

Youths Held For Robbery

DORRIS — Two boys, aged 15 and 17, were picked up in Macdoel by Deputy Sheriff F. A. Dobson for questioning about the Macdoel Hotel robbery committed sometime after closing time Monday night when \$20 was taken from the lunch counter register, \$80 from the bar and \$30 from a hidden cigar box. The theft was discovered Tuesday morning by Mrs. Russ Walton, wife of the owner, when she opened the bar.

The boys allegedly admitted the robbery to Dobson, stating that while playing shuffleboard they had loosened nails in a boarded-up window through which they entered the bar after it was closed. They said they left by the front door after unlocking the side door through which they made several trips into the building.

The youths produced a part of the money which they had hidden under a bush on the hotel property.

Lee Edward Haggard, 43, Red Bluff, was in a cafe with the two boys. He was taken to the county jail in Yreka and appeared before Judge Les Chase in Dorris Thursday morning on charges of being drunk in a public place. He was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail.

Haggard had a room in the Macdoel Hotel, and the boys apparently had been sleeping in a trailer.

Trucks Eyed For Safety

DUNSMUIR — A truck check described as the "most comprehensive ever held in the nation" by Senator Randolph Collier was conducted here Tuesday and Wednesday. Collier heads the State Senate Committee on Transportation Problems, sponsor of the check.

The check, which was so thorough that few truck drivers were found in total compliance, was conducted by representatives of private industry and public agencies on a volunteer basis. They tested brakes, mechanical equipment, compliance with regulations and proper registration.

Highway patrolmen stood by issuing citations for violations, with all violations per driver to be lumped as one citation. Typical citations included failure to have proper registration papers for truck, trailer or load, equipment in bad order or not functioning.

More than 200 men from all parts of the state arrived in Dunsmuir Monday afternoon, and a briefing for the truck inspection began Monday evening, with mass session Tuesday morning when hours and group assignments were made.

A truck tragedy which cost two lives in Dunsmuir last July prompted the check in this locality.

New Residents Listed in Report

Klamath Keynotes, the official publication of the chamber of commerce reported that 86 new families have moved into the area during the month of September. The breakdown totals 171 adults and 133 children.

Keynotes adds 13 of the families are from Oregon communities, and 21 families have purchased homes.

State by state breakdown is 19 families from California, nine from Washington, four from Idaho, three from Nevada, two from Nevada and Colorado and one each from Arizona, Canada, Germany, Hawaii, Iowa, Kansas and Maine.

Brazil Guards Against Riots

SAO PAULO, Brazil — Federal troops were on the alert today to move against any further violence in a four-day-old strike by 90 per cent of the industrial workers in Sao Paulo, South America's largest industrial center.

Fifty persons have been injured in clashes between some of the 400,000 industrial workers striking for higher pay and armed factory guards.

President Juscelino Kubitschek placed the 2nd Brazilian Army at the disposal of Sao Paulo Gov. Janio Quadros. Labor leaders said they would call for a nationwide general strike if troops were used.

The industrial workers walked out Tuesday to support a demand for 45 per cent wage increases. Their pay now ranges from the national minimum of 3,800 cruzeiros (\$46) to 15,000 cruzeiros (\$185) a month.

Labor leaders cited government statistics showing a 30 per cent increase in the cost of living since 1955.

Plane Makes Crash Landing

PITTSBURGH — A four-engine DC6B Northwest Airlines plane with 29 aboard ground to a screeching halt at Greater Pittsburgh Airport last night after its landing gear collapsed on touchdown. No one was hurt.

The propellers were bent and the bottom of the fuselage ripped. A gasoline tank was ruptured, but there was no fire.

Northwest said the pilot, Capt. William Arnold of Minneapolis, reported no panic. The plane was en route from Washington to Seattle.

The passengers praised Arnold, who kept the plane under control while it slid 4,000 feet on its belly.

SAW ACCIDENT

DORRIS — Arthur Westhouse of Dorris lost two fingers of his left hand in an accident Monday night about 11:30 while operating a saw at the Dorris Lumber and Moulding Company where he was a relief operator. Westhouse was taken to the Dorris Hospital where the injuries were taken care of by Dr. C. R. Drader.

Ike Calls For Cooperation In Science To Win Struggle

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower has called for greater cooperation among Western scientists in the struggle "of freedom against dictatorship."

In offering a toast to Queen Elizabeth last night at the White House, Eisenhower said: "Our scientists must work together. NATO (North Atlantic Treaty Organization) should not be thought of merely as a military alliance. NATO is a way of grouping ability — of our manhood, our resources, of our industries and our factories."

Eisenhower's remarks were made only hours after the announcement that he and British Prime Minister Macmillan will confer here next week. The talks, which will run from Wednesday through Friday, are expected to center about the Middle East situation.

Authorities here also speculate that Macmillan may want to emphasize the British desire for closer cooperation in weapons developments in view of Russia's launching of an earth satellite and claimed Soviet developments in the missile field.

Neither Eisenhower, nor Queen Elizabeth in her reply to his toast, made any mention of Russian technological advances.

But the Queen, taking note of scientific developments, said: "There are many indications today that we are at the beginning of a new age of discovery and exploration in the world of human knowledge and technology . . ."

"Our forefathers found, as we are finding today, that new discoveries bring with them new problems as well as new opportunities."

In calling for cooperation among free nations, Eisenhower said: "The free world is engaged in a great struggle, and the total of the free world's assets are so much greater than those of our potential enemy, should we say, that it is ridiculous to compare their brains, their abilities in science, in philosophical thought, or in any phase of culture or of the arts with the combined total of the free world."

"But I say combined total advisedly. We are too much separated by things that concern us locally. This is a struggle of ideologies, of a religious way of life against atheism, of freedom against dictatorship."

"But we have the power. The only thing to do is to put it together."

Valuable Art Work Found

LONDON — Two art experts announced today a portrait bought for \$25 half a century ago is a Rembrandt which may be worth \$150,000 or more.

The picture was found by art restorer Reg Winder while examining canvases owned by the late Maj. Hubert C. Corlette.

Winder and his partner, Stewart Goodall, said the painting is unquestionably a portrait by Rembrandt of his wife, Saskia, whom he painted many times. They said X-ray and ultraviolet tests showed a Rembrandt signature under an overlay of paint in one corner, and proved that the canvas itself is at least 300 years old.

John Corlette, the major's son, said the picture had long been a family joke because his father always insisted it was an undiscovered Rembrandt. The major's wife picked it up at a London auction in 1903.
