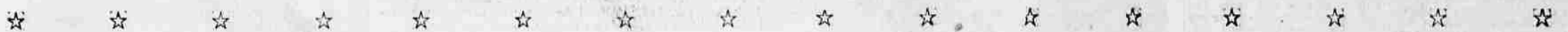
The celebrants are pictured above as they cut the first slice of their gold and white anniversary cake.

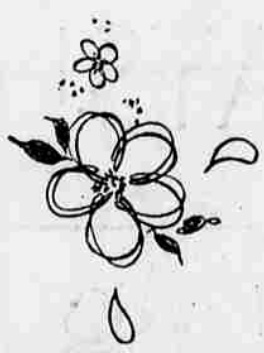
