

Carolyn Jeanne Poteet Weds William R. Jones In First Christian Rites

Pink and mauve arrangements of long stemmed gladioli and chrysanthemums in fall vases decorated First Christian Church for the wedding of Carolyn Jeanne Poteet to William R. Jones on September 29. Aisle pews were marked with white bows, and lighted tapers in two seven-branch floor candelabra illuminated the altar setting for the double-ring candlelight ceremony.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. V. R. Poteet, 734 Fulton, and her father gave her in marriage. The bridegroom, presently stationed at Kingsley Field Air Base, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Jones, Boone, North Carolina. They were unable to be here for the wedding.

The couple exchanged nuptial vows at 3 p.m., in the presence of some 100 guests. Officiating clergyman was Otis Bell, pastor of First Christian Church.

For her autumn wedding, Carolyn wore an all white gown of Chantilly lace and net over bridal satin. The long sleeved bodice of lace was designed with a scalloped lace Sabrina neckline embroidered with iridescent sequins and dainty seed pearls.

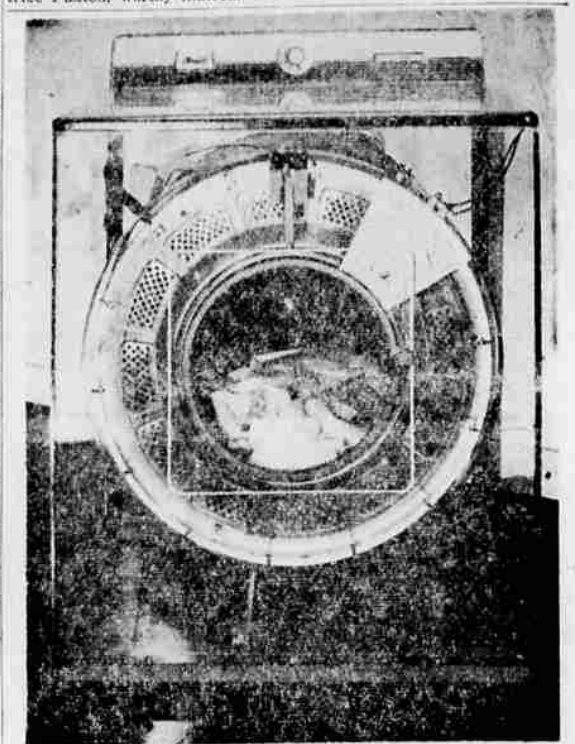
