

Pacific Coast Football Briefs

BERKELEY, Calif. (UP)—California's football squad will go into the game against USC Saturday with a reconditioned defense and several new offensive plays.

Coach Pete Elliott made some secret changes yesterday in the Bears' defense and added a couple of plays in a bid to chalk up his first win. Elliott indicated sophomore Frank Doretti would take over first string center for Bob Chiappone who is out for the season with an injury suffered in the Navy game.

MOSCOW, Idaho (UP)—Three key backs in Idaho Coach Skip Stahley's plans for knocking off College of Pacific Saturday were reported on the mend today.

Larry Norby, Paul Weagar and Bob Dehlinger were said to be gradually recovering from injuries, along with center Ralph Jennino.

PULLMAN, Wash. (UP)—Coach Jim Sutherland, whose Washington State Cougars overcame an 18-0 Stanford lead last Saturday to defeat the Indians 21-18, says he is still more concerned about his team's offense than the defense.

Sutherland put the Cougars through a stiff offensive drill yesterday in preparation for Oregon Saturday. Washington State, noted as a passing team, moved the ball farther on the ground than in the air in its first three games.

STANFORD, Calif. (UP)—Stanford worked on smothering out the kinks in both offense and defense yesterday before taking off for Seattle and Saturday's game with Washington.

Coach Chuck Taylor said full-back Lou Valli's knee was on the mend, but he was listed as a doubtful starter. Back Jeri McMillin was still laid up with the flu.

STOCKTON, Calif. (UP)—College of Pacific's freshman footballers, using the Idaho defense, stopped the varsity in its tracks yesterday.

Coach Jack Myers said he was proud of his freshmen, but "the varsity will have to show more fight and spirit if they are going to beat Idaho next Saturday night."

SAN JOSE, Calif. (UP)—Tackle Al Severino and center Bob Marciel joined the list of 15 San Jose State College football players laid up with the flu yesterday.

Head coach of Titchener and line coach Marty Feldman were slightly under the weather too, but they showed up at the practice field to direct a light workout in sweat-soaked of the healthy Spartan gridders.

PORTLAND, Ore. (UP)—Coach Tommy Prothro said yesterday Oregon State would have to play better against UCLA in Los Angeles Saturday than it did against Idaho or Northwestern or the Beavers will lose their first game of the year.

Prothro said scouting reports indicated the Bruins will be the strongest team Oregon State has faced this season.

EUGENE, Ore. (UP)—The University of Oregon football team was pronounced physically fit for its battle with Washington State Saturday after a two-week bout with the flu.

Coach Len Casanova put the squad through a light workout yesterday and indicated there would probably be some changes in the lineup for the WSC game. Washington State and Oregon are the only two Pacific Coast Conference Rose Bowl candidates that remain unbeaten.

SEATTLE (UP)—Washington Coach Jim Owens said yesterday for the first time this season that he was pleased with the way his quarterbacks were throwing the ball in practice.

Owens ran the Huskies through both offensive and defensive passing drills. Quarterback Al Ferguson and tackle Don McCumby

were named co-captains for the game with Stanford here Saturday.

LOS ANGELES (UP)—UCLA Coach Henry (Red) Sanders, the master, apparently was plotting a way today to teach his former assistant, Oregon State's coach Tommy Prothro, a lesson in football.

The wily Bruin coach, whose team meets the Beavers in the Memorial Coliseum Saturday, closed football practices yesterday to everyone—even sports writers.

Sanders only reported that he was holding a heavy workout that stressed both offense and defense.

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Reports from the Trojan camp today were that the Southern California team was in exceptional spirits, despite a season record of three straight losses.

SC was at full strength and looking forward to the game with California Saturday at Berkeley. Coach Don Clark put the team through a long scrimmage yesterday.

It was "moving" day in the major leagues today, with several former big leaguers returning for another chance and others beginning the long road back to the minors.

Stan Palys, who led the Southern Association with a .359 batting mark last season, was purchased by the Cincinnati Redlegs, who gave up shortstop Bobby Durnbaugh and pitcher John Oldham and Jim Brechin to Seattle of the Pacific Coast League in exchange for the out-fielder-first baseman.

Palys first broke into the majors with the Philadelphia Phillies in 1954.

Jim Greengrass, who formerly played for the Redlegs and Phillies, was purchased from Sacramento of the Pacific Coast League by the Detroit Tigers.

Walt Cardcock and Pay Herbert, both with Buffalo of the International League, were purchased by the parent Kansas City Athletics, who gave up on both in previous years.

In other moves, the A's sent catcher Bill Shantz, left-hander Gene Host and the right-handed Al Aber, 30, also of former Tiger, to Buffalo and second baseman Curt Roberts to Denver of the American Association as part of last summer's big deal with the New York Yankees.

Nippy Jones, 32, whose celebrated "shoe shine" led to Milwaukee's fourth game, 7-5 victory over the Yankees in this year's World Series, was sent to Wichita of the American Association by the Braves, who called up infielder Joe Morgan from Atlanta of the Southern Association.

Corky Valentine, 27, and Red Murf, 35, both of whom saw little action with the Braves, were sent to Wichita in exchange for Ray Rippelmeyer, a right-handed pitcher, and Vic Rehm, a left-hander.

Bob Kennedy, 37, was given his outright release by the Los Angeles-bound Dodgers.

Solon Boss Says He Will Vote Against Seal Sale To Giants

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The San Francisco Giants' front office moved from New York into its new office Wednesday and was faced with arm club and ball park problems.

President Horace Stoneham, who called reporters to an afternoon conference, was expected to announce that he had retained Bill Rigney as field manager of the National League club.

A few of the other developments: 1. Fred David, president of Sacramento's Pacific Coast League Solons, said he would vote against approving the sale by the Boston Red Sox of the San Francisco Seals to the Giants. He said he doubts other PCL directors would go along with the sale. "Nothing has been offered . . . in the matter of compensatory damages," David said.

The Giants swapped their Minneapolis American Assn. franchise plus cash for the Seals franchise. Stoneham said he hopes to place the minor league club in a new PCL city if one can be found. Still to be settled is what the Giants will have to pay the PCL for invading its San Francisco territory.

2. Contractor Charles Harney started proceedings to lease submerged land needed for automobile parking area at the site where the new Giant stadium is to be built. Edmund G. Brown, California attorney general, had ruled it would be illegal for the state to sell or exchange its tidelands unless it got more than the price of submerged land.

3. Stoneham hired Jerry Donovan, veteran baseball man and president of the Seals. His duties will be determined later.

The Giant president also said he hopes to enlarge the present Seals Stadium—capacity 18,075—to at least 23,000 by adding left field bleachers. The Giants may play the entire 1958 season there although they hope the new stadium will be ready before it ends.

A "BELL CAPTAIN" (UP)—William (Whitey) Bell, a member of the 1932 "fabulous" freshman team at North Carolina State in 1952, has been elected captain of the Wolfpack basketball team for 1957-58. Bell is a senior guard from Warsaw, Ind.

Terry Brennan Selected UP Coach Of The Week

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (UP)—He's a true-green Irishman married to a Kelley, yet he refuses to inaugurate his first spring practice on the traditional St. Patrick's Day because it was too cold.

He's a player who doesn't practice but makes sure his players do. He was a football player at nine, a college starter at 17, a schoolboy coach at 20 and got the most glamorous college coaching job at 25.

He's Terence Patrick (Terry) Brennan, the United Press Coach of the Week after the dramatic 21-21 victory of his flu-bitten Notre Dame team over old rival Army.

"I thought we'd really be in trouble after all those boys got the flu," Brennan said today. "Why, the student body had so many sick that we had beds in the hallways of the infirmary and had to have a temperature of 102 to get in. But the boys just wouldn't quit, that's all."

The last time Army and Notre Dame met—in 1947—19-year-old halfback Terry Brennan zipped 97 yards for a touchdown with the opening kickoff to touch off an Irish victory.

This time, Brennan faced a lot more pressure. Ever since he succeeded Frank Leahy four years ago, critics and opposing teams alike have waited to pounce on him. They had a field day when the 1956 Irish, green in experience as well as uniform, won only two games.

The Notre Dame administration supported Terry to the limit and the victory over Army made the Monday morning quarterbacks as silent as Calvin Coolidge.

Hard work and ambition are Brennan trademarks. Terry, son of a former Notre Dame star and brother of three former college players, won seven letters in football and track at Marquette High in Milwaukee. Then came four years as Notre Dame's "bread-and-butter" runner.

After graduation, Terry became coach of Mt. Carmel high in Chicago and won an unprecedented three straight league titles. He also found time to teach two subjects and spent his nights earning a law degree at DePaul university. In 1953, he became an assistant coach at Notre Dame and got the big job the following year.

Despite his youth, Terry controls his players with a firm hand. Once, his Mt. Carmel players sneaked out of training camp

and were caught. Terry's response was to have them all suspended for a week.
