

Bruised Owls Look For Win At Portland

The OTI Owls are trying to shake off the aches and pains they received in the bruising tilt last Saturday with the Boise Junior College Broncos, as they head for Portland Saturday.

Coach Rex Hunsaker said none of the boys were injured, but that the reserve depth of Boise was too tough to cope with and that the team was pretty well beat after playing against such odds.

Hunsaker said he took 26 boys on the trip to Boise, and that the Broncos had 86 players on the bench, but could only squeeze 49 of them into the game time.

ex said the Owls played a good game, but they couldn't buck all of those fresh boys coming into the game. "They simply out-manned us," he said.

The defensive line again drew the praise of Hunsaker, but he added the fine play of the backfield this week. He said the team was up for the game and that it was OTI who brought the fans to their feet with the long runs.

The depth situation on the Hill isn't getting any better, as ends Lou Rutowski and Walt Butler have quit school and quarterback Charlie Garter is out with the flu, although he still might be able to play against Portland State.

The only major shift in the lineup will be that of Miles Boardman replacing Odie Canada at half-back. Hunsaker said Boardman is looking real good and that his running is showing some of the power the Owls need around the ends.

Saturday's game with Portland State will be the first Oregon Collegiate Conference game for both teams, with the Owls drawing a slight edge to capture the victory.

Under the coaching of Les Leggett the Vikings opened their season last Saturday against Pacific University, losing 18-25.

Since the establishment of the OCC in 1950, the Owls and the Vikings are all even in their series, each winning three and one tie.

Leggett will use 8 lettermen and 3 freshmen in his probable starting lineup, with the line averaging 196 pounds and the backfield 179 pounds.

EUGENE, Ore. (UP)—Illness and injury benched the University of Oregon's top leading left ends today and Coach Len Casanova called on a pair of inexperienced replacements to serve the Beavers against UCLA Saturday night.

Starting left end J. C. Wheeler has been hospitalized with the flu, and his relief, Alden Kimbrough, is favoring an injured knee. Sophomore Larry Hines and senior John Robinson—neither of whom has seen one minute of action so far this season—will take over.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UP)—Coach Tommy Prothro may be short a couple of good men when he takes his fifth ranked Oregon State Beavers back to meet Northwestern at Evanston, Ill., Saturday. Bill Kleaver, promising sophomore, will miss the game because of a shoulder injury, and outstanding back Earnel Durden is nursing some bruised ribs suffered in the game with Kansas last weekend.

SEATTLE, Wash. (UP)—Coach Jim Owens of the University of Washington is hoping for dry weather Saturday so his regrouped Huskies will not be handicapped in their game with Ohio State.

Luther (Hit and Run) Carr was moved into the starting left half-back spot Tuesday and apparently filled it well. Owens made no changes in his starting lineup Wednesday.

MOSCOW, Idaho (UP)—The University of Idaho Vandals got their Asian flu shots Wednesday, and rain further slowed their efforts to prepare for Saturday's contest with the University of Utah at Boise, Idaho.

Coach Skip Stahley said that first string right halfback Larry Norby, who injured his ankle two weeks ago, is now in good shape and will start Saturday against the Redskins.

PULLMAN, Wash. (UP)—The Washington State Cougars departed today for their game with the Iowa Hawkeyes at Iowa City Saturday, but they hoped to stop long enough in Denver to get in a short practice session later today.

Coach Jim Sutherland called the Iowa team one of the great squads of the nation and said, "We're going back east with the same thought in mind that we had last Saturday when we knocked off California."

BERKELEY, Calif. (UP)—The California Golden Bears are learning some new defensive patterns which Coach Pete Elliott hopes will slow down the offensive power of the Michigan State squad.

The Michigan Staters, who play Cal here Saturday, are scheduled to arrive this afternoon and plan to hold a workout at Memorial Stadium if they arrive early enough.

Big Ten Football Teams Lead All NCAA Statistics

NEW YORK (UP)—It's hard to get ahead of Big Ten football teams even on those rare week ends when they lose half their games.

That's the statistical story of the NCAA produced today in releasing its first major college team figures for the new season. Although Big Ten teams lost as many games as they won while opening their campaigns last week end, they led every department of offense, defense and kicking.

The NCAA's Service Bureau said no conference previously had enjoyed such a monopoly during the 21 years they have been compiling statistics.

Iowa ran and passed for 648 yards during its 70-14 conquest of Utah State to lead the major colleges in total offense.

Iowa collected 328 of its yards against Utah State in the air and that figure put the defending Big Ten champions first in forward passing. Iowa also led in rushing defense after holding Utah State to a net loss of six yards on the ground.

Michigan State collected 426 yards by rushing and a total of 555 while whipping Indiana, 54-0. This spree put Michigan State on top in rushing and second to Iowa in total offense. Michigan State also won first place in total defense by allowing Indiana to gain a total of just 80 yards.

Hunting Report

Hunting conditions are excellent in Central Oregon. Some nice bucks are being taken in the China Hat area, LaPine, the Upper Deschutes adjacent to Wickup and Wagona Butte. There are not enough hunters in the Deschutes Forest to stir up the deer or aid other hunters.

Some nice bucks are being taken in the Ochoco around Mount Pisgah, the steep north slopes of the main Ochoco and scattered areas in the forest, and some areas adjacent to irrigated lands on the upper tributaries of the Crooked River system. Here, as in the Deschutes, there are not enough hunters to move or stir up the deer. Hunting pressure is very light in all areas of central Oregon.

All portions of Central Oregon have received varying amounts of moisture from approximately one-half inch in the Cabin Lake area to over three inches in the Cascade areas. The area around Bend has received over an inch of rain since Friday.

Fishing has been very good in the Metolius River. The Deschutes River above Bend has also been good.

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Ford Relates Impressions Of Series Win

NEW YORK (UP)— Give our scouts a lot of credit. They sure brought us back a mighty fine "book" on the Braves.

Two of Milwaukee's left-handed hitters, Eddie Mathews and Wes Covington, though, are a whole lot better than I thought. Especially Mathews.

He didn't get any hits off me but he's got an eye like Ted Williams up there at the plate. He won't swing at a ball if it's a hair-line out of the strike zone.

Frankly, I thought the Braves' hitters would be easier to deal with than the Dodgers were in the past. But after facing them, I'm not so sure. Here I had always figured Mathews was some wild-swinging slugger, always going for the fences. But that's not the case at all.

My curve ball was my "money pitch." I relied on it especially often during the last four innings. From the stands it may have looked as if I was a little wild. I know I walked four men, two of them in the sixth. But that was only because I was trying to be too careful.

Those two walks in the sixth—one to Johnny Logan and the other to Mathews—put me in a bit of a hole and I guess Casey Stengel was concerned when I ran the count to 2-and-1 on Andy Pafo with two out.

He came out of the dugout and told me not to get careless with Pafo. He said he didn't want me to give him a good ball to hit because first base was open and a left-handed hitter, Wes Covington, was due up next. Casey said he didn't care if I walked Pafo. I knew that myself, though, even before he came out to tell me.

You don't read too much about out scouts who go out and send us back reports on the Milwaukee hitters. Johnny Neun and Bill Skiff did it this year and believe me, they came back with the right dope.

Whitey Nears World Series Hurling Mark

NEW YORK (UP)— Whitey Ford, the little southpaw who pitches the big games for the New York Yankees, seems to have a clear path today toward becoming the most successful World Series pitcher of all time.

The 26-year-old Ford's 3-1 victory over the Milwaukee Braves in Wednesday's 1957 opener marked his fifth triumph in a Series career dating back to his rookie campaign in 1950. He is only two victories behind the Series mark held jointly by ex-Yankee heroes Red Ruffin, and Allie Reynolds and should draw six to eight more starting shots before he hangs up his glove.

Whitey can expect to pick up at least one, and perhaps two more starts, in the current Series. And, unless the Yankees suddenly lose their magic touch, he can expect Series starts in four or five of the next eight years.

Ford may be one of the most under-rated pitchers in baseball because he never has acquired that well-known badge of the first-class hurler—a 20-victory season. The big reasons for this, however, are that the Yankees like to spread the work around among their pitchers more than most teams find possible and that Whitey suffered a sore arm at the beginning of the current season.

"I hope I never have to go through that again," he said. "I laid awake nights wondering whether I'd feel sore when I pitched the next day. I looked in the mirror and said, 'You could be through.' But I'm okay again now and I hope I've shaken those miseries forever."

With a six-year record of 91 victories and 33 losses Ford is the most successful pitcher in the majors, percentage wise (.734).

Yankee Odds Grow Better For World Series Sweep

NEW YORK (UP)— The odds-makers hung the spectre of a four-game sweep over the Milwaukee Braves today when Casey Stengel sent Bobby Shantz, a carbon-copy of first-game victor Whitey Ford, out in an attempt to make it two straight for the New York Yankees in the 1957 World Series.

Broadway odds-makers quoted the defending world champions, 3-1 victors in Wednesday's opener, as 6-5 to win the second game, 13-5 to take the Series and only 5-1 to wrap it up in four games. These odds reflected the general feeling that the Yankees cleared the way to their seventh world championship in nine years when Stengel when they made 36-year-old star Warren Spahn a loser in the opener.

Milwaukee manager Fred Haney, disappointed but far from discouraged by the first-game defeat, named ex-Yankee farmhand Lew Burdette to hurl the second game, and "get the Braves even." Burdette posted a 17-9 record during the regular National League season and will be making his first World Series appearance.

Haney is expected to stand pat with the solid right-handed hitting order that managed only five hits off Ford but Stengel was prepared to hit the Braves with his left-handed-hitting platoon. This probably means Harry Simpson at first base in place of the injured Bill Skowron and Jerry Lumpe at third in place of Andy Carey, with Tony Kubek remaining in left field.

Another crowd of about 69,000 was expected to be blessed with the "Indian summer" temperatures that marked the opener before the teams take America's greatest sports show on the road. Tomorrow is an off-day of travel with the third, fourth and fifth games scheduled for County Stadium, Milwaukee, Saturday, Sunday and Monday. The sixth and seventh, if necessary, will be played at Yankee Stadium.

Advance dope on a World Series probably never stood up better than in Wednesday's opener when the Yankees displayed their all-around resourcefulness and had a pitcher to control the Braves' power.

Ford and Spahn matched zeroes until the last of the fifth when Gerry Coleman, one of Stengel's platooners, led off with a single, advanced to third on two infield outs and scored the first run of the game when Hank Bauer picked Spahn's first pitch up the right center field alley for a double.

Ford started and finished strong but he seemed to be laboring in the middle innings when he gave the Braves three chances to score. But he threw a double play ball to Joe Adcock to choke off the first threat in the fourth, retired Red Schoendienst with two on and two out in the fifth and stopped Hank Aaron, Adcock and Andy Pafo in the sixth after walking Johnny Logan and Ed Mathews.

The Braves finally nudged Ford for their run in the seventh when

EAGLES LOSE TACKLE
PHILADELPHIA (UP)— Len Szafaryn, a tackle who came to the Philadelphia Eagles from Green Bay last August in exchange for halfback Bibbes Bawel, will be lost to the club for the remainder of the 1957 National Football League season because of an injured knee. Szafaryn underwent surgery on the knee Wednesday for the removal of a cartilage and repair of torn ligaments.

Schoendienst singled home Wes Covington, who had doubled, with two out. But by then, the Yankees had added two more runs on sixth-inning singles by Elston Howard and Andy Carey, a walk and Coleman's suicide-squeeze sacrifice bunt.

The victory was the fifth of Ford's World Series career and made him an obvious choice to pitch either the fifth or sixth game. Spahn can be expected to come back in the fourth game. If the Braves are trailing, and undoubtedly will start three games if the series goes the distance.

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
