Off Street Parking Plan Subjected To Criticism

A wide source of opposition to the projected formation of a downtown off street parking district was heard Wednesday evening in the city hall when property owners within and adjoining the specified bounds of the district met to discuss plans.

Kasper Moty was one of the principal dissenters, maintaining that the off street parking which would be established would benefit only the Main Street merchants whose businesses are located from Seventh Street south toward the river. "If we're going to do it," Moty said, "we should go all the way and design a plan to provide parking and help all businesses in the downtown area of Klamath Falls." He pointed out that he would favor the opening of Eighth Street which now deadends at Klamath Avenue.

Originators of the plan had proposed that the area to be part of the district would be bounded by Third Street on the west; Seventh Street on the east; the north boundary would be the mid-block line just north of Pine between Third and Seventh, and the south line would run from Seventh Street down Walnut to Fifth, then to the alley between Walnut and Klamath on Fifth, and down the alley to the junction with Third Street.

In answer to Moty's complaint, Paul Landry said that the originators of the plan had considered a smaller area including only a part of the downtown section in an effort to expedite the plan, and counter the least controversy, and effect a means for stimulating the business on the lower end of Main Street. "It is a new state law under which the district would be organized," he said. "It has never been tested and the organizing group for the proposed district felt that it could better become a reality if confined to a smaller area as a means of reducing controversy and technicality."

Landry added that it was also felt that the businesses located north of Seventh Street on Main Street now have much more available parking than do the areas and businesses south of Seventh Street.

Also advancing the stand that it might be better to work with a plan which would help all of the downtown area were Jim Maguire, Ralph DiBattista and Sid Elliot. Following a suggestion by Rudy Jacobs, it was agreed that Landry would meet with Maguire this week and name a committee of business owners on Main Street north of Seventh Street. That group will then meet with proponents of the proposed district
