U.S. Chance Of Firsts With Rockets Looks Dim

WASHINGTON (AP)—Spectacular Russian achievements in outer space have left the United States with only one first to win in the field—perfection of the 5,000-mile intercontinental ballistic missile.

If Russian claims are to be believed, there is strong doubt whether even that race is still open for the winning.

Communist party boss Nikita Khrushchev announced more than a month ago a Russian test of an ICBM. Defense Minister Georgi Zhukov said in Belgrade yesterday Russian forces have been equipped with first-class arms in-

cluding "jet and rocket techniques in the framework of which are also intercontinental ballistic missiles."

Neither claimed that Russia actually has ICBMs ready for use, as American spokesmen have carefully noted, but Khrushchev came up with a boast Tuesday that his Russians have it all over the United States in the long-range missile field.

The talkative Communist boss said at an embassy party in Moscow that manned warplanes are no match for Russian intercontinental ballistic missiles. He went further to state that "the age of bombers is over. You might as well put bombers and fighters in the museum."

The Kremlin chief was backed up in part by the United States Navy when it made public for the first time Monday the hitherto secret knowledge that the Soviets already have 1,500-mile ballistic weapons placed so as to threaten all major American and Allied bases in Western Europe.

The Navy revelation of the Russian missile achievement, following up Russia's launching of a satellite now orbiting the earth, may spur a long-delayed Pentagon decision over which of two candidates for an American intermediate ballistic will be chosen for development.

There is little likelihood that the furor caused by the Soviet achievements will hasten by many hours the perfection of a 5,000-mile American ballistic missile. As of now, the only American intercontinental ballistic weapon ready for testing has flown little more than 5,000 feet—not 5,000 miles.

The prospects in the American ICBM field are much better. The Army's candidate for the job, its Jupiter missile, has been launched successfully and with extreme accuracy at least twice. The Air Force entry, the Thor, has done much less well in its tests. But the Pentagon has delayed deciding in favor of Jupiter because some scientists and engineers have convinced top defense officials that the Thor, once all of the bugs are taken out of it, will prove to be a more advanced hydrogen bomb carrier.

No Demand For Buffaloes

LAWTON, Okla. (AP)—The great American bison went begging here Tuesday apparently very few people want him, even for free.

Last month 225 buffaloes from the Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge herd near here were placed on sale with zoos and parks getting first picks for nothing but transportation costs.

Individuals were also offered buffalo at a price on the hoof or chilled and in the carton. Since that time, only six buffaloes have been reserved for zoos. Eighty-nine have been sold to individuals or organizations, leaving 130 more to be disposed.

Julian Howard, refuge manager, who last year saw 200 of the buffaloes snapped up in no time at all, says he can't understand why his "merchandise" is moving so slow this year.

The buffaloes are being sold from the refuge herd to keep it down to 1,000—believed to be the largest in the world.

Last year 50 buffaloes were sent to zoos and parks. Most of those sold to individuals went to ranchers, although Howard said meat orders have come from all sections of the United States.

A live buffalo under two years of age costs \$125 at the refuge corral. There's an extra charge for dressing the animals.

"Buffaloes are not fit subjects for pets," says Howard, "but they make mighty tasty eating."

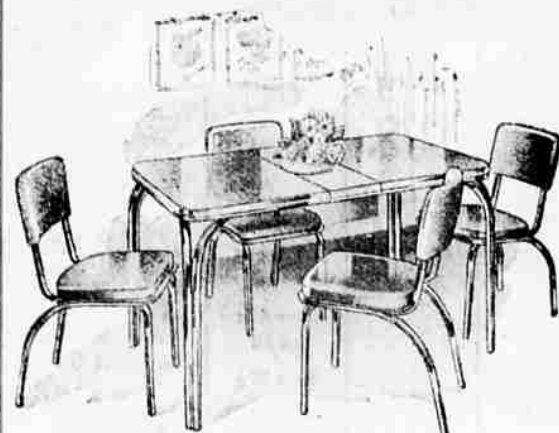
