

Jean Loveness Is Lovely Bride Of Roger Michael (Mike) O'Harra In September 14 Church Rites

MALIN — An event of the fall social season in Malin was the recent wedding of Ethel Jean Loveness to Roger Michael O'Harra in Malin Presbyterian Church.

Jean is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Loyal H. Loveness, well known Malin residents, and the bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray O'Harra, Pendleton.

The marriage was solemnized on Saturday afternoon, September 14, in a nuptial service read at 3 p.m. by the Rev. Johannes Hoitfeld, pastor of Orland, California Evangelical Lutheran Church, and a friend of the bride's family.

Escorted by her father, who gave her in marriage, the pretty blonde bride wore an exquisite gown of ivory satin fashioned with an empire waistline defined with a self material band fastened in back with a small tailored bow. The lavishly full multi-gored skirt billowed from the slender midriff to the floor length hem and fanned into a chapel train.

The bodice of imported re-embroidered Venetian lace was designed with a Sabrina neckline and long sleeves tapered at the wrist. A scalloped crown headdress embellished with seed and tear-drop pearl trim held her fingertip veil of filmy illusion. She carried an all white bouquet of stephanotis centered with a large orchid.

Basket arrangements of gladioli and chrysanthemums in shades of tangerine and cream, the color scheme chosen by Jean for her wedding, formed the floral background for the candlelight ceremony and complemented the ivory satin of her gown that reflected the glow of lighted tapers in floral candelabra.

Vocal soloist, Beverly Jackson, close friend of the bride from San Francisco, sang "I Love Thee" and "Thine Alone," accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Johannes Hoitfeld, who also played the wedding marches.

Mrs. Rodney Lyon was matron of honor and bridesmaid was Mary Ann Evans. They wore cream-colored sheath dresses of peau de soie with tangerine chiffon cummerbunds ending in streamers to the hem of the dress in the back. Their headbands were of tangerine chiffon with cream forehead veils and they carried arrangements of tangerine and cream gladioli.

Flower girls were Cathy and Vicki Loveness of Hillsborough, California, and Marilyn Loveness, all cousins of the bride. They wore bouffant dresses of white organza with headbands of white carnations and carried white baskets of flowers.

Pat O'Harra of Pendleton was best man for his brother. Ushers were Ron Loveness, the bride's brother, and Homer Winslow of Portland. The ushers were also candlelighters.

Mrs. Loveness wore an afternoon sheath dress of Riviera blue lace with a cummerbund of blue chiffon for her daughter's wedding. Her feather hat was of the matching blue and other accessories were black. Mrs. O'Harra chose an afternoon dress of black and gold lace with which she wore black accessories. Both mothers wore cream colored spider chrysanthemum corsages.

After the church ceremony guests were received in the lovely, spacious yard of the bride's home. The three-tiered wedding cake, encircled with a *l i d e n h a t r e n*, and tangerine gladioli florets, was served by Mrs. Alden Loveness, the bride's aunt.

Mrs. Vinton Loveness, another aunt of the bride of Hillsborough, California, presided at the coffee service; at the punch bowls were Betty Taylor and Mr. and Mrs. Harmond Loveness, uncle and aunt of the bride. Mary Taylor registered the guests and Marilyn, Cathy and Vicki Loveness passed the bridegroom's cake. Also assisting at the reception was Mrs. Robert Holl, aunt of the bride.

The couple honeymooned along the Oregon Coast and other northern points. They are now at home at 3359 S. E. Eighth Street, Portland, where "Mike" will complete his medical training at the University of Oregon Medical School. For going away the bride chose

a fall suit of beige wool with brown accessories. The bride attended the University of Oregon and Lessman's Business School in San Francisco and her husband was graduated from the University of Oregon where he was affiliated with Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity.
