

First Concert Program Of Season Big Success

Mildred Miller, whose middle name is "Carmen," added another roster of supporters to her already vast collection when she sang two arias from the popular Bizet opera for members of the Klamath Community Concert Association Wednesday evening at the Pelican Theater.

As though her remarkable mezzo-soprano voice were not weapon enough to perform the spirited

"Habanera" and "Gypsy Song," Miss Miller has wonderful stage presence, a tremendous amount of acting skills and dark haired beauty which was complemented by a vibrant red gown for her Klamath Falls appearance. The absence of a scenic backdrop on stage pointed up her dramatic good looks.

Miss Miller's forte is opera—and even her careful execution of the folk songs and pastorals which comprised the opening parts of the program were almost a "mark time" prelude to the performance which was to come. The full range of her colorful voice was first apparent when she sang the elaborately ornamented aria "Una voce poeo fa," from Rossini's "Barber of Seville." The Metropolitan Opera star demonstrated her versatile acting skills when she portrayed the changeable Rosina who is sweet and loving when she has her way; a shrew when she does not.

Miss Miller was equally at home with Jacques Offenbach's French burlesque opera number "Tu n'est pas beau," from "La Perichole," and as the vituperative Herodias in Jules Massenet's "Herodiade."

Her receptive audience was entertained further with the rollicking, contemporary composition, "Sweet Spring," by Serge de Gaslyne, and two delightful songs from Irving Fine's collection of "Children's Songs for Growups."

Miss Miller encored with two Mozart arias from "The Marriage of Figaro," a medley of Viennese waltzes arranged for her while she was starring on the Telephone Hour, and "If I Could Tell You," which she sang numerous times on the "Voice of Firestone."

Miss Miller opened the local concert season, which will include three other performances: Leonard Pennario, pianist, December 11; David Abel, violinist, January 22, and the Leonard De Paur Chorale on March 5.

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GED Offers Seven Classes To Adults In Basin Area

General Extension Division of the Oregon State System of Higher Education will offer seven adult classes in Klamath Falls during the 1957 fall term.

The adult education program is under general supervision of GED's Department of State-Wide Services. The department maintains a southern regional office at Ashland.

Courses are open to the general public and may be taken with or without college credit. There are no admission requirements for class members not working for degrees, and interested persons may attend the first class meetings without charge.

Four of the scheduled classes will meet at the high school. On Tuesdays, beginning October 8, Howard Hall, instructor in art at the Klamath Union High School, will teach a class in drawing. World literature will meet on Mondays, beginning October 7, and will be under the direction of Alvin Fellers, associate professor of English, Southern Oregon College. Arthur S. Taylor, professor of social science at Southern Oregon College, will teach a class in history of the Pacific Northwest on Mondays, beginning October 7.

On Tuesdays, beginning October 22, Dr. Edward M. Scott of the Oregon State Board of Health will conduct a seminar on problems of children. Students may register for this seminar under either of two titles — seminar: emotional problems of children or seminar: emotional factors in teaching. Offered at two different times during fall term will be seminar: problems in course of study preparation. The class will be under the direction of Gerald O. Cannon, assistant professor of trade and industrial education, Oregon State College. One session will meet on Mondays, beginning October 7, from 7 to 10 p.m. The other session will meet on Tuesdays, beginning October 8, from 3 to 6 p.m. Both will meet in the OTI office.

Seminar: introduction to technological education will also meet in the OTI office on Tuesdays, beginning October 8. This course also will be under the direction of Gerald O. Cannon.

Further information concerning these classes may be obtained from Charles Carlson, Klamath Union High School.

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Camp Fire Program Told

The Camp Fire training program has started, and the various phases of this program will continue through the fall and winter months. Those in charge of the training have worked during the summer to set up their schedule and will direct and, in some instances, teach the training sessions. They will be assisted by members.

Camp Fire Council training chairman is Mrs. Louis Holzgang. The district training chairmen are Mrs. Dale West, Merrill; Mrs. Martel Sandkvist, Dorris; Mrs. Ralph Hornesch, north and central Klamath Falls; and Mrs. Oren Storey, south Klamath Falls.

There are orientation classes to acquaint new leaders with the Camp Fire program and with their responsibilities and opportunities as leaders. It is required of all new leaders before meeting with their groups.

The basic training course is required of all new and flyup Camp Fire leaders. Assistants and sponsors are also urged to attend. Leaders who completed the course last year need not attend. Each session will be given two times each in a different district.

The annual national project for 1957-58 is "Meet the People" and urges the girls to become better acquainted with their community, their country, and our way of life.
