Planets Form Celestial Group

NEW YORK (UP)—The planets Venus and Jupiter and the moon early Tuesday formed a celestial pattern that won't occur again for generations.

A thick blanket of clouds kept residents of the New York metropolitan area from viewing the spectacle in the eastern sky. The same was true in many Pacific Northwest areas.

Venus and Jupiter have appeared from the earth to be moving closer for the past 10 days, and early Tuesday a waning crescent moon moved in to form an unusual glittering triangle with the planets.

James Pickering, assistant astronomer at the Hayden Planetarium, said a similar lineup of the two planets and the moon will not occur again for "generations."

Airmen Plant Automatic Weather Station On Pole

OVER THE SOUTH POLE

American airmen planted an automatic weather station at the South Pole Friday. The device, a six-foot-long equipment-filled container nicknamed the "Grasshopper," was dropped by parachute from an Air Force Globemaster in the first airdrop ever made at the pole.

Made of stainless steel, the Grasshopper has legs that automatically hoisted it upright after it touched the ice plateau. It will transmit weather data every six hours for the benefit of fliers participating in Operation Deepfreeze in Antarctica.

Ours was believed to be the seventh flight ever made over the pole. There were 43 persons aboard the giant 93-ton troop carrier, probably as many as there were aboard all the previous flights combined. Adm. Richard E. Byrd, pilot Berni Balchen and two others made the first polar flight Nov. 29, 1929.

It is a bleak plain of ice that stretches off monotonously toward a ring of mountains 200 miles away.

The surface is rippled—due, scientists aboard the plane said, to the polar winds that whistle in at right angles.

Dr. Paul A. Siple, who will head a party of scientists camping at

the pole through the antarctic winter to make observations for the international Geophysical Year, was among the Globemaster's passengers.

He estimated that the surface of the polar plateau is 10,350 feet high. Earlier estimates placed it at just under 10,000 feet.

As a Boy Scout, Dr. Siple first flew over the pole with Adm. Byrd more than 25 years ago.

Lt. Richard A. Bowers, Quonset, R.I., a young Navy engineer, will head a party of 24 men that will fly to the plateau in a smaller ski plane soon to build the base.

World Wheat Total Listed

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Agriculture Department said Wednesday world production of wheat this year was a record 7,519,000,000 bushels—120,000,000 more than last year.

Increases were reported in all continents except Europe and Australia where significant reductions occurred. Winter damage caused a smaller crop in Europe, while excessive wet weather was the factor in Australia.

The department said world exports of wheat and flour during the 1956-57 marketing year may approach the record of 1,066,000,000 bushels set in 1951-52, reflecting improved economic conditions in importing areas.

United States exports were forecast at 415 million bushels.

The department said indicated farmer participation in the government's new soil bank program may cut this country's 1957 wheat crop to about 740 million bushels, or 236 million less than this year.

A crop of 740 million bushels would be below market demands and would allow some of the surplus wheat stocks to move out of storage and into use.

POPE JOYFUL

VATICAN CITY (UP)—Pope Pius XII was joyful today at the news that Josef Cardinal Mindszenty had been released in Hungary. Vatican sources said the pontiff, who made the Hungarian prelate a prince of the Roman Catholic Church in 1946, was preparing to write a personal note of congratulations to Mindszenty.
