

Food Contest Plans Outlined

MERRILL—Cash prizes of three dollars are being offered for first prize winners in each division of the potato foods contest at the Klamath Basin Potato Festival in Merrill, October 18-19. All foods entered must be prepared with potatoes or water in which they are cooked. Winning recipes will be published in next year's Potato Festival Program. Entrants in the junior division must be 18 years or under, in the senior division over 18 years of age.

Mrs. Lillian Geaney, Tulelake, is chairman of the contest. Exhibits should be in the Merrill High School gymnasium not later than 10 a.m. Friday, October 18. A typed or printed copy of the recipe must accompany each entry, name and address to be included on the card. All exhibits must be left in place until 5 p.m. Saturday, October 19.

Classes are as follows: soups, hot or cold; salad, hot or cold; hot dish, using potatoes and meat; hot potato dish to be served with meat course (other ingredients may be added); bread, enter one loaf, white made with potato or potato water.

Dinner rolls, enter three rolls made with potato or potato water; fancy sweet bread (cinnamon roll, coffee cake, etc.) using potato or potato water; chocolate cake (small loaf or one layer); using potato or potato water; cake doughnuts, using potatoes or potato water.

Judges are yet to be named. The contest is open to all interested persons.

Japan Travel Ban Issued

MANILA — The Philippine government today restricted travel of Filipinos to Japan. Informed sources said many reports had been received of discrimination against Philippine nationals in Tokyo.

A government announcement said Filipinos would be allowed to visit Japan "only for official business and for exceptionally meritorious cases." It explained the action was taken "to minimize the occurrence of unpleasant incidents affecting Filipino travelers."

In Tokyo, Japanese Foreign Office sources said the office could recall no cases of discrimination against Filipinos.

"The Japanese government does not have any intention of discriminating against citizens of the Philippines," one official said.

Workers Set For Harvest

TULELAKE — Clifford Jenkins, manager of the Tulelake Growers Association, said Wednesday that ample help is available to fill calls from farmers now harvesting in the Tulelake area as the result of a call sent out Tuesday. Between 20 and 30 migrant harvesters arrived in time for work Wednesday morning, Jenkins stated.

Some 40 families are now at the association's trailer camp at Newell and about seven or eight families are located at the Duckett camp.

Jenkins voiced appreciation to all those organizations and individuals who assisted with the problem of providing food and clothing for workers held up here by the rains. Peak of the emergency is past, he believes.

Directors of the growers association and two county supervisors, one each from Siskiyou and from Modoc County will meet here on November 6 for a study of the migrant housing situation.

VFW Leader Blames Army

HONOLULU (UP)—A Veterans of Foreign Wars senior vice commander says repercussions in Japan from the "Girard incident" were unnecessary. He blames the U.S. Army for most of the trouble.

John Mahan of Helena, Mont., the VFW official, went to Japan to represent the organization at the trial of Army Specialist William S. Girard, who killed Mrs. Naka Sakai with a blank cartridge as she was picking up brass scraps on a U.S. firing range.

Mahan said if the Army had gone immediately to Mrs. Sakai's family, apologized and offered to help, the Japanese people might never have demanded Girard's trial in Japanese courts.

Mahan left last night for Washington to report to legislative representatives of the VFW.

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
