Reservation Jaycees Work To Complete New Ball Field

CHILQUIN — One of the varied projects of the Reservation Jaycees has been to engineer a baseball field for Chiloquin.

The land for the field was given by Bill Lorenz of Chiloquin, but it was uneven and needed to be leveled and sodded. Three engineers from Klamath Agency, Remo Minato, Jaycee president; Dick Souers, ex-secretary of the group and the originator of the All-Indian Basketball tournament queen idea; and Nelson Sharp, Jaycee secretary, have donated their technical services to the project. A local contractor has volunteered equipment for the job.

Minato, who was elected to succeed John Heilbrunner as president of the Reservation Jaycees last spring, was born at Chiloquin and holds a position of leadership on his job as well as with the Jaycees. He is an ardent sportsman and was team manager of one of the local teams during the All-Indian basketball tourney. He is also active in the Knights of Columbus. He is 29, the father of three children and lives at Klamath Agency.

Another project underway by the Jaycees, with John Heilbrunner, a Chiloquin teacher, as chairman, is the establishment of overnight parking areas in this area.

"The tourist business is a large factor here," Heilbrunner commented, "and with more people traveling with trailer houses, a definite need for such accommodations is felt. Other Southern Oregon counties have provided overnight areas and there are no more suitable or beautiful spots in the state than in this part of Klamath County."

Meeting Set On Freeway

H. S. Miles, district engineer of the Division of Highways at Redding, announces that a public meeting will be held in Weed in the courtroom of the justice court at 11 a.m. on Monday, November 18, 1957, for the purpose of acquainting local officials and the public with a tentative proposed freeway route between Weed and Cougar on U. S. Sign Route 97.

The proposed location is approximately 16.3 miles in length and will follow generally the present location with realignment of short sections to improve substandard curvature and safety conditions.

No construction is planned in the near future except for the realignment of the substandard sections. The meeting is being held at this time to discuss the ultimate alignment of the freeway so that these interim improvements will become a part of the final location.

The public is invited to attend, and interested individuals will be given an opportunity to express their views concerning the proposed route at the meeting.

FARM WAGES RISE

WASHINGTON (UP)—Wages of farm laborers rose to an average of 75.7 cents an hour Oct. 1, the Agriculture Department reported Thursday. It was a record high for the date and 2.1 cents above the average for Oct. 1, 1956. A department farm labor report indicated wages of hired farm hands since the 1910-14 period have risen more than twice as much as the prices farmers received for crops and livestock.

No Polio Deaths Reported In City

NEW YORK (UP)—The City Health Department says polio has not claimed a single life in New York thus far this year.

The department said yesterday it is the first time no polio fatalities has been reported over the same period since it started keeping records 46 years ago. The department credits the Salk vaccine for the record development.

Last year in the city, seven deaths were blamed on polio. Over the previous seven years the average was 30 deaths.

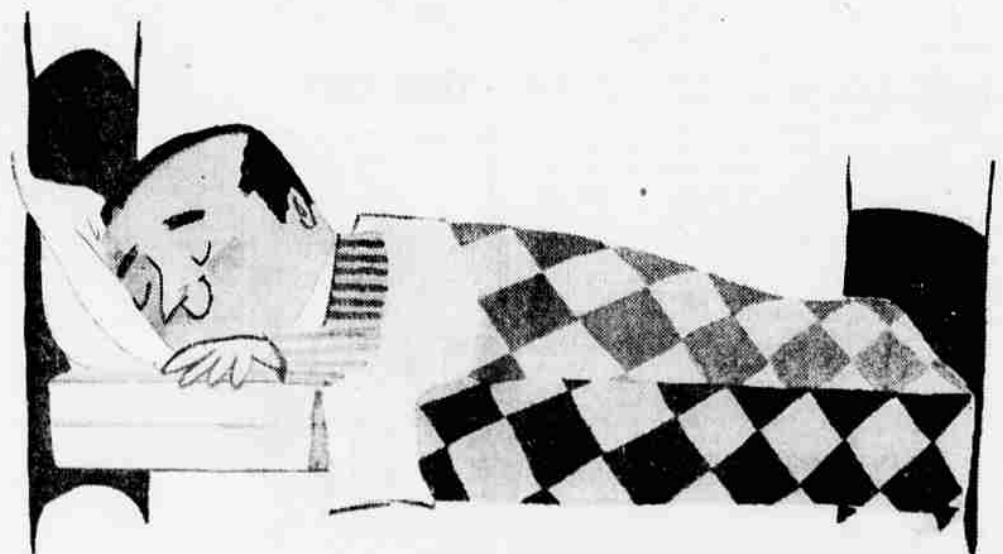

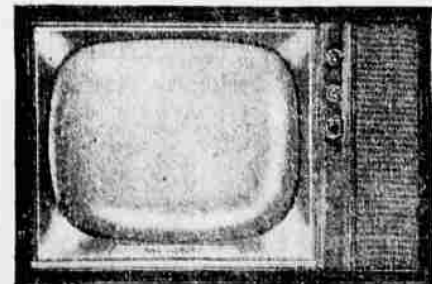
