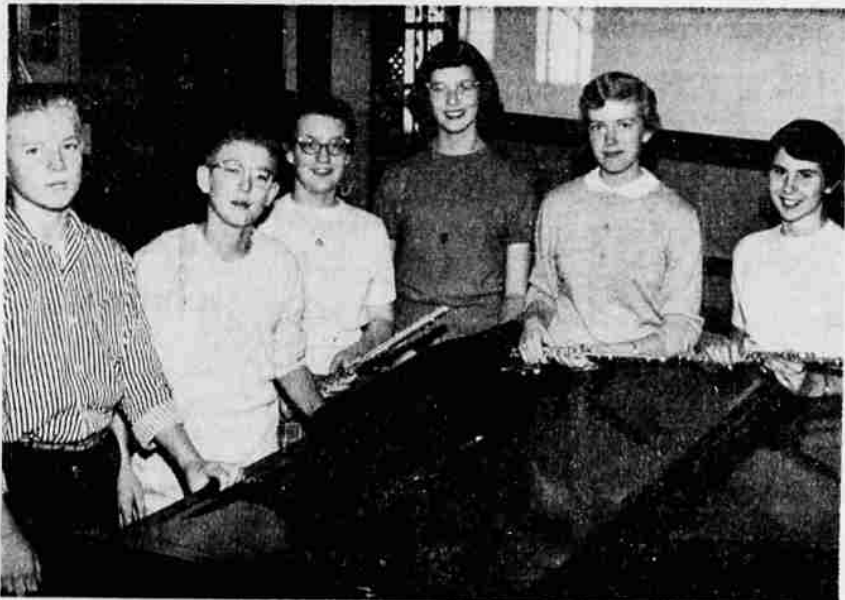

Panel Tells School Needs

DUNSMUIR — The city's elementary school needs were explained by a panel of school officials at a meeting at the Dunsmuir school auditorium on Tuesday evening to a crowd of about 100 interested citizens.

The meeting was called by the school board to rally support for the \$135,000 elementary school bond election slated for Tuesday, November 5. Passage of the bond issue will enable the school board to borrow up to \$389,000 from state funds for school construction.

Those attending were told the board had revised their previous plans and now planned a kindergarten through sixth grade building with the present seventh, eighth grades and auditorium-gym to remain in use.

On hand to explain plans for new construction were members of the board, the Siskiyou County schools office, state officials including Richard Mears, finance; Paul Rivers, Department of Education and Harvey Ferris, George Mannee, chairman of a school survey committee, explained the committee's findings. He was assisted by Drs. Thurston Hatch and William McCann, educational advisers from Chico State College, who directed the survey. Howard Perrin, Klamath Falls architect, explained the school plans.

School officials were shown school sites Tuesday afternoon. The board is studying use of the Wehrheim property in north Dunsmuir.

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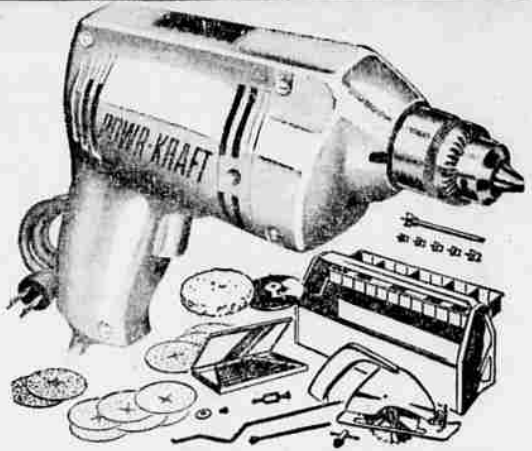

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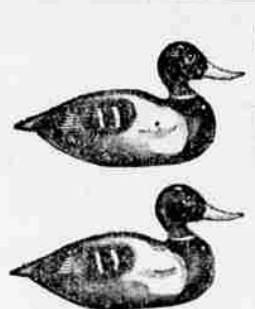
