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Non-Communist Forces Ready To Rule San Marino

SAN MARINO (AP) — Confident anti-Communists today expected to take over undisputed rule of San Marino by nightfall, ending a 12-year Communist rule of this tiny mountain republic.

Anti-Communists who set up a provisional "White" government on Oct. 1 gave the Reds until 6 p.m. to answer an ultimatum demanding "complete surrender."

The leader of the rival Communist regime, Domenico Morganti, indicated last night that his side was ready to give in.

"Really, we have no choice because we have been under siege by an enormous force of foreign troops," Morganti told a news conference.

Morganti referred to Italian police who have blockaded the 38-square-mile republic of 13,000 persons entirely surrounded by Italian territory. Italy and the United States have recognized the anti-Communist government.

Federico Bigi, unofficial premier of the White government, sent the ultimatum. He would not say what would happen if the Reds rejected it.

Morganti said peace talks were being held and only a few final details had to be worked out with the neutral peacemaker, San Marino Tax Collector Oliviero Cappelli.

San Marino became the only Communist-ruled country outside the Soviet bloc shortly after World War II. Because of defections, the Reds lost their legislative major-

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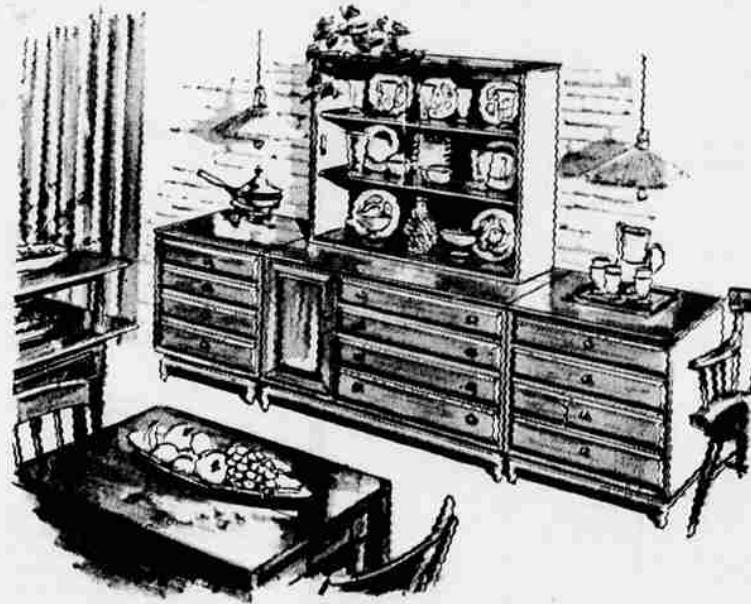
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
