

OTI Owls' OCC Lead To Get Stiff Test From Red Raiders

The Oregon Technical Institute Owls are on the top rung of the Oregon Collegiate Conference standings, but they will get their stiffest test in conference play when they take on the Red Raiders of Southern Oregon College at Ashland Saturday night.

The Owls have won both of their conference outings, downing Portland State, 14-0 and last week topping Eastern Oregon College, 19-6.

OTI coach Rex Hunsaker reports that the team came out of the OCC game without any injuries, but that six of the boys are still suffering from flu ailments.

He said that Roy Ropp, Dick Hill, Ralph Norgaard, Miles Boardman, Jack Bitter and Armand Mayzell were ailing as of Tuesday's practice, but added that he felt all of them would be ready to go by Saturday.

Hunsaker said he was very pleased with the team's showing against OCC, and that he was especially proud of the fine teamwork displayed in Alfonso Everson's 45-yard opening kickoff return, which incidentally is unofficially a new OCC kickoff record, breaking the old record of 80 yards set by McIntosh of OTI in 1951 against EOC.

Everson's return was the second kickoff return going for a score and the Owls have returned two punts and two kickoffs for scores in their last three games.

Against Boise they returned a punt 94 yards and kicked 83 yards, adding a 70-yard punt return against Portland State and then Everson's return against EOC.

Rex said the desire and spirit is real good among the team members, and that if the Owls can get past SOC they will have passed over the hump. "This is the one we have to get over if we are going to go on in the conference," he said.

As far as depth is concerned, Rex has been moaning the blues all season and with good reason too. He is able to make sporadic replacements, but the Owls' depth is such that wholesale substitutions cannot be made.

This was very evident last Saturday when he sent in a complete new line and the Mountaineers be-

gan to grind out the yardage. When he starting line was returned the EOC scoring drive fizzled.

However, Hunsaker feels that the boys he is using for replacements are coming through very well, but that experience is the big headache, other than just pure numbers.

Several readjustments are being made in the OTI line this week, with Allen Jones being moved back to his regular guard position. Hunsaker moved Jones to end against EOC, and the last year's all conference guard filled the spot adequately.

Jones was moved back when end Dale McCullough returned to active duty this week, after missing game last week because of the flu.

Fullback Gary Riley was used sparingly in the EOC game, in order to give his ankle a good rest and he will be ready to go

full steam at Ashland.

Another big boost is the return of fullback Belton Ollison. Ollison also missed playing last week because of the flu, but he is reported to have fully recovered and will take over his regular fullback slot.

Ralph Norgaard will be moved back to his regular end position after turning in a fine job at fullback against EOC, replacing Ollison.

Portland State is the only team that both OTI and SOC have played, OTI winning 14-0 and SOC scraping by the Vikings, 7-6. However, Hunsaker said that the scores are not an adequate comparison since the Raiders running offense was definitely hampered by the extremely muddy field at Portland.

"We feel this is a toss-up game," Hunsaker said, "but with all of our horses back in action, we could just come out on top."

Greenberg Removed From Cleveland Post

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UP) — A "keenly disappointed" Hank Greenberg volunteered today to serve as unofficial adviser to the Cleveland Indians in the selection of his own successor as general manager of the Tribe.

Board Chairman William R. Daley said Greenberg would advise the executive committee of the club's board of directors in finding a new general manager "as quickly as possible." The board voted Wednesday to "notify" Greenberg that his services no longer were required.

Daley had no sooner announced the decision that the departed front-office boss volunteered to advise the committee selecting his replacement, and also denied rumors of a contemplated shift for the Cleveland franchise.

Greenberg, who held the position since 1950 and watched home gate receipts dwindle from 1,727,464 to 724,000 during his tenure, admitted he was "keenly disappointed."

"But I plan to keep my stock and remain interested in the team's welfare," Greenberg added.

Greenberg, as second-largest shareholder with an estimated 15-20 per cent of stock, will stay on as one of the Tribe's 13 directors. His tenure as general manager ceases Jan. 1, though his salary, estimated at \$60,000 a year, continues through the 1958 campaign.

Insiders were wondering who might succeed Greenberg. Daley himself said the board had "not to my knowledge" received any bids for the post.

These names are mentioned most prominently: Bill Dewitt, Bill Veck, Al Lopez, Paul Richards, and even Bob Feller, Bucky Harris, and Muddy Ruel.

Possibly the front-runner is Dewitt, who said he has not heard from the Indians, but that he would "be interested" if the job were offered.

Veck, former general manager of the Tribe, isn't interested in working as a "hired hand," but prefers instead to purchase the club. It is not for sale.

Lopez, manager of the Chicago White Sox who walked out as Indians' field manager after the 1956 season, is an unlikely prospect. He has a renewal on his Chicago contract for next year.

Richards now is manager and general manager of the Baltimore Orioles. It is known that Greenberg tried several times after Lopez's departure to hire Richards. Richards never has completely rejected the idea of coming to Cleveland as general manager.

Coast League Directors Set Meeting Date

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — The Pacific Coast League board of directors will meet at the El Rancho motel in Sacramento on Nov. 1 to discuss plans for the future—if any.

President Leslie O'Connor said today the session would start at 10 a.m. and the main order of business would be to discuss the "notice of intentions" to draft the San Francisco and Los Angeles territories by the Giants and the Dodgers.

These two clubs already have taken over the territories, with the Giants pushing out the Seals in San Francisco and the Dodgers the Angels and Hollywood Stars in Los Angeles.

They also will vote on the sale of the Seals to the Giants, who gave cash and their Minneapolis franchise in the American Association to the Boston Red Sox for the local rights. The deal has to be approved by the PCL.

The directors also probably will take into consideration the realignment of the league. Some are talking about adding Phoenix, Ariz., from the Arizona-Mexico league; Salt Lake City, Utah, from the Pioneer League; and Spokane, Wash., which is not an organized baseball right now.

President To See Football Games

WASHINGTON (UP) — President Eisenhower will spend two of the next three Saturday afternoons like millions of sports fans across the country—at college football games.

The White House announced Wednesday that Eisenhower will see the annual Army-Navy 150-pound game at Annapolis, Md., Oct. 26 and the Army-Colgate game at West Point, Nov. 2.

B. Rigney To Steer SF Giants

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Bill Rigney, retained as manager of the San Francisco Giants for two years, says Californians may see an almost entirely different club than the one that played at the Polo Grounds in New York.

The only two players sure to be in the lineup — "untouchables," Rigney calls them — are outfielder Willie Mays and southpaw Johnny Antonelli.

President Horace Stoneham signed Rigney, practically a local product, to a new contract yesterday. He said both he and the manager were satisfied with the terms, but he didn't say what they are.

Rigney, 39, lives across San Francisco Bay in Walnut Creek and played ball for the now-defunct Oakland Oaks of the Pacific Coast League before joining the Giants. He played for Stoneham nine years as an infielder and managed the team to sixth-place finishes the past two seasons.

Next year will be different, he says. "The new surroundings will affect the club. This city has enthusiasm and it wears off on to the players. New York wasn't supplying the enthusiasm."

The bespectacled manager talked with reporters at Seals Stadium, where the Giants will play next year. A new municipal stadium is to be completed for 1959.

Rigney said Mays should hit better because of the shorter center field — 410 feet as compared with 483 at the Polo Grounds. He said the cooler weather here "should make the players stronger."

The Giants announced the purchase from world champion Milwaukee of reliever Dave Jolly, who posted a 1-1 record last year.

Rigney said several promising rookies would get a chance to make the big time.

Two athletes who scored all the points for their teams last Saturday are staging a race to see if they can bring the South its first national major college football scoring title since Jackie Parker won for Mississippi State in 1952.

Halfback Wray Carlton of Duke, who made a touchdown and a point in last week's 7-6 victory over Rice, still is ahead of Louisiana State fullback Jimmy Taylor, who scored 29 as LSU beat Georgia Tech 20-13.

Carlton in four games has accounted for seven touchdowns and five extra points for a total of 47. Taylor has 43 points on six touchdowns and nine conversions.

An equally unusual situation is shown in the pass receiving tabulation in a group of miscellaneous major college statistics released Thursday by the NCAA Service Bureau.

The top two pass receivers are from one state, Utah. The region has produced only one catching champion in a d e c a d e. Stu Vaughan, stubby Utah halfback, is first with 20 receptions and Gary Kapp of Utah State is tied with Washington State's Don Ellingsen with 19 receptions and leads all receivers in yardage with 292 total gain.

Flu Cancels Prep Games

Among A-2 schools at least two have been affected and more may be. Salem Academy called off its District 3 game with Sherwood. There was talk that Coquille might have to cancel its District 2 game with Bandon.

Some of the games called off for the weekend will be rescheduled. Roseburg and North Bend moved their game to Nov. 16.

Blue Mountain League officials were to decide at a special meeting what they could do. No open dates are available before start of the state playoffs open with quarterfinals the weekend of Nov. 15-16.

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Big Ten Stats Led By Iowa, Mich. State

CHICAGO (UP)—Michigan State and Iowa, among the Big Ten's unbeaten teams, dominate the conference on both offense and defense, league statistics showed today.

The Spartans, who have averaged 525.5 yards per game, were first on offense and second on defense. Iowa, second on offense, led in defense and allowed its only opponent, Indiana, minus 30 yards rushing.

Minnesota, which along with Michigan State has beaten two conference foes, was 7th on offense and 5th on defense, while Wisconsin, victor over Purdue in its only conference appearance, was 3rd on defense and 4th on offense.

Michigan State athletes also dominated individual statistics. Halfback Walt Kowalczyk led in rushing with 157 yards and a 6.8 average, but Wisconsin's Danny Lewis, who has played in only one game, was 2nd with 134 yards and a 16.7 average.

Jim Ninowski of Michigan State led in passing with 14 completions in 19 tries for 224 yards and also led in total offense with 224 yards. He has thrown for three touchdowns. Illinois' Tom Haller was second in both total offense and passing, with 19 completions in 13 tries for 183 yards. His total offense was 175 yards.

Dave Kaiser of Michigan State led the pass receivers with six catches for 102 yards, while Rhody Tuszka of Minnesota led in punting with a 40.4 average. Dick Larson of Minnesota was 1st in punt return with a 35.2 yard average and Tom Fletcher of Purdue was 1st in kickoff returns with a 20 yard average.

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
