KLAMATH FALLS GARDEN CLUB

"Chrysanthemums That Can Be Grown Successfully in the Klamath Falls Area," was the subject of a talk given by Mrs. Ray Peterson for members and visitors present for the October 7 meeting of the Klamath Falls Garden Club in the city library club room. Helpful suggestions and pointers the speaker gave were on culture, which included division and method of setting. Chrysanthemums should be set deep, she said, will do well in most soils but should have at least half a day of sun. Fertilize them with well

rotted manure, ammonium sulfate or ammonium nitrate. These should not be applied after August 1. Water should be applied generously in spring and summer but plants should have good drainage. Winter protection can be evergreen boughs, straw clippings or sawdust with nitrogen added.

Mrs. Peterson illustrated her talk with numerous blooms from her garden here and from Corvallis, including many new varieties introduced by Dr. E. J. Kraus of that city.

Many who attended the meeting will be encouraged to grow chrysanthemums because they learned that the blooming season is long, the flowers are long lasting and culture is easy.

Preceding the talk, Mrs. G. A. Krause, club horticultural chair-

man, introduced Mrs. T. B. Walters, a member of the club, who talked on Michaelmas daisies.

Mrs. Walters grows several varieties successfully in her garden but to bring more complete information, she went to Corvallis on a special trip to talk to Dr. LeRoy Briethaupt, a professor at Oregon State College for many years, now retired who has as a hobby the cultivation of this popular flower.

She stated the daisy is a perennial, easily grown, with a va-

riety of heights and colors ranging from white through shades of pink, red, purple and blue. Blooms are from dime to dollar size. These flowers need to be constantly divided, will bloom in shade if not crowded, are an asset to the flower border as the blooming season is long. Tall ones should be staked early.

Professor Briethaupt suggests a 10-year developing period before marketing a new variety. He works principally on non-staking and longer blooming varieties.

The business meeting was presided over by Mrs. Oliver Spiker, president.

Plans were discussed for the November 4 show of Thanksgiving and Mrs. Hugh O'Connor, landscape chairman, reported on the progress of the planning and planting of the planter boxes on either side of the front steps of the city hall. 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Pastor Plans Alaska Tour

The Rev. Dale Hewitt, pastor of the Klamath Falls First Presbyterian Church is one of 25 Presbyterian ministers to be named to an important assignment, the third annual preaching mission in Alaska. The pastors will conduct preaching service over the Alaskan Territory from October 29 to October 27.

Following completion of their ministry, the missionaries will tour the work of the Presbyterian Church in Fairbanks, Anchorage, and Sitka.

Rev. Hewitt has been assigned to the Chapel by the Lake, Auke Bay, 12 miles out of Juneau, capital of Alaska. The congregation there is completing a new log chapel, started two years ago.

Rev. and Mrs. Hewitt will leave Klamath Falls October 15 to meet other ministers in Seattle for an orientation period October 17. The mission and tour of Alaska will start on October 18 and will be completed October 31. Mrs. Hewitt will return to Klamath Falls for the weekend after a brief stay in Seattle. The First Presbyterian Church congregation has released Rev. Hewitt for the assignment and has underwritten his traveling expenses.
