

# Yanks Slaughter Braves Pitchers For 12-3 Win

## Rookie Tony Kubek Raps Two Homers; Aaron One

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 6 (AP)—Tony Kubek, a 20-year-old Milwaukee boy, joined his home town's first World Series game Saturday with two home runs in a sobering 12-3 New York Yankee victory over the Braves.

The rangy crewcut, who played five positions for the Yanks in his rookie year but hit only three homers in 127 games, drove in four runs with his two blasts into the right-field bleachers.

Mickey Mantle also deepened the gloom with his ninth series homer, a 400-foot drive into the bullpen after Kubek singled in the fourth inning.

Six Milwaukee pitchers, starting with Bob Buhl, eased the Yanks' way with 11 walks as New York took a 2-1 series lead by romping to this lopsided triumph in the third game of the best-of-seven competition.

It had been a cold, gray afternoon and the lights were burning through the heavy gloom when the 45,804 wandered out of County Stadium after the 3-hour, 18-minute marathon.

Henry Aaron, whose two-run homer rekindled hopes in the fifth by making the score 7-3, left eight Braves on base. The National League homer and runs-batted-in champ failed with three on in the second and sixth and two on in the first.

Bob Turley was almost as ineffective as Buhl in this heralded duel of bullet-throwing right-handers. He walked four and allowed three hits before Casey Stengel brought in Don Larsen in the second.

Larsen pitched as though he were still throwing that perfect game of 1956. He blew down the first seven Braves he faced, running his two-year series string to 34 consecutive batters, before Johnny Logan hit a two-strike single to center in the fifth. Aaron then came along with his homer, but that was all.

A total of 19 walks by the six Milwaukee pitchers and two Yanks set a series record. The old mark was 16, set by the Yankees and Giants, Oct. 2, 1953. However, the Yank staff walked 11 Dodgers just a year ago Saturday in the longest nine-inning series game ever played—3 hours and 26 minutes. Milwaukee's wild men passed 11 Saturday and the Yanks gave up eight bases on balls.

The chill breeze and the top-heavy score drove many of the customers in search of the closest refreshment haven long before the final out.

They missed a little excitement in the dying moments when Eddie Mathews, still hitless in the series, opened the ninth with a walk and Aaron followed with a single. With one out, pinch-hitter Andy Paiko was hit by a pitched ball, loading the bases.

There seemed to be little wrong with Mantle Saturday afternoon. He walked twice, singled and homered before flying out.

Mickey's nine series homers moved him one ahead of Joe DiMaggio in the all-time class and tied him with Berra. Babe Ruth set the record of 15 and Lou Gehrig and Duke Snider each hit 10.

Stengel named Tom Sterviant, the top winner of his staff, to pitch today's fourth game. The 2-year-old right-hander won 16 and lost 6 in regular season play.

Whitey Ford, winner of the opener, was loosening up in the bullpen in the ninth and probably will pitch the Monday game which will be the last at Milwaukee—and possibly the last of the series. Manager Fred Haney had an-

nounced before the game that Warren Spahn, the 36-year-old left-hander who bowed to Ford in the opener, would draw today's assignment. It will be Lew Burdette in the Monday game. The hero of Thursday's Milwaukee victory also worked briefly in the bullpen Saturday.

It was the most lopsided score since the Yanks thumped the Giants 13-1 in the fifth game of the 1951 series although Brooklyn scored more runs in beating the Yanks in the second game last year, 13-8.

## Ducks Upset UCLA, 21-0 On Muddy Field

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 6 (AP)—Oregon kept its Rose Bowl hopes alive by upsetting UCLA in rain and mud last night, 21-0.

It was the second straight Pacific Coast Conference victory for Oregon, which previously downed Idaho 9-6 and lost a non-conference game to Pittsburgh, 6-3.

It was the first loss for UCLA after two non-conference wins. Oregon overturned UCLA, a 6-point favorite before the game, by driving 70, 33 and 63 yards for scores in each of the first three quarters.

The scoring was shared by fullback Jack Morris, end Ron Stover and halfback Jim Shanley, the latter piling up more than 100 yards for the hard-driving Oregon team. Oregon scored the second time it got the ball. Shanley, sure-footed despite the slippery turf, sliced off sizable gains through the line in leading his team on its 70-yard march.

## Spartans 19 Bears 0

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 6 (AP)—Michigan State's Spartans took to the air three times for touchdowns Saturday to whip the unexpectedly tough University of California Bears 19-0.

The nation's No. 2 ranking football squad, playing before a throng of 40,000 in Cal's Memorial Stadium, tallied twice in the first half on throws of 6 and 7 yards by quarterback Jim Ninowski. CHAPEL HILL, N.C., Oct. 6 (AP)—North Carolina turned a recovered fumble and an intercepted pass into touchdowns Saturday to upset sixth-ranked Navy 13-7 before a widely-cheering crowd of 25,000.

The impressive victory gave Coach Jim Tatum's Tar Heels a big hit back up the football ladder.

## Idaho 21 Utah 6

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 6 (AP)—Idaho turned two Utah fumbles into touchdowns, then went on to beat the favored Utes 21-6 in a football game here Saturday afternoon.

The Utes scored their lone touchdown on an 80-yard drive with Karl Jensen going over for the score from the one.

That counter came early in the fourth quarter and Idaho drove right back for its third touchdown.

The Vandals covered 77 yards with Howard Willis at quarterback, scoring on a left tackle drive from the five.

## Oklahoma 40 Iowa State 19

LARAMIE, Wyo., Oct. 6 (AP)—Wyoming had to pull all the stops to hold the determined Utah State team to a 19-1 tie before 7,300 fans in a Skyline Conference football game at War Memorial Stadium Saturday.

The tie pushed the Cowboy's streak to 14 games without a defeat. The last time Wyoming tied was in the 1953 Thanksgiving Day game with Denver U., 13-13.

Twice Utah State came from behind and their ace, Bob Winters, converted the extra point after the third touchdown that tied the score.

Winters' passing, coupled with a stout line, was too much for Wyoming during a big portion of the game.

Lenny Kanthal, Washington headweightholder, made a decision over Pete Reidinger, Seattle heavy-weight. They fought as amateurs. Both now are professionals.

## Oklahoma 40 Iowa State 19

NORMAN, Okla., Oct. 6 (AP)—A wobbly Oklahoma football team obviously off stride after a bout with the flu, caught a stubborn Iowa State eleven Saturday, and it wasn't until the late stages of the Big Eight Conference contest that the Sooners were able to finally pull away with a 40-19 victory.

Oklahoma, the nation's No. 1 team, won its 42nd straight game but it was the Sooners' second marked the previous triumphs. The alternates made two late touchdowns.

For the rejuvenated Iowa State team under new coach Jim Myers, the game was a moral victory. It was the first time since 1951 that a Cyclone team was able to score against the Sooners.

Both Iowa State touchdowns, one in the second quarter after O. U. led 19-0, and the second with less than a minute left in the game, were on passes by halfback Dwight Nichols.

The victory started Oklahoma on its way toward a 10th straight Big Eight Conference title and made it 60 games in league play without a defeat.

## Camera Says Hank Muffed Gil's Flyball

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 6 (AP)—So Henry Aaron caught Gil McDougald's long sacrifice fly in the first inning. Uh huh!

Aaron must have caught it. All six umpires agreed he had. No body contested the "out" call, not even the Yankees, who later complained about several of the umpire's decisions.

None of the 700 press and radio men from all parts of the United States, Canada, Mexico and the Latin American countries questioned the decision. As far as can be gathered, none of the more than 45,000 paying spectators objected.

Unfortunately, however, Aaron did not catch the ball—at least, according to a sequence of the pictures made by Associated Press photographer Charles Knobloch with a Hulcher camera.

This sequence shows quite clearly that Aaron, after slipping to his knees as he was backtracking for McDougald's fly, dropped the ball, then scooped it up quickly without any of the umpires, or anybody else, for that matter, seeing him do it. The play actually had no bearing on the game since the Yankees trampled the Braves 12-3.

The first picture shows Aaron on his knees, with the ball just about to drop into his glove. The second picture shows the glove on the ground, palm upward, with no sign of the ball. The third shot clearly shows the ball lying on the grass, an inch or so in front of the glove. The fourth picture shows Hank wiggling his gloved fingers underneath the ball. The fifth shows the ball nestled firmly in his glove, several inches above the ground.

The camera, mounting an 800 millimeter lens, runs 10 frames per second. These consecutive frames and action covered a half second for the five pictures.

The camera evidence notwithstanding, Aaron insisted he caught the ball.

"I definitely caught the ball," he said, sincerity dripping from his voice. "No, I did not touch the ground. My glove was flat on the ground. I caught it in the webbing of the glove."

When Milwaukee Manager Fred Haney saw the pictures, he said, "It just goes to prove we were lousy, but the umpires were worse."

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## Minnesota 21 Purdue 17

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 6 (AP)—Quarterback Dick Larson, obscured the last two years by the attention lavished on Bobby Cox, rallied a stumbling Minnesota team in the second half Saturday for a 21-17 Big Ten victory over odds-banking Purdue.

With Cox strayed at every turn by Purdue's charge defense, Larson took over with spectacular results. He raced 72 yards for one touchdown on a punt run back, scored for another that sent Minnesota into the lead for good in the third quarter, and sped over for four yards out for the clincher in the final quarter.

Purdue, leading 10-7 after a first half in which it swept through Minnesota's big linemen with startling ease, looked ready to spring a major upset against the third-ranked Gophers until Larson and its own fumbles shifted the tide.

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## Iowa Squeezes Out 20-13 Win Over Battling Cougars

IOWA CITY, Iowa, Oct. 6 (AP)—Iowa's ill-week football forces wheezed to a 20-13 victory over Washington State Saturday.

Iowa, crowded hard by the West Coast team, broke out of a 13-13 tie with four minutes left in the fourth period and brought obvious relief to the Iowa clientele in the gathering of 47,334.

The Hawks, who at one time early in the week had 27 players affected by the flu, took quick advantage of a recovered fumble for the victory drive.

Alex Karras, all-America tackle, snapped up Bob Newman's fumble on the Iowa 46. Eleven plays and 54 yards later Iowa had the winning touchdown on Kevin Furlong's drive from the one.

Karras put on the finishing touch with a 20-yard run. Iowa whose boss defense was its only weak spot in a 70-14 victory over Utah State last Saturday, did a good job against the Cougars on the line.

On the fourth down the Cougars punt and lost the ball on their 40. Iowa, plagued by four lost fumbles, played it safe and ran out the time with conservative ground maneuvers.

Iowa shot into a 13-0 lead by going 60 yards in 13 plays for a first period touchdown and traveled 65 yards on 13 more in the second quarter. The Hawks appeared headed for another touchdown in the second period but lost the ball on the Washington State 14 when Don Nelson recovered John Nocera's fumble.

Washington State, with Bum Aldrich completing four passes for 30 yards, picked up a touchdown in 19 seconds to go in the half. An eight-yarder, Aldrich to

Don Eilersick in the end zone, did the business.

The Cougars, with two minutes left in the third period, gobbled up Ray Jauch's fumble on the Iowa 30 and Chuck Morrell went for the one on the first play of the final period. Nocera smashed through and backed Eilersick's kick which could have sent Washington State ahead.

Jauch, the sophomore halfback whose play was marred by two lost fumbles, scored the first two Iowa touchdowns with three and four yard runs, respectively. He led all runners with an 80-yard total.

Quarterback Buddy Duncan, a 191 victim in midweek used his passes sparingly but effectively in completing five for seven for 65 yards.

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
