## New Library Dedication To Honor Sam Rayburn

BONHAM, Tex. (AP)—The home-boys in northeast Texas meet with government and political bigwigs here today to do honor to Speaker Sam Rayburn of the U.S. House of Representatives, Mr. Democrat to millions.

The occasion was dedication of the \$500,000 white marble Rayburn Library, a final "big dream come true," according to his own words, for the bald little man who has been a speaker longer than any other person.

Secretary of the Treasury Robert Anderson, in a prepared speech, said that "if there is anything that is bipartisan in Washington it is a bipartisan respect and appreciation for Sam Rayburn."

"Speaker Rayburn," said Anderson, "has risen above the things that divide us to the things that unite us. He has entered the small company of men who are recognizable landmarks along humanity's high roads."

"Mr. Speaker, here among your closest friends America salutes you."

Others scheduled to be here today include former President Harry S. Truman; Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson, a protégé of Rayburn; Gov. Raymond Gary of Oklahoma; Gov. Ernest McFarland of Arizona; and Mrs. Fred M. Vinson, widow of the former chief justice.

"Mr. Sam" has been a House member since 1913. He has been speaker, except during the Republican-controlled 80th and 83rd Congresses, since Sept. 16, 1940.

Rayburn started the fund for the stately white building with a \$10,000 award he received from a magazine for distinguished service in Congress.

Individuals from all over the country pitched in then and donated money until enough was raised for this "final dream" of Rayburn's.

The library contains historic mementoes of Mr. Democrat's 50 years of political service. Included in some 6,000 volumes are records of every U.S. lawmaking body back to 1774, the days of the Continental Congress.

## Russian Spies Sentenced To Prison For Espionage

NEW YORK (AP)—Jack Soble, a Lithuanian refugee who took shelter in America in World War II and then headed a Soviet spy ring here for a decade, today faced seven years imprisonment for his crime.

Soble, 54, was sentenced yesterday by Federal Judge Richard H. Levitt. His wife Myra, 53, and 64-year-old Jacob Albam, co-conspirators who had also pleaded guilty to spy conspiracy charges, were sentenced yesterday. Mrs. Soble was given four years and Albam five.

Each of the three could have been sentenced to 10 years. But Levitt said yesterday: "There is, I believe, strong indication of remorse on the part of these defendants in varying degrees."

After his arrest last Jan. 26, Soble underwent an apparently complete change of heart. Saying he deeply regretted betraying his adopted country, he helped federal authorities unravel the thread of his network of espionage contacts.

The government said Soble's cooperation helped obtain spying indictments against several others, including Alfred K. Stern and Martha Dodd Stern, daughter of a former American ambassador to Germany. The Sterns are now believed behind the Iron Curtain.

Mrs. Soble and Albam also were credited with helping the government uncover further espionage information.

Under their original indictment, all could have been sentenced to death.

The Sobles, sitting beside their lawyer, held hands as Levitt spoke.

A week ago, Soble made an emotional appeal for mercy before Levitt.

"I cannot forgive myself," he said then. "I had plenty of opportunity to straighten out my life since I came to this country and I didn't do it."

Levitt said in court: "It is axiomatic that this disposition must do justice to society, the nation and the defendant. No externally imposed influence will bring internally impelled allegiance to our form of government."

He went on to say, "Rehabilitation is not a factor here. In this instance we must aim at protection and deterrence."

This was the first major espionage case since the execution of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg in 1953 for stealing atom bomb secrets for Russia during World War II. The law was changed to permit death sentences for peacetime espionage.

The Soble and Albam were allowed to plead guilty to a lesser charge of conspiracy to obtain information vital to the defense of the United States, knowing it was to be sent to Russia.

Mrs. Soble was born in Russia and Albam in Lithuania. The Soble came here in 1941 and became American citizens in 1947—the year Albam arrived in the United States.

cessfully an intercontinental ballistic missile.

In his statement, Eisenhower outlined the history of the U. S. satellite program, dating back to 1954. He said that from the outset there was general agreement the program would go ahead "without interfering with the top military ballistic missile program."

The missile program, Eisenhower said in response to a question, still has top priority in both intercontinental and intermediate range aspects. Intercontinental by Sen. Butler (R-Md) that the Navy actually could launch a satellite at any time, Eisenhower said Butler must have more information on that than he does.

Eisenhower also dealt with these other matters:

Zhukov — Eisenhower said that if a Russian suggestion that Marshal Georgi Zhukov visit the United States was rebuffed, then he knew it was unintentional. Eisenhower added that he had no information regarding any rebuff.

The President's remark was in reply to a question about a reported statement by Nikita Khrushchev, Soviet Communist Party boss, that a proposal that Zhukov come to the United States was rejected by this country.

Eisenhower recalled that at a July 17 news conference he had told a questioner it might be useful for Zhukov, the Soviet defense minister, to meet with Secretary of Defense Wilson.

Eisenhower said he later discussed the matter with Secretary of State Dulles who told him the United States should beware of any bilateral (two-nation) talks which might disturb its allies.

At that time, the President went on, talks were going on in Britain among the Allies. He did not specify the nature of those talks.

Little Rock — Eisenhower said he certainly is very hopeful that the time may be drawing near when federal troops enforcing school integration at Little Rock can be withdrawn. But he offered no specific information or elaboration regarding this hope.

Eisenhower was asked whether in his opinion Little Rock's Central High School could have been integrated peacefully if Gov. Orval Faubus had not stationed the Arkansas National Guard at the school. The guard was used to prevent Negroes from attending classes.

Eisenhower replied that an answer would call for speculation on his part.

From four to six professional persons will meet with each discussion group, including Miss Louise Metcalf, psychiatric social worker of the Oregon Fairview Home.

## Migrant Workers Housing Improvements Ordered

TULELAKE — Migrant housing conditions in the Tulelake area this fall have been found to be below state standards and compliance orders for improvement of the conditions have been issued by William McCord, Redding, district representative, Division of Housing, who visited the area Tuesday.

McCord, in a telephone communication to the Herald and News today, said he found the present situation "not good," but that under the current extreme emergency, he has allowed those living in floorless tents at the Tulelake Growers trailer camp at Newell to continue to occupy the tents provided sawdust or other absorbent material is used on the floors to absorb moisture from the continued dampness.

Under the compliance orders issued this week at the growers camp and small camps located elsewhere in the Tulelake area, McCord, repairs are to be made on the basis of a varying time limit of from five to 30 days, all state requirements to be met before another harvest season, depending on camp conditions. Two privately operated camps owned by Tom Withers were closed several months ago and are not open for occupancy this harvest season.

Some families in the area are reported to have moved into bunk houses on farms.

Harvesting continued without interruption from rain all day Tuesday and crews were in the fields early today. Only a sprinkle of precipitation had been reported up to mid-morning.

Exchange of labor on bulkers between some farmers in the area will help alleviate labor shortages. However, should good weather develop and the harvest

## Man Jailed On Counts

DORRIS — Richard Lee Giffin, 23, who gave his address as general delivery, Klamath Falls, was taken to Yreka on Tuesday evening to start serving a jail sentence in the Siskiyou County Jail.

At his hearing before Judge Les Chase in Dorris on Tuesday, Giffin entered a plea of guilty to a misdemeanor and was given a \$50 fine, suspended. He had been arrested on a warrant issued by Judge Chase on a complaint signed by C. W. Champlin, Southern Pacific special investigator from Dunsmuir, charging Giffin with a felony. He is said to have hauled an object at the south bound Southern Pacific Shasta Daylight streamliner on August 28 just north of Macdoel. Giffin had posted a \$500 bail bond and was at liberty. The charge was reduced to a misdemeanor at Tuesday's hearing.

After sentence was pronounced, Dorris Police Chief Byard Kelly served Giffin with a warrant containing three charges which had been brought by California Highway Patrolman Virgil Winkelman Jr. The complaint alleged that Giffin had been issued a ticket on August 12, 1956 for having no vehicle operator's license, for driving at an excessive rate of speed and for failure to appear before Judge Chase on August 31, 1956. On his plea of guilty, Judge Chase sentenced Giffin to pay a fine of \$57 or serve 11½ days in the county jail.

Constable Brimmer then stepped up and read another warrant charging that Giffin was given a ticket by Winkelman on August 28, 1957, for driving while his operator's license was suspended. On this count, Judge Chase sentenced Giffin to pay a fine of \$105 or spend 21 days in the county jail.

Giffin told the court he did not know that he was driving illegally in California as his driver's license had been suspended in Oregon.

Sheriff Murray (Red) Britton said Wednesday, one of his deputies, Del Summers, has left for the Oregon State Penitentiary in Salem with prisoners Gilberto Urbana, Michael Contreras and Walter Scott.

Urbana will serve a 24-month term and his partner, Contreras, 18 months for the recent burglary of a Merrill home. Last week, the pair admitted guilt in the circuit court of Judge David R. Vandenberg.

The third man, Walter A. Scott, check passer, will spend a term of not more than three years, the judge decreed. Scott is also known as James K. Turner.

## New Defense Secretary Takes Over Tough Job

WASHINGTON (AP)—Neil H. McElroy, a soap company executive, takes over one of the toughest jobs in government today—that of secretary of defense.

The 53-year-old Cincinnati man is swapping a \$285,000-a-year job as president of Procter & Gamble Co. to take the \$25,000-a-year Pentagon post.

He takes over the job vacated by Charles E. Wilson, who held it 4½ years.

McElroy comes into the defense job at a time when that spot is particularly hot.

Congress members are demanding administration answers to several questions: Why was Russia first with an earth satellite (the Navy is in charge of developing rockets needed for that project)? Why has Russia apparently moved ahead in the intercontinental ballistic missile field and in the perfection of intermediate range rockets? How much is the administration's program of economy and military cutbacks involved in these and other related defense matters?

McElroy has been "cranking" for his new job. Between the time the Senate confirmed his nomination Aug. 19 and the middle of last month he visited the Pentagon frequently for talks with Wilson and other defense officials.

After those briefings, he toured military installations and aircraft and missile manufacturing plants.

To avoid any possible "conflict of interests" charges, McElroy has given up stock holdings in big companies which have large mili-
