

Several Auto Accidents Reported Over Weekend

Sunday's rain and poor visibility caused several accidents which injured five people, one of them a 13-year-old boy on a bicycle, according to the Oregon State Police. No one sustained serious injuries, police said.

The lad is Paul Wunder, 3404 Shasta Way, who was struck by a vehicle driven by Victor W. Smith, 26, 1302 Ward Street. Investigating officers said Smith, traveling east on Shasta Way, and in a row of five cars, pulled out to pass and struck the boy. Officers added that the youth had no tail light on his bicycle and that Smith had told the officers that he did not see the cyclist until he was about 30 feet from him. The boy is in the Klamath Valley Hospital undergoing treatment for lacerations and a fractured hip, according to hospital attendants.

In what could be termed a freak

accident, three California cars piled up on Highway 97 and Kirk Junction, approximately 40 miles north of here, late Sunday evening. Police blamed a slick spot in the road.

According to the state police, a northbound car driven by Nettie Christensen, 72, of San Francisco, hit the slick spot, slid to the left, turned around and then rolled off the embankment and overturned. A passenger, Mrs. Christensen's husband, John, 73, was uninjured.

The second car, was driven by George T. Lee, 33. With him were Helen Lee, 27, and Elizabeth Lee, 28, all of Richmond. Police said the Lees stopped to aid the Christensens, when a vehicle driven by Barbara Hauge, 34, also of San Francisco, hit the icy spot, and collided with the parked Lee vehicle. Mrs. Hauge's husband, Clayton, 30, who was a passenger in the rear seat, was thrown from the vehicle and was taken to the Klamath Valley Hospital, as was Mrs. Christensen. Both were treated and released, attendants reported.

Investigating officers also reported another accident involving one car, driven by Francis M. Tanner, General Delivery, Malin. Police said Tanner failed to stop at the stop sign on the road intersecting with the state line road, and his northbound car plunged over an embankment and landed upside down. A passenger, Richard Mortland, was injured. Tanner was taken to Klamath Valley Hospital by Felix Peace of Peace Ambulance and was treated and released.

Shortly thereafter, two cars collided on icy pavement, one mile south of Kirk Junction, not far from where three cars had piled up earlier in the day.

A vehicle driven by Birdie H. Peterson, of Cupertino, California, and traveling north on Highway 97, slid on the pavement and collided with a vehicle driven by George C. French, Peshastin, Washington. Mrs. Peterson was treated in the hospital and released. French was uninjured.

Late Sunday night, a Greyhound bus and a vehicle driven by Frank M. McEnery, 65, 2202 Madison Street, collided, when, police said, McEnery apparently crossed over the double line and hit the bus, three miles west of the Klamath River Bridge on Highway 66.

McEnery's car crossed over the road and hit the guard rail, police said. He was cited for failure to drive on the right hand side of the road. Neither bus driver Thomas J. Cook, 33, of Medford nor McEnery were injured, state police added.

Film Slated By Church

Because of winter weather there were only 200 delegates in attendance.



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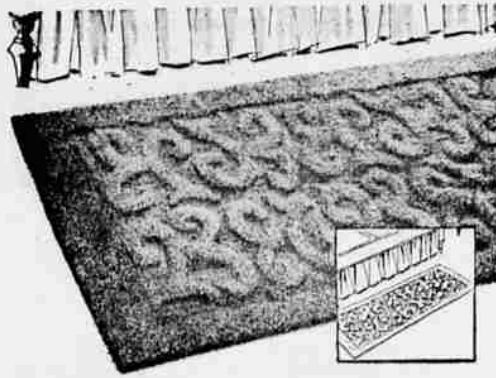
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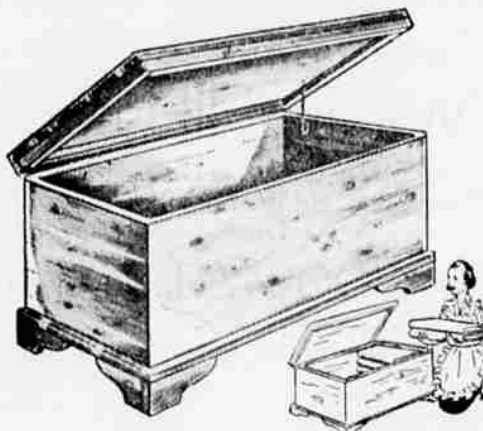
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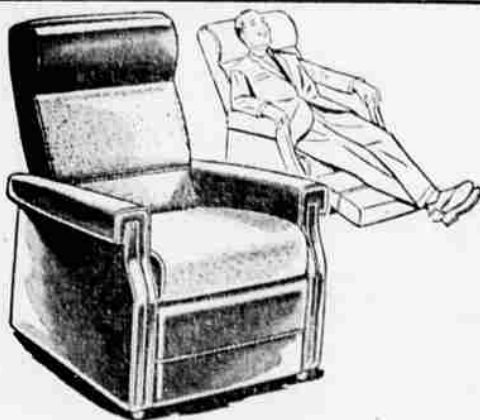
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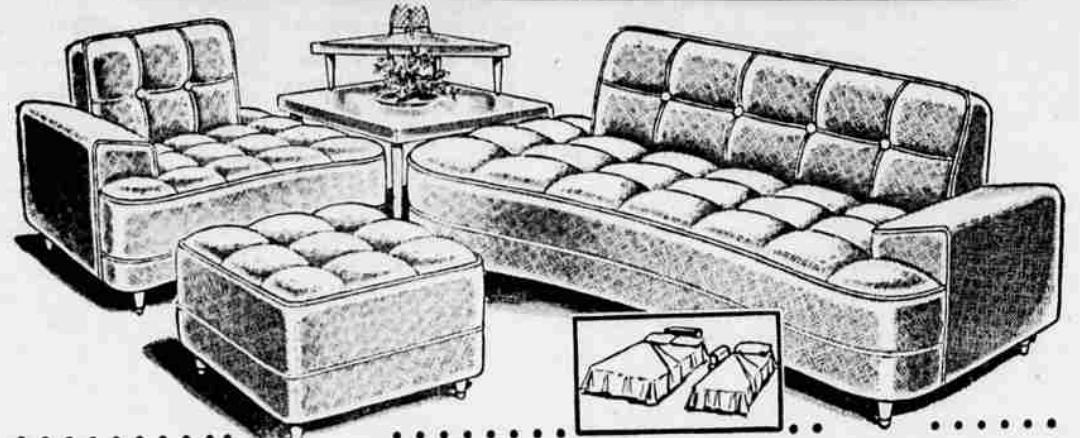
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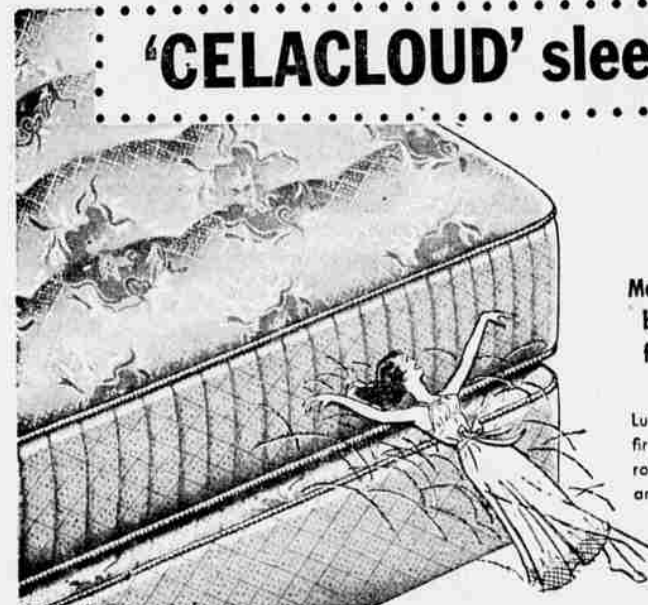
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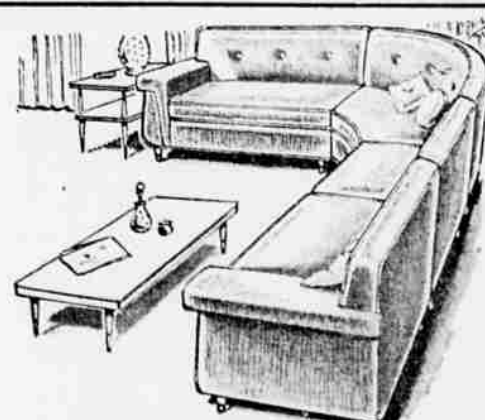
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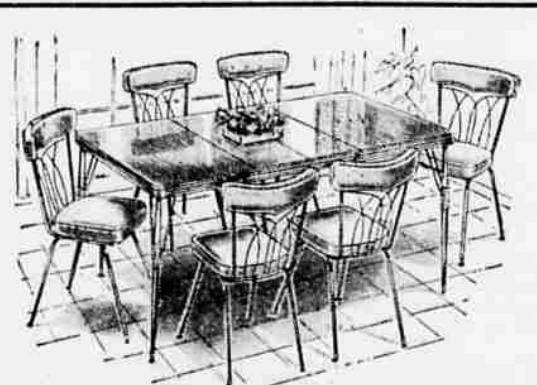
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
