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Wildcats Turn To Defense For Tilt With Oregon State

Coach Ray Elliot, hoping to get his Illinois squad onto the winning track, held a third straight day of heavy contact work and came up

with a new crop of injuries. The Illini, losers in their first outing last weekend, clash with Colgate Saturday. Injured in Wednesday's heavy workout were tackle Carl Johnson and Paul Adams and halfback Dale Smith.

There was no rest for Minnesota's Gophers either as Coach Murray Warmath sent the squad through a hard contact drill Wednesday, concentrating on kick returns and protecting the kicker. Halfback Ken Bombardier sat out the practice with a Charley horse.

Indiana, routed by Michigan State last Saturday, sought to develop a scoring punch by working on its aerial game. Coach Bob Hicks also held punt and kick protection drills and said his starting eleven would be in good shape for Notre Dame this Saturday.

Iowa's Hawkeyes worked on pass defense and offense in preparing for their game with Washington State. Coach Forest Eveshewski emphasized rushing the passer and secondary pass defense.

Northwestern devoted its practice to working out a defense aimed at stopping Oregon State's single wing offense. Coach Ar Parseghian stressed pass defense in the drill.

Purdue went through its final tough workout for the week in preparation for its conference opener with Minnesota. Coach Jack Mollenkopf said veteran right tackle Wayne Farmer would miss the game with a pinched nerve in his neck.

Ohio State's 38-man traveling squad leaves this morning for its Saturday date with the Washington Huskies in Seattle. Coach Woody Hayes sent the squad through a two-hour practice session in which first string center Danny James suffered an injured ankle. The injury was not considered serious, however.

Michigan's football team underwent its first contact of the week Wednesday, scrimmaging against reserves using Georgia offensive and defensive formations. The session was highlighted by the running of tailback Jim Pace and Bob Ptacek.

Michigan State's Spartans leave by plane for California this morning for their game with the University of California Saturday. The squad worked briefly on pass defense and signal drills Wednesday and Coach Duffy Daugherty named 14 seniors, 11 juniors and 18 sophomores to the traveling squad.

Notre Dame went through a lively scrimmage and a rugged session on pass defense drills, but Coach Terry Brennan said there would be no more heavy work this week before the Indiana game Saturday.

Giles Predicts Brooklyn Shift

NEW YORK (UP) — President Warren Giles of the National League confirmed today that he believes the Dodgers will leave New York, but denied that he said the league will have a replacement for them in New York in 1958.

"I guess what I meant to say was that there will be a National League club in New York eventually," he said. "I do not believe there will be a National League club in New York in 1958."

Two experienced sports reporters said Giles, in New York for the World Series, told them that he was convinced the Dodgers would be in Los Angeles in 1958, but that he also was sure that his league would still be represented in New York.

Los Angeles Heads May Switch Over

LOS ANGELES (UP) — Two city councilmen who have opposed the Brooklyn Dodger transfer proposal say there's a chance they would change their minds if a few questions could be cleared up.

As a result, Mayor Norris Poulson has announced he will invite Dodger President Walter O'Malley or one of his representatives to come to Los Angeles and talk over the deal before next Monday's showdown vote in the council.

Poulson made the announcement after talking Wednesday with Councilmen Patrick D. McGee and Earle D. Baker. They said their objections to the transaction might be withdrawn if O'Malley or one of his aides came here to clear up several points in a talk with the council.

Poulson said he felt O'Malley would have no reluctance about coming for such a talk himself or sending a member of his staff. "There is nothing to hide about this deal," the mayor said.

At next Monday's meeting, the council will hear final reading of the proposed transfer ordinance and then vote on it. Affirmative votes are needed from two-thirds of the 15-member council for passage of the ordinance.

Most of the opposition to the deal has centered around the real estate exchange that would be involved. The Dodgers would give the city their minor league ballpark here in partial payment for city-owned land that would be used as a site for a new ballpark.

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World Series Short Shots

NEW YORK (UP) — The New York Yankees have long been known as a "muscle" team, but the first extra base hit of the World Series opener was a triumph of "mind over muscle."

Jerry Coleman, the hustling Yankee second baseman, leaned across the plate in the second inning and gently stroked the ball between Milwaukee first baseman Joe Adcock and the foul line. Before Andy Paika, in right field, could come up with the ball, Jerry was pulling into second.

Warren Spahn was no easy touch for the Yanks even though they knocked the ace Brave left out of the box in the sixth inning. But he couldn't have been any tougher than the guy who pitched batting practice to the Yanks — Sal Maglie, a Yankee since Sept. 1 but ineligible for the series.

Sal beat the Yanks in the opening game of the series for the Dodgers last year, but he was the only member of the 1956 Brooklyn team that even got to suit up Wednesday. Spahn, apparently forgot it though. Shouting of 13 couple of reporters aside so he could see the batting cage, the Yank skipper said, "I gotta see Brooklyn hit."

The Braves praised White Ford to the hill — they said he pitched like a National League. Adcock, who went 0-4, said: "You know who he reminded me of? Preacher Roe, that's who. He was deliberate. Determined and deliberate. He works on you; gives you nothing good to hit at all."

Hank Bauer's RBI double in the fifth inning extended his series hitting streak to eight straight games. He hit in all seven of the 1956 contests.

Mickey Mantle's two hits in four tries increased his series' batting average to .271. The Yankees' star has 26 hits in 96 at bats — 15 singles, two doubles, one triple and eight homers.

Jerry Coleman's second inning double was his first since 1951. He played in the 1955 and 1956 classics but did not have a safe blow.

Whitey Ford's victory put him within two of the series' records. Red Ruffing and Alvin Reynolds of the Yankees each won seven. Whitey's a good bet to break the mark since he's only 28 years old.

Ford also reduced his series' earned run average to a smart 2.62. The lefthander has yielded only 16 earned runs in 54 2/3 innings while walking 17 batters and striking out 37.

Warren Spahn pitched exactly one more inning than he did in his first World Series assignment in 1948. In that one, he worked 4 1/3 innings and gave up three runs, Wednesday, he allowed three runs in 5 1/3 frames.

The last series game to wind up with a 3-1 score was the second game of 1954 when Johnny Antonelli of the Giants bested Cleveland's Bob Lemon.

Red Schoendienst's run-producing single in the seventh for Milwaukee's only tally was his 201st hit of the year. He was the only major leaguer to reach the 200 mark in the regular season.

Cards Interested In Robin Roberts

NEW YORK (UP) — Frank Lane said today the Cardinals are "definitely interested" in obtaining Robin Roberts but there were indications St. Louis might have to outbid the National League champion Milwaukee Braves.

Lane refused to commit himself on which player he might offer the Phillies, but the Braves apparently are ready to give up a pitcher plus infielder Felix Mantilla and catcher Carl Sawatski if they can swing the deal.

"I still consider Roberts a mighty fine pitcher even though he lost 22 games this year," Lane said. "He's the kind of competitor who could come right back and win 15 or 18 next season."

Roy Hamey, general manager of the Phillies, also thinks along Lane's lines in that respect and thus far has shown no indication he is ready to peddle the 31-year-old right hander, who won 20 or more games every year from 1950 through 1955.

The Phillies, however, are known to be in the market for right-handed power hitters and the Cards might be induced to part with Ken Boyer.

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Food Poisoning Hits Cup Golfers

WORKSOP, England (UP) — Three U.S. Ryder Cup golfers, including 1957 Open champion Dick Mayer were in bed with food poisoning and Asian flu today but doctors said they would be able to play in Friday's opening matches.

British doctors said Fred Hawkins and Dow Finsterwald were suffering from food poisoning and that Mayer had Asian flu.

The three were confined to their beds at the team's hotel. Doctors examined them Wednesday night and assured Jackie Burke, U.S. team captain, that all would be ready to play against Britain's professional stars when play starts Friday. The draw will be made today.
