OTTAWA (AP) — The general spilled his champagne on his heavily decorated uniform when he saw it: a human head peering wide-eyed from drawn draperies high on the walls of the ballroom during Queen Elizabeth's state reception last night.

Thirsty and chilly on their lofty platform, they kept noticing that the well-stocked bar wasn't well patronized. Most guests wanted to keep their hands free just in case the Queen or Prince Philip decided to stop to talk.

Only one woman reporter, also chosen by lot, got to see the state dinner which precedes the reception. Dressed in plaid slacks, she climbed a 20-foot ladder to a well hidden, curtained alcove to observe the 114 resplendent guests below.

Surgeon Lists Overweight As Cause For Backaches

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — The pot-bellied man and the pregnant woman are in the same boat: they are prone to painful backache or subject to aggravation of an existing one, a Canadian surgeon says.

The reason: in such people "there is increased strain in the center of gravity — a lot of increased strain on the spine." Dr. Frank Patterson of Vancouver General Hospital told newsmen at the 43rd annual Clinical Congress of the American College of Surgeons.

He also said that this type of backache — involving a strain on the ligaments and muscles of the back — is frequently due to emotional conditions, with the tenseness of the person resulting in a tightening up of the tissues in the back.

Approximately 10 to 15 per cent of all backaches are of neurotic origin, he said.

But he declared that, conversely, "a lot of people get neurotic because they have a pain in the back . . . and relief of the discomfort may change their personality reaction to it."

Patterson indicated that in instances where the backache is not due to some underlying physical disease or condition or emotional stress, certain "exercises with a purpose" are helpful — including lying on one's back and raising the legs, or, from the same position, placing the hands behind the head and raising the head and shoulders.

These exercises are designed to strengthen the abdominal muscles and thereby offset the back strain, he said.

Other exercise, such as walking or golf, is good treatment if in moderation, but strenuous exercise of any kind is taboo, because it will nearly always aggravate the backache, he said.

He declared backaches are common in the elderly — not because of the aging process in itself but because "increasing weight, poor posture and inactivity go along with age."

U. S. Treatment Of Scientists Hit

EL PASO, Tex. (AP) — Sen. Yarborough (D-Tex.) says so many scientists have been ridiculed and hounded out of government service the United States is hampered in the race for mastery of outer space.

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VP To Speak At Conference

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Vice President Richard Nixon is the featured speaker today at the International Industrial Development Conference searching for ways to expand the free world economy.

An exploding world population, rising demands for higher living standards and the continuing struggle between free enterprise and state socialism were among the formidable problems laid out for study at the conference yesterday.

It brought together more than 500 bankers, industrialists and business leaders from 61 countries.

Chairman Henry R. Luce, editor in chief of Time, Inc., opened the conference yesterday by reading a message from Dr. Ludwig Erhard, minister of economics for the West German government, who said: "I trust that this conference will be a universal demonstration that the free enterprise is aware of what he is called upon to do and is conscious of his responsibility. May this conference be a success for the whole world to see."

Director E. Finley Carter of Stanford Research Institute, which with Time-Life International is sponsoring the meeting, said that "only when trust prevails can capital investments earn real dividends—real in a material sense and real in contributing to an abundant life for all peoples."

The feeling of urgency to see progress in underdeveloped countries and the great importance of private investment in industrial development were stressed by Eugene R. Black, president of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development.

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Japan Reports Sighting Sputnik

TOKYO (AP) — Two Japanese observation posts today reported sighting the Soviet earth satellite, its rocket and the detached rocket nose cap.

The Tokyo Astronomical Observatory announced that the three objects were about four minutes apart in the same orbit — the rocket first, then the cap and the baby moon last.

They were estimated to be 230 miles above the earth.

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
