Veterinarian Receives Post

Dr. John Schmidt, Salem, has moved to Redmond to serve as district veterinarian for Deschutes, Crook, Jefferson, Klamath, and Lake counties, the State Department of Agriculture reports.
 Dr. Schmidt will supervise work done by department agents in carrying out the meat inspection, auction market disease control and brucellosis and tuberculosis eradication programs. The permanent assignment of state veterinarians to various districts throughout Oregon will reduce the costs of carrying out the programs.
 The first of four veterinarians to receive permanent assignments as district supervisors, Dr. Schmidt came to work for the State Department of Agriculture in May. He was formerly in private practice in Merrill and Walla Walla.
 Dr. and Mrs. Schmidt and their two children will live at 353 South Ninth, Redmond.

Klamath Schools Expect Minimum Reorganization

There appears to be very little sentiment in Klamath County favoring additional consolidation of the school districts within the county, advises Carroll Howe, county superintendent of schools.
 The superintendent voiced his opinion that the school districts of the county would perhaps not be modified, largely because the Legislature's School Reorganization Bill which became effective in early September was not intended to alter the school structures within such as Klamath County.

Stock Feed Plan Approved

Approval of a livestock feed diversion program for the Oregon-California late crop potato area was announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture on October 1.
 The program is effective immediately and growers and feeders can participate as soon as the required forms are received by local authorities.
 This year the program will be essentially the same as the one followed last year and is designed to assist growers in marketing only better quality potatoes in normal food channels by disposing of culls and low grade potatoes through livestock feed, flour and starch manufacture.
 Under the program the department of agriculture will make payments of 30 cents per hundredweight for diverted potatoes up until December 31, 1957, 40 cents per hundredweight to March 31, 1958 and 30 cents per hundredweight thereafter for the duration of the program.
 The department emphasizes that the program will be operative only during the period when a price reducing surplus may exist, but in no case will it extend beyond May 31, 1958.
 Producers interested in diverting potatoes to livestock feed are required to apply at the ASC office and must comply with the rules for inspection procedures. The diverted potatoes must be U.S. No. 2 or better in quality and not less than two inches in diameter or less than four ounces in weight.
