 35, and two sons, John, 10, and David, 5, were forced at gunpoint from their home and driven a mile and a half to the store.

Capt. Rex Parker, chief of detectives, said the pattern of the bold kidnaping and robbery was similar to that used in the robbery of another Safeway store in Vallejo Oct. 14 and an attempted robbery in Sacramento last week.

Erickson told police he had returned home about 9:25 p.m. when the door bell rang. He went to answer it but before he could get

it open, two men came crashing through the door panel. Both men were armed and one wore a Halloween mask while the other had a handkerchief tied across his face. One was described as bulky; the other as short.

They forced the Ericksons into the family car and drove to the store. The heavier robber took Erickson into the store while the short man drove the family around the block.

Erickson opened the safe and the bandit took about \$500, he said. The robbers then forced the Ericksons to return to their home where they were bound and gagged. The Erickson's oldest son, Bill, 12, returned home while his parents were being tied up. The bandits grabbed him and tied him up and then fled in the Ericksons' car, which was found abandoned later.

Demo Urges Special Meet For Congress On Mideast

Sen. Wayne Morse urged a special session of Congress to consider the Middle East crisis and said Monday night he was ready to break off his campaign to go to Washington.

"Congress should be on tap to be of immediate service to the government in case the crisis threatens a third world war," Morse said, in a televised speech at Portland, adding that he also had urged the chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to call an immediate session of that committee. Morse is a member of the committee.

His Republican opponent, Douglas McKay, said Morse was "terribly wrong in his willingness to sacrifice atomic leadership that is the most effective deterrent to atomic war that exists today."

McKay was referring to Morse's support of the Adlai Stevenson proposal to stop H-bomb tests. McKay, whose talk also was televised at Portland, said, "We cannot be sure of detecting Russian H-bomb explosions, if both sides promise to stop tests."

Three Republicans urging the election of McKay continued a fast-moving campaign. They were scheduled to speak in seven towns in the northwest corner of the state Tuesday. The three, Phil Hitchcock, who was defeated by McKay in the Republican primary, Ivan Conleton and Don Walker, all of Portland, spoke at Molalla, Silverton, Lebanon, Stayton, Sweet Home, Mt. Angel, Woodburn and Canby on Monday.

Democratic Sen. Richard L. Neuberger spoke at Pendleton, urging the reelection of Morse
