

Iran Princess Plans To Wed

TEHRAN (AP)—The only child of the Shah of Iran, his 17-year-old daughter Shahnaz Pahlavi, will marry an American-trained agricultural engineer tomorrow. By royal standards, it will be a simple ceremony.

The Shah passed the word to make it simple because, he said, it is no pride to be king of a poor, hungry people.

The Swiss-educated princess will be wed in the Mirror Hall of the green and yellow marble palace to 25-year-old Ardeshir Zahedi, an aide to the Shah.

At dusk yesterday a dozen cars, led by Ardeshir's black Lincoln, drove to the royal palace laden with wedding presents and ceremonial accessories for the ceremony. The latter included a \$5,000, 200-year-old edition of the Koran, a gold-framed mirror and a gold chandelier.

The princess, who stands only 5 feet 1 in. in very high heels, met 100-11 Ardeshir in Germany when the Shah was returning home from a visit to the United States. They met again in 1955 when she returned from school in Switzerland.

Ardeshir is the son of Gen. Fozollah Zahedi, who led the overthrow of Mohammed Mossadegh's dictatorship that restored the monarchy in 1953.

Ardeshir was jailed by the Mosadegh regime and later fought against it. After the restoration, the Shah made Ardeshir his civil adjutant.

A graduate of Utah State Agricultural College, Ardeshir was top Iranian assistant in the U. S. Point Four program in Iran. The princess is the Shah's daughter by his first wife, Princess Fawzia, a sister of ex-king Farouk of Egypt. When Fawzia failed to produce a son, the Iranian ruler divorced her and later married Soraya, his present Queen. In Moslem countries a woman cannot succeed to the throne.

German Chief Unpopular

OSLO, Norway (AP)—Gen. Hans Speidel slipped out of Norway today after an overnight visit without encountering demonstrators protesting his service under Hitler.

Speidel, West Germany's top military man who now commands NATO ground forces in Central Europe, flew from Rygge Air Force Base, 50 miles from Oslo. He landed there yesterday to avoid a crowd waiting to demonstrate at the Oslo airport.

Speidel was traveling with French Gen. Jean Valluy, his NATO superior. The group drove to the air base at such speed that they shook off newsmen. However, there was no crowd at the Oslo airport, where the generals were scheduled to leave an hour later.

On his northern tour Speidel had been booed in Copenhagen, which Nazi forces also occupied during World War II.

About 5,000 persons demonstrated in Oslo yesterday against his visit and workers staged brief protest strikes throughout the country.

Speidel was jailed by the Nazis after the July 20, 1944, bomb plot against Hitler. He was teaching history when the West German government called him back into uniform in 1950.

Young Boy Kills Father

SPRINGFIELD, Colo. (AP)—An 11-year-old boy shot and killed his sleeping father, Det. Atty. Carl M. Shinn said today, because the father made him attend school.

Leonard Wear, 47-year-old father of 12 children, died yesterday of a 22-caliber bullet wound over the right eye.

The shooting occurred early yesterday morning in the Wear's tiny two-room farm home near Pritchett, 14 miles east of this southeast Colorado community. Shinn said the victim's wife, Eunice, 45, was asleep beside her husband at the time.

The district attorney said blond, husky Earl Wear, questioned about his father's death, suddenly burst into tears last night and cried: "I shot him! I shot him!"

He quoted the youth as saying he shot Wear "because I was mad at him for making me go to school."

Earl was entered in the sixth grade at Pritchett grade school last Monday. Shinn said the youngster was enrolled only after his father summoned him from a neighbor's field, where the boy had found work.

"Apparently the boy brooded about the money he was going to lose," said Shinn.

He added that the youngster signed a statement admitting the shooting. No charges were filed immediately.

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Free Polio Shots Slated

LAKEVIEW—A program of free polio shots for children and adults of Lake County between the dates of October 21 and 31 has been announced by Mrs. Donna Harlan, chairman of the polio immunization clinic. Also included in these dates is a chest X-ray program for adults, sponsored by the Lake County TB and Health Association, and scheduled for October 25 and 26 at the Lakeview Hospital.

The polio immunization program will be carried out through the assistance of the schools where each child will be given a slip to be signed by the parent indicating that the child is to be given the shots. If the child has already received two shots the third can be given at the clinic if sufficient time has elapsed since the previous one.

Parents will have further notification of the time and place for each clinic.

While emphasis is placed on preschool and school-age children, the drive is also emphasizing participation of adults up to 40. In connection with this, the county association has announced a combined program on October 25 and 26 when the adults may receive the free polio shots, and a chest X-ray, for a charge of \$2 per person, in the basement of the Lakeview Hospital. This can be accomplished through the first public use of the X-ray attachment for such work presented to the hospital this past summer by the association. Local doctors and technicians will handle the clinic, with clerical assistance by members of the Beta Sigma Phi sorority chapters, and members of the Business and Professional Women's Club. Registered nurses are also being contacted to help. The adult polio immunization is not in any way compulsory, but local residents are urged to take advantage of the chest X-ray. Mrs. Joan Bennet is president of the association.
