

School Funds Get Approval

Federal funds in the amount of \$152,000 for construction of the projected Crest School have been appropriated by the federal government, Carol Howe, county superintendent of schools, has been informed by Senators Richard Neuberger and Wayne Morse, and U.S. Representative Al Ullman.

The legislators advised that the Crest project has been placed sufficiently high on the priority list so that funds can be reserved at this time, and that notice of the reservation will be mailed directly to the school district in the near future.

It is further pointed out that the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare will certify the funds for the federal share of the school construction cost when the school district has complied with the construction requirements specified in law and final approval of the project is given.

Howe said Monday that on the strength of the recent federal action the school district has written U.S. Field Officer Paul Jackson in Portland to determine what is the next recommended action for the school district to take.

The school district had originally applied for the federal impact funds on grounds that the projected Crest School, to be located at the intersection of Crest and Laverne streets, would absorb much of the enrollment which will accompany full staffing of the Kingsley Air Force Base.

The district's original application for the federal impact construction funds amounted to approximately \$299,000. Howe said full details are being assembled and it is hoped that the latest federal action will not necessitate submission of a new application.

New By-Pass Hearing Set

Objections to locating the westside bypass in the vicinity of California Avenue will be heard at a special meeting scheduled for the city council chambers at 10 a.m. Thursday, October 17.

The hearing date was scheduled by the Oregon State Highway Department after approximately 30 residents of the area presented the city council with a petition requesting the hearing.

The petition was the outgrowth of an announcement in the Herald and News, published by the highway department, asking that those wishing to voice objections to the relocation of U.S. 97 on the westside bypass contact the city council.

It was expected that several state highway engineers would be present for the Thursday morning hearing which will be handled by H. B. Glaisyer, secretary of the State Highway Commission.

Fred B. Robinson, 1160 Crescent, owner of rental property in the California Avenue area, indicated that some objection to the westside bypass had arisen because of what he termed "serious depreciation of home values" in the area of the bypass, as well as resultant confusion at Conger School from the noise of the trucks on the route, and the effect of the cloverleaf arrangement at the Link River bridge on Veterans Memorial Park.

Robinson urged those who are interested to attend the hearing and voice their objections in person.

Farm Union Plan Aired

FORT ROCK — Discussion at the October 12 meeting of the Fort Rock Grange centered around the Farmer's Union move toward a plan for withholding farm produce from the market until satisfactory prices are obtained. Examples were cited of the success of cooperative, collective bargaining. Discussion favored the move, but no action was taken at this time in support of the Farmer's Union.

Also discussed was the need for a means of overcoming the discrepancy between constantly increasing costs of farm machinery and poor construction. Reports included the announcement of a scales association meeting held Tuesday night to make plans for installation of community scales. Floyd Branch stated that the county road crew will be in the area soon to do some graveling. Grangers voted to contribute to the United Fund.

PLAN VETOED

MOUNT SHASTA — Lease of a deer hunting range in the Mt. Eddy section as a club venture was decided against recently by the Mount Shasta Rod and Gun Club, but another group is working on details of the possibility of leasing the property. This latter group has tentative plans to sell shares in the venture to guarantee a good hunting range for its members. The plan, if completed, would not go into full effect until the 1958 hunting season.

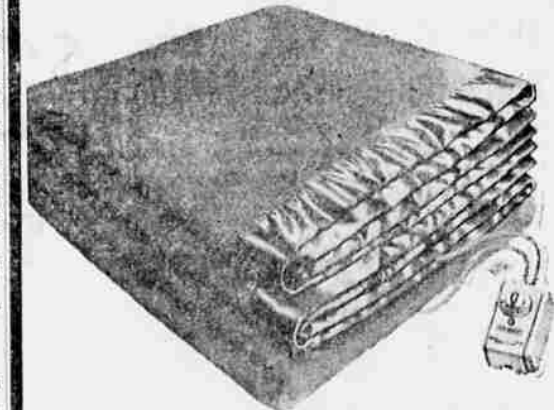

New Contributions Listed At UF Directors Meeting

The Klamath County United Fund-Red Cross campaign pressed the \$120,000 mark at the report meeting Tuesday noon at the Pelican Cafe. This week's report brought the figure to \$119,315.34, which is 81.4 per cent of goal.

Major reports were made by Ralph Hunter, chairman of the foods industry division and Dor-

man Turner, chairman of the county division.

Hunter reported \$1,407.50 to bring his division total to \$9,258.86, 78 per cent of goal. Turner reported \$1,031 from various county communities. The county division now stands at 75 per cent of goal.

The automotive division, headed by Jim Winde, has most nearly reached its goal, with a total of \$8,467.69, 95 per cent. The fuel oil

unit, H. B. Dexter, chairman, has reached its goal 100 per cent. Winde said.

The other divisions and their per cent of goal reached are: liquor, 79; industrial, 80; commercial, 80; public service, 77; governmental, 53; professional, 69; educational, 83; residential, 88.

Vince Bousquet, general chairman of the campaign, urged a close follow through by all campaign workers to bring a material increase by next Tuesday's report.

It was pointed out that over \$27,000 remains to be pledged through Fair Share giving to keep the 27 agencies covered by the fund in operation in 1958. The UF budget

committee already had reduced 000 — from \$161,728 to the goal of agency budgets by more than \$15,146,559.
