

# John Unitas Shines For Baltimore Colts

Johnny Unitas was quarterbacking a semi-pro football team two years ago. He was a washout with the Pittsburgh Steelers who had drafted him from the University of Louisville.

But the 6-foot, 1-inch passer today was magician-in-chief of the Baltimore Colts, leaders of the National Football League's Western Conference with a 3-0 record.

Unitas, 24, threw two touchdown passes yesterday in Milwaukee, where the Colts burst out for 38 points in the second half to crush Green Bay 45-17.

Weeb Ewbank, Colt coach, picked Unitas off the sandlots last year as insurance when quarterback Gary Kerkorian quit the Colts to study law. Unitas took over when regular George Shaw was hurt and stayed the rest of the season to hurl nine touchdowns and complete 110 of 198 passes to rank sixth among the league's passers.

Yesterday's scoring tosses increased to eight his touchdown passes in three games. His pace could bring him close to former Chicago Bear Sid Luckman's 1943 record of 28 touchdown throws in one season.

In other league games, the Cleveland Browns won their third against the last-place Philadelphia Eagles 24-7 to stay the undefeated Eastern Conference leaders.

Detroit tripped Los Angeles 10-7 and San Francisco upset the winless Bears 21-17 with a touchdown in the final 27 seconds. They kept close to Baltimore with 2-1 records.

Defending champion New York Giants outdistanced Washington 24-20 and coach Buddy Parker's reconstructed Steelers overcame the Chicago Cardinals 29-20. Each remained a game behind the Browns with 2-1 marks.

The Colts trailed 10-7 at the half. But Alan Ameche bulled one yard three times for touchdowns and Jim Mutscheller caught scoring passes from Unitas and Shaw to smash open the game. Mutscheller caught a first period Unitas pass to give the Colts a 7-3 lead.

It was the fourth Colt victory in 16 road games over four seasons. Baltimore's inability to win away from home has kept the Colts in the second division.

The Eagles (0-2) suffered most in a fourth quarter melee which emptied both benches at Cleveland. Four Eagles were ejected by officials. Three Browns followed. The Eagles haven't won since last November.

The Browns' quarterback Tom O'Connell threw to fullback Jim Brown to cap a 69-yard opening drive. Chet Hanulak raced 64 yards in the first period for the second touchdown. Billy Reynolds ran five yards for the third Brown touchdown after Lou Groza kicked a 22-yard field goal, his sixth of the season.

Charley Conerly completed 11 of 13 passes and played the entire game on offense for the Giants at Washington. He filled in for the injured Don Heinrich.

Frank Gifford threw to Bob Schnelker to complete a 66-yard scoring play the first time the Giants moved the ball. Conerly also threw a scoring pass to Schnelker and Gifford plunged for the third touchdown. Ben Agajanian kicked a 50-yard field goal in the fourth period to wind up the Giant scoring.

Quarterback Y. A. Tittle, always key man in the 49er attack, connected with rookie R. C. "Overdrive" Owens for the touchdown which cost the Bears their third defeat. The Bears won the Western title last year.

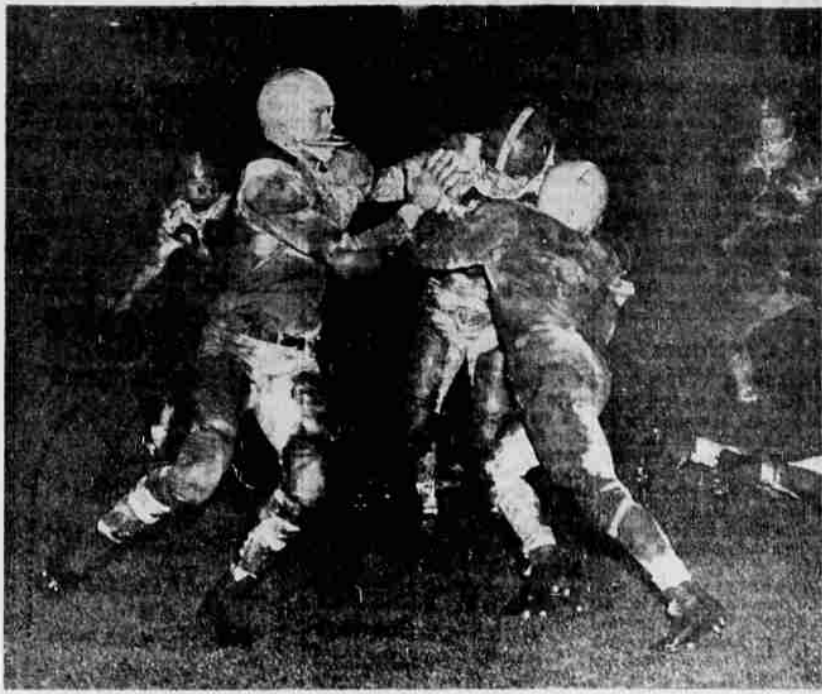
Owens was on his knees in the end zone when he caught the pass, the second scoring throw he had caught off Tittle. The Bears led 17-14 on George Bland's field goal in the fourth quarter after trailing 14-7 at halftime.

The Lions stopped Los Angeles (1-2) at Detroit by intercepting six Ram passes and scoring 10 points in the second period. Tobin Rote threw to Jerry Reichow for the Lion touchdown and Bobby Layne kicked a 23-yard field goal. Detroit's secondary has intercepted 14 passes in three games.

Yale Lary burgled two, the first of which led to the Lion touchdown when he ran 63 yards to the Ram 16.

Billy Wells raced 96 yards to score in the opening period for the Steelers at Pittsburgh. The kickoff return was the longest in Steeler history. The Steelers, smothering Ollie Matson's running game, led 26-6 at halftime. Matson ran nine times, gained 12 yards.

## Oregon, Washington State Tilt May Decide Bowl Trip

The first bowl team of the year probably will be decided when Oregon and Washington State meet at Pullman, Wash., Saturday. It's early in the season to be talking about bowls, but the unique situation in the Pacific Coast Conference has left only four teams eligible for the Rose Bowl.

Defending champion Oregon State isn't eligible because of a rule prohibiting a team from playing in the Rose Bowl two years running. UCLA, Southern California and Washington all are barred because of assorted subsidization sins.

That leaves Washington State, Oregon, California and Stanford fighting for the plum.

If Washington State gets by Oregon, the Cougars are just about in because they have already beaten both California and Stanford.

Washington State hasn't appeared in the Rose Bowl since 1931 when it lost to Alabama. Back in 1916, the Cougars won their only Rose Bowl game, a 14-0 triumph over Brown.

The celebration in Pullman last Saturday after the home folks heard of the Cougars' 21-16 victory over Stanford at Palo Alto, almost matched that big blowout.

Meanwhile, it begins to appear that Oklahoma is not quite up to some of the Bud Wilkinson teams of the past. The Sooners whipped Texas, 21-7, Saturday, but they had to work to do it. More significant, they are resorting more and more to passes instead of holding onto the ball and grinding out yardage on the ground.

The significance of all this is that Michigan State, which has fashioned a real powerhouse, stands a good chance of winning the mythical national championship when all the returns are in. The Spartans smothered Michigan 35-6 Saturday.
