New Highway Okay Seen

LAKEVIEW—Favorable recommendation of the Adel-Winnemucca proposed route to connect with the transcontinental Highway 40, is expected from the Oregon State Highway Commission, according to Lake County Judge C. H. Langslet.

The route is already paved from Winnemucca to 15 miles west of Denio, and from Lakeview to Adel. Paving of three miles south from Adel will be completed in the spring, Langslet said, and only 30 miles remain to be paved in what he considers to be the "most important link to the entire state in the highway system of Oregon."

The support of other Oregon counties is being secured for presentation to the commission and resulting recommendation to the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads.

U.S. Areas Report Sighting Of Russian Satellite Rocket

CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—Several evening sightings of the Russian satellite rocket were reported last night for the first time in the greater Boston area.

Dr. John Patterson, director of the Hayden Planetarium at the Museum of Science, said he saw the rocket from the yard of his home in Newton Centre at 6:29 p. m. EST.

He said he was on the lookout for it because his own calculations showed it should be visible.

It was visible for about four minutes, he reported.

The Rev. Daniel F. Leahy reported he saw the rocket while he was in suburban Arlington. He said he first spotted it at 6:30 p.m.

Other reports of evening sightings were forwarded from the Springfield area in western Massachusetts to the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory in Cambridge.

Scientists at the observatory said they could not be positive the sightings actually were of the rocket. Their timetable estimate was that the rocket would not be visible in this area during the evening for several weeks.

Both the Russian satellite and the rocket which launched it into outer space are circling the globe. The rocket has been clearly visible during the dawn because of its bright color. There have been few sightings of the satellite itself, however.

Scientists said the rocket is now 14 minutes—or about 4,200 miles—behind of the satellite.

Dr. Fred L. Whipple, director of the Smithsonian Observatory, said the rocket is pulling 300 miles farther ahead of the satellite each day. He said the rocket is traveling in a smaller orbit than the satellite and may fall to the earth sooner.

A week ago the rocket's maximum distance from the earth was estimated at 583 miles. Now, Whipple said, it is about 350 miles.

Whipple also said the observatory has received unofficial reports from amateur observers of a double object being seen when the Russian rocket passes, but that the evidence is not yet strong enough that the rocket has split into two sections.

Dr. Armand N. Spitz, the observatory's coordinator of visual observations, said sightings indicate the rocket is still intact, but he advised moonwatch stations that "more than two objects may be visible."
