The three desire suggestions, backed up with reasons for selecting various individuals, for

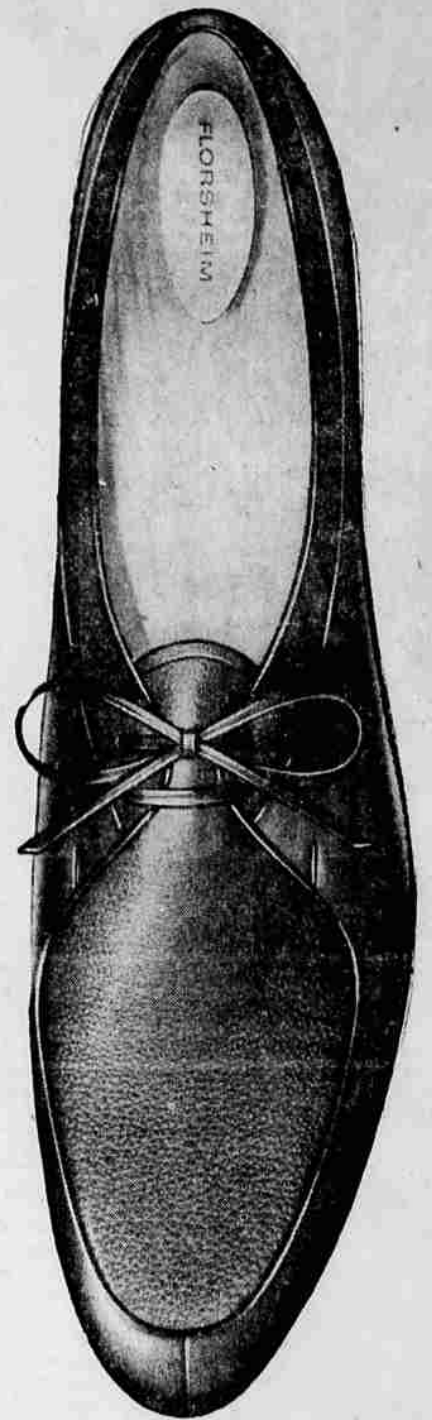
consideration for the honor. Final choice will be made Monday evening, November 4, when the club holds its next regular meeting.
