

Hunsaker Makes Adjustments To Strengthen OTI Line Depth

A lot of adjustments are in order for the Oregon Tech Owls this week as they get ready for their second home game of the season, Saturday night, when they host Eastern Oregon College at Modoc Field.

Coach Rex Hunsaker said the depth problem has forced him to make some of the boys play two positions, something Hunsaker said he has never done before.

Captain Allen Jones will play his regular guard position and will fill in as an end if needed. Reserve quarterback Allen Leach will also fill in as an end.

With only two regular ends remaining on the squad of 28, Hunsaker will also shift reserve center Ralph Norgaard to end, and end Norm Hooper will get some action at fullback in case he is needed.

The big injury sustained in the Portland State game was that of end Dale McCullough, who will be out of action for at least two weeks, and maybe more.

Halfback Charley Wilson has a hip injury, but Hunsaker said he thought Wilson would be ready to go by Saturday.

The backfield will get some added strength with injury-ridden Gary Riley back in action.

Halfback Miles Boardman is questionable, as he had two ribs broken in the Boise game.

The Owls popped up with their second win of the season last week, downing Portland State, 14-0, and posted their first Oregon Collegiate Conference victory.

Hunsaker said the defensive line won the game for the Owls, as the Vikings did not cross into OTI territory during the second half, until the final two minutes.

He said that the Owls drove to within the Portland State 30-yard line nine times in addition to their two scoring drives.

Rex said that it was the lack of ends that hurt the Owls scoring drives and that if the boys take to the adjustments made this week, then they should give Eastern Oregon a good tussle.

One of the Owls' scores against the Vikings was made on a punt return, the second such game in their past two games. Hunsaker said the boys looked very good on this play and that every man executed his block to perfection.

As for the OTI lineup, Rex said he will use either Boardman or Pekala at one halfback and Everson at the other. Center will be calling the signals and Ollison will be in at fullback.

Up front, the end positions are Utah's Winters and Statistics Lead.

NEW YORK (UP)—Bob Winters of Utah State retained the total offense and forward passing lead, and Wray Carlton of Duke the scoring lead, but there were new leaders in the other five departments of statistics compiled today for college football by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau.

Winters leads in total offense with 515 yards gained in 95 plays, 67 of them pass attempts. He completed 38 passes for 492 yards. Carlton scored eight points as Duke beat Maryland, and has scored 40 points in three games.

Bob Stranksy of Colorado leads in ball-carrying with 369 yards rushing on 60 attempts in three games. Gary Kapp of Utah State, favorite to lead in rushing, moved to the top in pass receiving with 17 catches for 269 yards and three touchdowns.

The new leader in punting is Dave Sherer of Southern Methodist with an average of 50.3 yards on nine punts in two games, and the new leader in punt returns is Oregon State's Sterling Hammack with 127 yards in nine returns. Billy Cannon leads in kickoff returns with 224 yards on six kick-offs.

Pacific Coast Football Briefs

STOCKTON, Calif. (UP)—Coach Moose Myers says the College of Pacific defense will have to "improve greatly" if the Tigers are to maintain their undefeated record by beating Kansas State here Saturday.

Reserve halfback Hank Wallace impersonated Wildcat star Pete Wilson in a scrimmage yesterday and observers said he "ran all over" the Tiger defense. A light drill is scheduled for today.

STANFORD, Calif. (UP)—Stanford Coach Chuck Taylor drilled the Indians on pass defense Wednesday in preparation for Saturday's game with air-minded Washington State.

Regular Stanford quarterback Jack Douglas was on the sidelines with an injury suffered last Saturday against Rice. Halfback Jack Taylor took over his position.

MOSCOW, Idaho (UP)—The Idaho Vandals are strong enough to beat Pacific Coast Conference champion Oregon State, according to Idaho Coach Skip Stahley. Stahley said Wednesday that although two first string players are injured—a situation that hampers the Vandals' chances Saturday—his team still could handle the Beavers.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UP)—First team Oregon State tackle Dave Jesemer, who injured a rib in the Northwestern game last Saturday, will be out of the lineup this week against Idaho. Coach Tommy Prothro reported Wednesday.

Prothro devoted his attention to finding a replacement for Jesemer and came up with George Enderle, 200-pounder from New Jersey, who seemed to have the inside track.

EUGENE, Ore. (UP)—A new Oregon passing combination, quarterback Jack Crabtree and end Ron Stover, is expected to

start Saturday's game against San Jose State.

Crabtree has waited two years for the starting nod at quarterback and Stover has been out of action with a hand injury. Coach Len Casanova sent the Ducks through a rugged workout Wednesday.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UP)—California and Ron Wheatcroft pulled a back muscle in Wednesday's practice and may be out of the lineup Saturday against Navy.

Wheatcroft was sent to the campus hospital for examination and it was not known immediately whether he would be ready for action. In Wednesday's workout, Coach Pete Elliott drilled the Bears on some new passing plays and worked them against the Navy offense.

SAN JOSE, Calif. (UP)—San Jose State, with four players out of the lineup and two slated for only limited action against Oregon Saturday, worked Wednesday on plugging the holes in their leaky pass defense.

Coach Bob Titchenal said backs Mike Jones and Fred Blanco and linemen Al Severino and Manuel Elias would be out of action. Back Harvel Pollard and tackle Bill Atkins would be ready for only limited duty, Titchenal said.

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Coach Henry (Red) Sanders has tentatively tabbed Kirk Wilson to start at tailback for UCLA Saturday in the Bruins' game with the Washington Huskies.

Wilson was selected over Don Long, the starter in the first three games, despite sparkling defensive work by Long Wednesday.

Long intercepted three of the first six passes in drills against Washington's passing attack. However, Wilson is the Bruins' leader on offense.

Pelicans Travel To Vancouver Saturday To Face Hudson Bay

Two win starved grid eleven will hit the turf Saturday night in Vancouver when the Hudson Bay Eagles host the Klamath Falls Pelicans at Kiggins bowl.

The two teams have played in much the same circumstances this year. They have taken on the top clubs in their respective states and have had a rough go reaching the win column.

The Hudson Bay squad of Vancouver has lost to Aberdeen, Camas and Kelso. During the same period the Pelicans have lost to Marshfield, Eugene and Springfield, and won their lone game of the season when turning back Redding of California, 7-6.

Pelican Coach Andy Knudsen said he has made some defensive lineup changes since last week's 31-0 drubbing at the hands of the Springfield Millers, and that he anticipates a tighter defensive game this week. As has been the custom all season long, the Pelicans will be giving away about 10 pounds per man when facing Hudson Bay.

Although the flu has taken a comparatively light toll, the Pelicans will go into the game sans the services of a few key men. Still on the sidelines with a broken hand is regular quarterback Frank Ballard; and regular fullback Bill Shreeve is out with a leg injury. Knudsen said Tom Ankeny will open in the quarter slot and Ron House will handle the fullback chores during the Saturday night tilt.

Regular halfback Richard Humphrey is also on the sidelines with flu and it's doubtful that he will see action Saturday. Don Story will handle the halfback detail if Humphrey is not up to par by game time. Also out of action this week with an injured arm is regular end Ted West.

"The fact that Hudson Bay has not won a game doesn't mean a thing," added Coach Knudsen, "they've been taking on the toughest clubs in Washington and they've been making all of them work for any points made. We expect a rough time of it Saturday night and we'll have to give it all we've got to come up with a winner."

The offensive starting lineup for the Pelicans will include Jan Cox and

Gary Kranenburg at ends, Nick Insley and Dave Vinson at tackles, John Hancock and Lee Stilwell at guards, Charley Carlson at center, Tom Ankeny at quarter, Ron House at full, and Don Story and Doug Van Buskirk at the halfback slots.

Going defensively will be Kranenburg and Cox at ends, Bill Montgomery and Ron Weber at tackles, Hancock and Dennis Crain at the guards, and Charley Carlson in the center linebacking position. In the defending backfield will be Estin Kiger, House, Blake Griggs and Smiley Herrera.

The Pels will leave Klamath Falls at 6 o'clock Friday morning and will work out in Vancouver that night. The Saturday night game will begin at 8 o'clock and will be broadcast into Klamath Falls over Station KFLW.

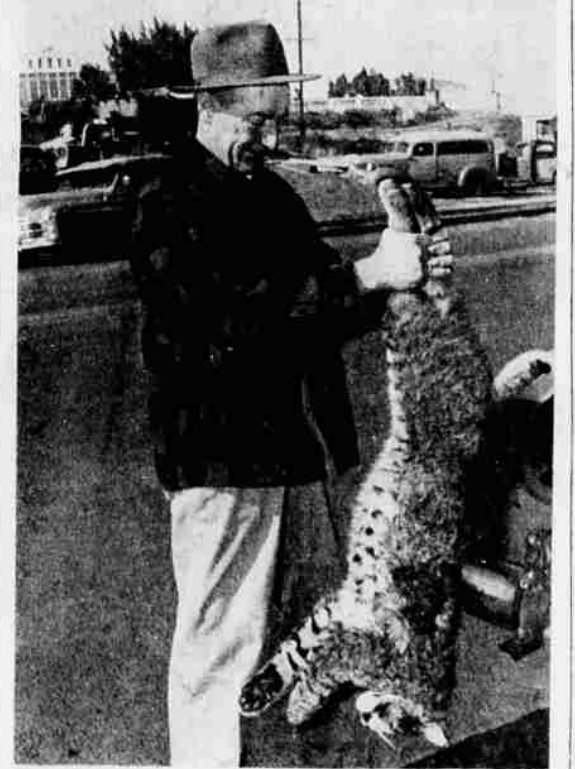

High-Flying Cougars Aim For Second PCC Victory

Coach Jim Sutherland says his Washington State Cougars looked worse in losing 20-13 last week to Iowa than in any of their previous games of this season.

"We stunk," Sutherland told an overflow quarterback club luncheon at Pullman, Wash., Wednesday. He declared he and his staff were correcting mistakes before the ambitious Cougars play Stanford at Palo Alto Saturday in their second Pacific Coast Conference game. They beat California 13-7 in their first.

The Washington State workout concentrated on passing—attack and protection for passers Bob Newman and Bunny Aldrich.

At Palo Alto, Stanford Coach Chuck Taylor returned Jack Taylor to signal calling and pass throwing. Taylor had been converted from reserve quarterback into a pass-catching flanker back in Stanford's early games.

First string quarterback Jack Douglas suffered a bruised back as the Indians lost last week to Rice and second string Bob Nicolet came down with a mild flu case.

Taylor's throwing looked good in a rain washed light contact drill. Fullbacks Chuck Shea and Rick McMillen, both injured against Rice, returned to practice and appeared to be running at full speed.

Flu victims with Nicolet were center John Thomas, and guard Don Dawson. Coach Taylor hoped they would be able to play.

Washington's Coach Jim Owens and UCLA's Red Sanders, whose squads met Saturday meeting in Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, worked mainly on defense.

"Our pass defense was ragged last week," said Sanders. "It will have to improve against the Huskies, especially if Al Ferguson is back in the lineup."

Tailback Don Long, with three interceptions, led an effective first string defense stand against the reserves, who could complete only one out of 12 tosses.

Owens said Washington's scrimmage drill included "defending the UCLA single wing offense." Dick Day and Don McCumby will co-captain the Huskies, who leave Friday morning for Los Angeles.

Pete Elliott worked his California Bears through a two-hour drill and a half hour scrimmage in a driving rain at Berkeley, where Cal plays Navy Saturday. A wet ball and heavy going hampered the workout. Ron Wheatcroft, senior end, pulled a leg muscle in the drill and missed scrimmaging.

Ron Stover, Oregon's top pass receiver, came down with flu at Eugene, where Len Casanova drilled his Ducks on pass defense. San Jose State plays at Oregon Saturday. Stover was in bed with a 102 degree temperature and Casanova said there was no way of knowing whether he would recover in time.

Bob Titchenal fielded only two teams at San Jose State's drill because of a plague of injuries. He said quarterback Mike Jones, halfback Fred Blanco, and tackles Al Severino and Manuel Elias
