

Congressional Hopfuls Wage Intensive Drives

 SALEM — U. S. Reps. Walter Norblad, Stayton Republican, and Edith Green, Portland Democrat, appear certain victors in their reelection campaigns.

But the other two members of the state's congressional delegation are engaged in bitter fights against the same opponents they defeated two years ago.

Rep. Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg Republican and former editor, first was elected to Congress in 1942, when the Fourth (Southwest Oregon) District was created. His opponent is Charles O. Porter, Democratic lawyer from Eugene, who is waging an intensive campaign on the public power and Al Sarena mining issues.

Ellsworth, who never has campaigned much, is working harder this time as he seeks an eighth term. As the dean of Oregon's congressional delegation, he is emphasizing his seniority in the House and his membership on the powerful House Rules Committee.

Ellsworth defeated Porter 70,605 to 55,773 two years ago. Four years ago, Ellsworth was an easy 2 to 1 victor over Walter Swanson, Springfield lumberman.

The lumber industry in his district has boomed, the labor population has grown and Democratic voters have increased. Ellsworth faces a hard battle. Only two counties, Jackson and Josephine, have Republican registration leads.

The other congressman who is having a tough fight is Rep. Sam Coon, Baker rancher and Republican. Coon seeks a third term.

Coon's opponent is Al Ullman, Baker real estate man who has fought for construction of a federal dam in Hells Canyon.

Coon's Second (Eastern Oregon) District remains strongly Democratic. However, he defeated Ullman two years ago 43,731 to 39,475.

Coon and Ullman probably have worked harder than any other candidates for office in Oregon.

The power and farm issues are

predominant in Eastern Oregon. Norblad has a great personal appeal in his district, which embraces Northwest Oregon and is the only congressional district where the Republicans have a registration lead. Norblad always has won by overwhelming margins.

Mrs. Green, in the district embracing Multnomah County, first was elected two years ago, and thus broke up the Republican monopoly in the state's House delegation.

Her opponent is Phil Roth, Republican lawyer and former state representative. Mrs. Green has the solid support of labor unions, an important factor in Democratic backing from active workers in Multnomah County, as well as educational and women's groups.

Farm Prices Take Nosedive

WASHINGTON — The Agriculture Department reported Tuesday that farm product prices declined nearly 1 per cent between mid-September and mid-October.

This was the fourth consecutive month that the general farm price level has dropped.

The mid-October prices were still 2.15 per cent above those of a year ago, but about 27 per cent below the record high reached in February, 1951.

Farm prices as a whole normally decline during this period, reflecting increased supplies of farm products provided by the harvest season and the heavy marketing of livestock.

The October decline was expected to add fuel to the fires of the campaign for farm votes in next week's national elections.

Lower prices for meat animals, corn, potatoes, poultry, eggs and cotton more than offset higher prices received for dairy products, some vegetables, cottonseed and wheat.

Prices paid by farmers for goods and services used in family living and in production held unchanged between mid-September and mid-October.

The relationship between prices received by farmers and those paid by them put the farm price level at 82 per cent of parity.

Crewmen Saved After Air Crash

RIVERSIDE, Calif. — A B47 bomber crashed and burned at March Air Force base Wednesday but the four-man crew was rescued by a Fire Department crash crew.

The six-jet medium bomber was making a crash landing on the edge of the runway after developing engine trouble on a routine flight when it burst into flames, the Air Force reported.

The report said only that the crew members were rescued and taken to the base hospital.

Coast Guard Rescues Crew

NEW YORK — A Coast Guard Cutter rescued 33 crew members — one a woman — from a battered German freighter in storm-torn seas off Newfoundland Tuesday.

The cutter Chincoteague saved the weary crew of the Helga Bolten about 15 hours after the freighter flashed an SOS. The cutter had raced 210 miles to reach the stricken ship.

The 7,282-ton Helga Bolten — two hatches stove in by giant waves — was reported still afloat Wednesday with the cutter standing by. Two salvage tugs were en route to the deserted freighter.
