

Farmers Accuse Girard Of Shooting At Others

MAEBASHI, Japan (AP) — Two Japanese farmers today accused William S. Girard of firing at three or four other Japanese shell scavengers on a firing range the day he killed Mrs. Naka Sakai.
The testimony came at a marathon court session during which the prosecution in the manslaughter trial read a statement by the Illinois soldier's Japanese wife admitting they lived together for 17 months before their marriage last July 1.
The appearance of the two Japanese farmers came after the prosecution tried vainly to keep them from the stand. It asked that instead the court accept statements they made during the investigation last February.
Associate prosecutor Kakuichi Sugimoto contended the statements would be more accurate because "their memories have become hazy."
Presiding Judge Yuzo Kawachi ruled in favor of a defense demand that the farmers testify.
"The more witnesses and testimony the prosecution introduces the better," said defense attorney Itsuro Hayashi. "Discrepancies are constantly coming up which tend to discredit the reliability of the prosecution's case."
Hayashi tangled up the two farmer witnesses, Toshizo Koyama and Tatsuo Kani, on several points but stuck to their identification of the soldier.
Koyama pointed out Girard as the soldier who shot at him, Kani, and two more scrap collectors on the firing range.
Koyama testified Girard did not shoot before shooting at Hidet-sugu Onozeki, one of the scrap collectors. The defense attorney got him to reverse this statement.
Judge Kawachi asked Kani at one point: "Is there any possibility you are mixing up what you actually heard and saw and what you heard from others?"
"Yes," Kani replied.
Kani was not asked to point out Girard in the courtroom but testified the soldier who shot at him and other shell scavengers was the same GI who later shot Mrs. Sakai.
Girard has admitted firing the empty shell casing at the woman. He said he fired to warn the scrap collectors away and the shooting of Mrs. Sakai was an accident.

"We have a lot of fun on television," said KOTI-TV announcer, Bill Clark, when he spoke to the members of the Klamath County Council of PTA Tuesday afternoon, October 1, in the Shasta School gymnasium.
Clark, explaining the main "do's" and "don'ts" for television programs, pointed out that TV is a different means of communication than radio. The potential is for demonstration and visual effect. On TV programs, it is good to coordinate pictures, exhibits, objects, demonstrations, etc. with conversation. Have an "attention getter" at the beginning of the show, summarize at the end of the show, and "above all" be relaxed and be yourself. The day before a show is scheduled, Clark explained, the station needs to know the general outline of the script, how many people will appear on the show, and what props will be needed.
The meeting was conducted by the president, Mrs. John Putnam, who announced the weekly television program, "PTA in Action," has been changed to each Tuesday at 5 p.m. From October 7 to 16, station KOTI-TV will carry National PTA spot announcements.

Flu Reported In New York

NEW YORK (AP) — City officials say the expected Asian flu epidemic has arrived in New York, but thus far is mild and no cause for alarm.
Dr. Roscoe P. Kandle, acting health commissioner, said yesterday: "The long-awaited epidemic of Asian flu has arrived. Large numbers of people are now being attacked by the Asian flu."
"The disease is behaving as anticipated. It is mild, the fever lasting about 48 hours. Many who have been stricken already have recovered."
Dr. William Jansen, superintendent of schools, estimated that "as high as 20 per cent of our 940,000 pupils are out. . . . The proportion of our 37,000 teachers is more than 3 per cent."
Mayor Robert F. Wagner's office said yesterday that 10,822 persons have applied at 15 hospitals for treatment of flu-like illness from 4 p.m. Friday until midnight Tuesday.

False Alarm Sender Caught 'Red Handed'

New Service Office Open

Klamath Falls is one of the 30 Oregon communities to be served by the new southern regional office recently established in Ashland by the General Extension Division of the Oregon State System of Higher Education.
The office will be operated as part of the division's Department of State-Wide Services, which extends the resources of units of the State System of Higher Education—the University of Oregon, Oregon State College, Portland State College, and the three regional colleges of education—to presidents in every part of the state.
A southern regional branch office will be established later at Coos Bay. Head of the Department of State-Wide Services is Dr. Viron A. Moore.
Purpose of the new regional offices is to provide closer two-way communication between the people of the state and units of the State System of Higher Education. The regional offices will also permit an increased number and variety of course offerings in the localities themselves. Courses are already being offered in 70 such localities throughout the state.

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
