### Lavish Party Rocks 'Garden' In Honor Of Movie's Birthday

NEW YORK (UP) — That was a real nice clambake Mike Todd threw Thursday night, and a nice time was had by all—until the television cameras winked off and the food and presents came on. At that time—the hour was 11:05 p.m. EDT—a human menagerie of several thousand more-or-less-formally dressed persons descended to the arena where wild animals of the circus perform in season. Todd had invited 18,000 "chums" to a Madison Square Garden party to celebrate the first anniversary of his film "Around The World In 80 Days." Those who couldn't jam onto the floor watched the others, and it was a scene to behold. Jeep loads of presents were on display on the floor, presents supposed to be held for a drawing of numbers later this week. Each person with a later ticket was to get a present from the drawing. At 11:05, however, the looting began at one end of the arena. Men in dinner jackets broke into jeep-loaded cardboard boxes and fought for the contents. Women squealed in the human squirm. Pocketbooks, toys, cameras, liquor, and various donated knick-knacks were carried away. Duke Ellington's orchestra, which had come on for dancing after the hour-and-a-half television (CBS) of the party entertainment, surveyed the scene and at 11:07 p.m. broke into a famed Ellington composition, "Take The 'A' Train."

### Wasp Stings Aid Ailment

FORT SCOTT, Kan. (AP)—Frank Becco, a Fort Scott businessman, went to a nearby lake to clean out his duck blind. He was driven away by angry wasps. Next day, Lyle W. Amer volunteered to clean out the blind. "I want to get pretty well strung," Amer said. "It helps my rheumatism." Becco took Amer to the blind. Amer got his stings and eradicated the wasps. A Fort Scott physician, questioned by a reporter, said the wasp sting contains a neurotoxic toxin which in small doses could alleviate pain through partial paralysis of given areas. "But," the doctor commented, "he certainly does it the hard way."

### Astor's Wife Gains Divorce

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Mrs. Gertrude Astor received a final decree yesterday divorcing her from John Jacob Astor III, whose 1954 Mexican divorce wasn't recognized. Circuit Judge Culver Smith granted the decree and recognized a separate agreement of both parties for support of an 8-year-old daughter, Mary Jacqueline. The couple married in 1944 and separated in 1953. Astor wed Dolores Fullman of Miami after obtaining the Mexican divorce. A New York State Supreme Court ruling of 1956 denied recognition to the Mexican divorce because neither party lived in Mexico at the time it was granted. Astor is reported to be paying Gertrude \$3,000 a month and Dolores, who filed a separate maintenance suit this year, \$1,000 a month.

MAEBASHI, Japan (AP)—An American officer today pictured a key prosecution witness against GI William S. Girard as a trouble-maker who tried to coach other witnesses in their stories. Lt. Col. Walter C. Sharp, testifying in the Ottawa, Ill., soldier's Japanese manslaughter trial, made the accusations against Hideo Onozeki. Onozeki has testified Girard lured Mrs. Naka Sakai, 46, closer on the firing range last Jan. 30, then shot and killed her. Girard admits firing the fatal shot—an empty cartridge from a

## War Jitters Hit Cairo

CAIRO (AP)—The Cairo press developed an acute case of war jitters today. The newspaper Al Shaab predicted a Turkish attack on Syria immediately after the Turkish elections. "Turkish troop concentrations along the Syrian border are increasing," Al Shaab declared. "Units of the United States 6th Fleet are cruising off the Syrian coast. Some American and British naval units are sailing to Lebanon and Syrian ports. Israeli troops are being trained in mountain fighting while Premier Ben-Gurion is asking for more arms and planes." Al Ahrum in an editorial drew a parallel between the situation now and one year ago, just before the tripartite attack on Egypt. "Forces massed in the frontier region are waiting the signal to attack Syria," Al Ahrum said. Al Gunhurriya referred to ominous signs of war and warned, "Certain land and sea movements may be a prelude to actual aggression." Al Akhbar spoke of "ominous signs of imminent conflagration" and urged the United Nations to act promptly to prevent war in the Middle East.

## Sun Pictures To Be Studied

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Scientists today awaited the chance for a new, closeup look at the sun in 8,000 pictures taken by a balloon-borne camera at 83,200 feet yesterday. Dr. Martin Schwarzschild, heading the stratoscope project, termed it an outstanding success after the huge camera was parachuted safely 20 miles southeast of Blue Earth, Minn. The 35mm. films, exposed at the rate of one per second, are being processed in a University of Minnesota laboratory. The balloon, with its nearly three-quarter-ton cargo of apparatus, was launched from Huron, S.D. Dr. Schwarzschild, Princeton University astronomer, said the project is providing valuable information for possible satellite launchings. The camera achieves clarity through being free of 95 per cent of the earth's atmospheric haze.
