

Lake Bull Sale Results Listed

LAKEVIEW—A 2-plus bull consigned by Hotchkiss and Maxwell of Lakeview topped the 3th annual range bull sale at the Lakeview Fairgrounds with a price of \$800. It was purchased by Ted and Mildred Graves of Burns.

A total of 29 buyers paid \$29,120 for 65 bulls, or an average for the sale of \$448. Most of the 15 bulls consigned were sold at private trading.

The grand champion bull, consigned by Double M. Herford ranch of Adams, was sold for \$725 to A. C. Lindsey of Lexington, Oregon, and the reserve champion, consigned by Harold Eakins, Grass Valley, brought \$750 from Morrow Brothers, Madras. Jenkins Brothers of Diamond were the heaviest buyers with 10 animals purchased for a total of \$5,090. Jess Roberts of Lakeview was next with six for a total of \$2,470. LeRoy Taylor of Alturas, California, and Ted Graves of Burns each spent totals of \$2,120.

The champion pen of two bulls, owned by Harry and Inez Obenchain of Bly, went for \$1,320 to Jenkins Brothers. Hotchkiss and Maxwell also sold a pen of two for \$1,320 to Ted and Mildred Graves, and the reserve champion pen of two, consigned by Harold Eakin of Grass Valley, went to Dudley L. Long, Silver Lake, for \$1,020.

Sales in the three grades showed 10 2-plus bulls averaging \$633; 25 grade 2 averaging \$487, and 29 2-minus averaging \$349. There were 19 consignors listing the 90 animals brought to the sale.

'Cinderella' Bandit Held
PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Detectives say they have found the Cinderella bandit who lost his slipper September 27 in an apartment hotel on Rittenhouse Square.

Cleve Farrington, 26, denied he was the man, but Detective L.A. Howard Brooks and Detective Joseph Hunt said yesterday the shoe fit and held him for a hearing today.

Farrington is accused of attempting to hold up Dr. Jacob Makler, a resident of the Rittenhouse-Savoy. He lost the slipper—a loafer for the right foot—in flight after the physician shoved him and yelled for help, police said. Officers said a button torn from the robber's coat by a desk clerk also matched those on a coat found in Farrington's home.

Reds Give Up In San Marino
SAN MARINO (AP)—San Marino's Communist government surrendered its power to a rival anti-Communist regime today, ending 12 years of Red rule over this tiny republic.

The Communist leadership announced capitulation in a proclamation read in San Marino's village square.

The proclamation said the Communist government had "decided to give up its useless resistance as a sacrifice to the welfare of the state."

The proclamation did not say precisely when the Reds would hand over power to the new government. But Communist leaders and their supporters were already seen leaving the government palace they have held since the leap revolution erupted October 1.

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP)—Police think one thief is strictly for the birds. The thief Thursday stole a truck loaded with birdseed.

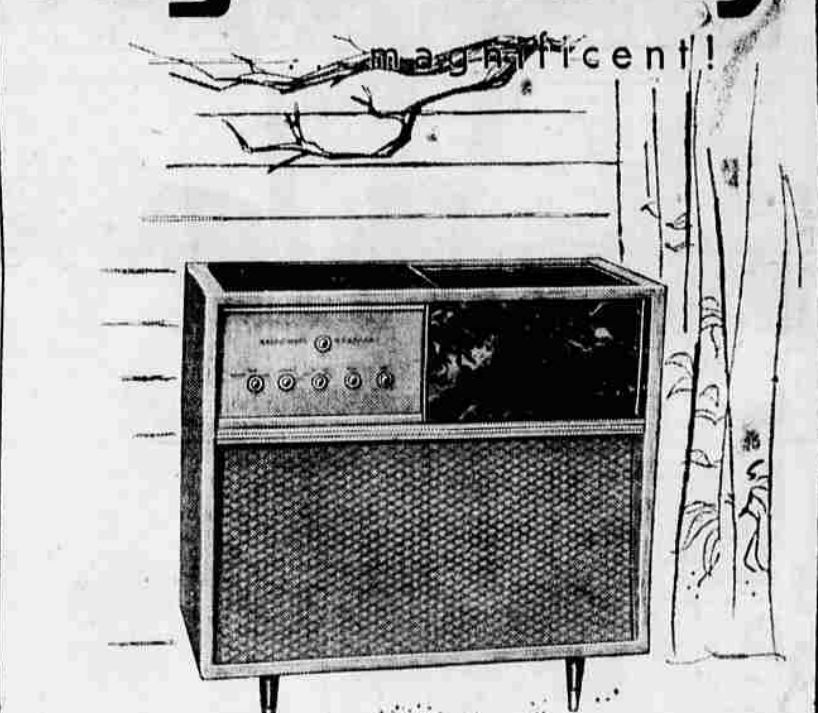

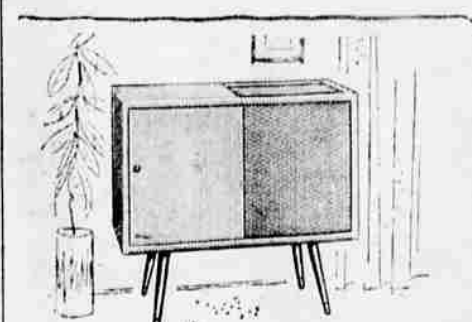
