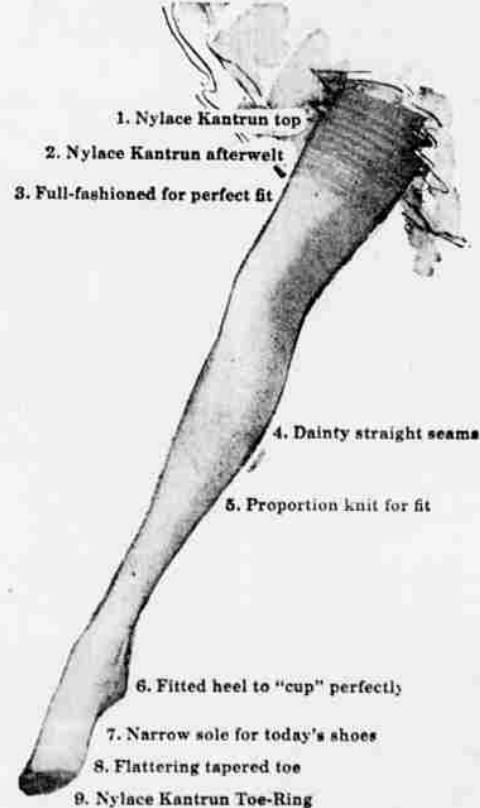
Several hundred persons can be served during the hours indicated. Seating will be facilitated by use of two ticket lines, early purchasers and those buying at the door.

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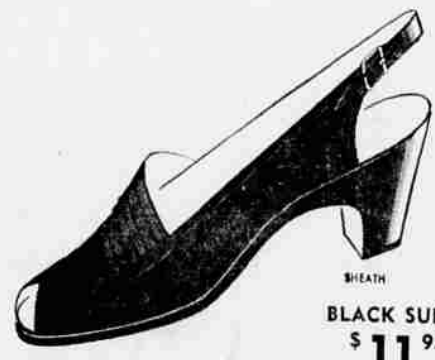
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
