

Lost Hunter Found Okay

A 36-year-old Portland hunter was found safe Wednesday afternoon after being lost in the rugged Genhart Marsh area north of Bly for 24 hours. Billy Burgess, the missing man, was located by the search party in the Lee Thomas Meadows vicinity of the marsh.

Sheriff Murray Britton said his deputies reported the man in good condition. The forest service in the Bly area had been searching for the man late Tuesday and throughout the early part of Wednesday and requested more help when notifying the Klamath Falls office of the Klamath Forest Protective Association Wednesday afternoon.

Organizing into a major search party at the time of the man's discovery were units of the forest service, the sheriff's office, the state police, and the sheriff's aero squadron.

Burgess was hunting with two companions when he became lost.

DUNSMUIR—The possibility of bringing the fifth Boy Scout National Jamboree to Siskiyou County in 1961 will be explored by the Dunsmuir Chamber of Commerce.

Ed Scribner was appointed chairman of a survey committee for this purpose at the last chamber meeting.

Upon determining the facilities necessary, a suitable site will be sought and the means of providing roads, power lines, sanitary facilities and emergency medical care will be discussed.

Armed Forces Plan Salute To Outgoing Defense Chief

WASHINGTON — The armed forces mustered their crack marching units today for a farewell salute to Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson, their boss for more than 4 1/2 years, at nearby Ft. Myer, Va.

The 67-year-old defense chief will step out next Wednesday afternoon serving at the Pentagon post-poner than any of his predecessors. He will be succeeded by Neil McElroy, Cincinnati soap manufacturer.

At his final news conference yesterday, Wilson—who has been embroiled in a number of controversies stemming mostly from his peppy remarks—told reporters: "I don't hate anybody. If I have any enemies, it is of their choosing, not mine."

Although his 90th—and last—Pentagon news conference was generally in a light-hearted vein, Wilson touched on several matters that bulk large in national importance.

He pronounced the U. S. "safer today than it was when I came to the Pentagon," attributing this to "our better equipment and better military organization."

Wilson indicated that his successor, McElroy, will inherit the job of deciding whether the Army's Jupiter or the Air Force's Thor will be used as this country's 1,500-mile-range ballistic missile. He said the special committee appointed to make a recommendation on this question has asked for more time.

On the question of defense outlays, Wilson said he is ready to "agree with my military advisers that we have about reached the minimum" for such spending.

While saying he thought the upward trend of military spending had been halted, he said such outlays for the first quarter of the current fiscal year are estimated at about 300 million dollars above the amount contemplated to keep within a 38-billion-dollar ceiling.

The defense chief announced a new Air Force order limiting payments to aircraft manufacturers to a strict monthly schedule. The idea is to help hold down defense spending.

Wilson sidestepped a question about whether he thought a football game between the U. S. Naval Academy and the University of

Georgia should go ahead as scheduled at Norfolk, Va. The question related to the integration controversy.

A little later, he recalled that he went to school more than 60 years ago with a little Negro boy. "It didn't hurt me," he said with a grin, and "I don't think it hurt him, but I do remember that he wasn't the dumbest boy in the class."

Mrs. Wilson was on hand at the news conference, and on occasion interjected a remark when the questioning dealt with their personal or social lives.

Wilson said it was hard for him to say what he considered to be his major accomplishment as defense secretary, but he voiced the "hope that I have injected a certain amount of realism in the defense business."
