

Hescock-Leitzke Vows In Zion Lutheran Church

FORT KLAMATH — On Sunday, September 29, at 2:30 p.m., the Zion Lutheran Church in Klamath Falls was the scene of an impressive candlelight wedding ceremony when Cora Ann Leitzke became the bride of Glenn Wilbur Hescock. The Rev. Hugo Warnke, pastor of the church, read the double-ring service in the presence of 150 guests.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln Leitzke, Keno Road, Klamath Falls, and the bridegroom's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur B. Hescock, Fort Klamath.

Arrangements of red and white gladioli and carnations decorated the church; lighted tapers were on the altar, and large bouquets at the foot of the cross and flowers in two large floor vases were combined with floor candelabra to form a semicircle around the cross.

Mrs. Grace Rutter sang "At Dawning" and "The Lord's Prayer" was sung by a trio composed of Nora Damman, Virginia Stokes and Marlys Albert. Marie Obenchain, organist, played the traditional wedding marches and accompanied the vocalists.

The bride, escorted to the altar by her father, wore a white satin gown, fashioned with a lace bodice and long pointed sleeves and a scalloped scoop neckline. The floor length skirt over hoops featured a lace bustle effect at the sides and back. The train was chapel length with inserts of lace. The tulle fingertip veil billowed from a Juliet cap of lace. The bridal bouquet was of white roses and trailing stephanotis centered with white orchids. For something old, she carried a handkerchief which her paternal grandmother had carried at her own wedding fifty years ago; something new was her bridal ensemble; something borrowed was the hoop underskirt, worn by her sister-in-law, Mrs. Harold Shearer, at her own wedding. The blue garter and penny in her shoe completed the traditional trousseau items.

Maid of honor was the bride's sister, Myrna Leitzke, Klamath Falls, who wore a frock of white moire taffeta with red cummer-

bund and bustle, made with cap sleeves and scoop neckline and full, waltz length skirt. She wore a single red flower in her hair and carried a tapered nosegay bouquet of red rosebuds.

Bridesmaids were Pamela Wilder, Portland, cousin of the bride, and Rosalie Pinelli, Klamath Falls, who is now attending school in San Francisco and was a high school classmate of the bride. The two bridesmaids wore gowns identical in style to that of the maid of honor, but with colors reversed — their gowns were red, with white cummerbunds and bustles, and they wore single white flowers in their hair and carried nosegay bouquets of white. The striking dresses of the bride's attendants were the original creations of Mrs. Grace Rutter, Klamath Falls, who designed and fashioned the three gowns.

For her daughter's wedding, Mrs. Leitzke wore a simply styled deep powder blue afternoon dress with accessories of dark blue and

corsage of red rosebuds and white orchids. The bridegroom's mother was attired in a dress of dark gray and white figured broadcloth taffeta, with black and white accessories. Her corsage was identical to that of Mrs. Leitzke.

Candlelighters were Lynn Lee Hescock, Fort Klamath, young brother of the bridegroom, and Stewart Leitzke, Klamath Falls, young brother of the bride. Little Keith Hescock, son of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Hescock, Chiloquin, and a nephew of the bridegroom, was ringbearer, and petite Janet Rutter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Rutter, Klamath Falls, was flower girl.

Ushers were Leonard Smith, formerly of Fort Klamath, now employed at Redding, a longtime friend of the bridegroom, and Wynn Hescock, Fort Klamath, the younger brother of the bridegroom. Serving his brother as best man was Floyd Hescock, Chiloquin.

Immediately following the church ceremony, a reception was held

in the church parlors, with Mrs. Herman Braetz, Klamath Falls, in charge of arrangements. Red and white carnations and gladioli were used as decorations, carrying out the prevailing wedding colors. Mrs. Merna Wilder, Portland, aunt of the bride, cut the beautifully decorated wedding cake, with Mrs. Margaret Wilder, Klamath Falls, also the bride's aunt, presiding at the punch bowl and Mrs. Fran Freil, Klamath Falls, pouring coffee. Guests were registered at the church by Janet Meyer and at the reception by Carol Mudder, both of Klamath Falls.

The new Mrs. Hescock is a graduate of Sacred Heart Academy, Klamath Falls, class of 1957, and was president of the student body in 1956 and also this year. She is a member of the Zion Lutheran Choir and is employed at the Commercial Finance Corporation office in Klamath Falls.

The bridegroom attended school in Fort Klamath and Chiloquin and was a graduate of Chiloquin High

School, class of 1953. He is employed at the Car-Ad-Co Lumber Company in Klamath Falls, and is a member of the Klamath Falls Loyal Order of Moose.

In addition to members of the wedding party who were from out-of-town, the following guests attended the wedding and reception from outside points: Harold Wilder, uncle of the bride, Portland; Mrs. Don Eklund, Seattle, sister of the bridegroom; Radioman 3-C and Mrs. Harold A. Quotarians from Alaska, British Columbia, Washington and Oregon were in town October 11-12-13 for the first District 14 of Quota Club International conference to be held in Klamath Falls.

Initial event of the weekend session was registration and an informal reception at the Winema Hotel, conference headquarters. Of the 103 hostess club members and delegates, almost 75 were visiting delegates. The reception in the Camas Room at 7:30 on Friday evening was a social get-acquainted prelude to the conference proper.

Formal opening of the 17th annual conference of 14th District of Quota International was Saturday morning at 9:15, with District Governor Lucille F. Larson presiding. The 1957 conference theme, "Sharing and Serving Our Neighbors"—was inspired by the Quota creed.

The conference date was also the 10th birthday anniversary of Klamath County Quota Club. Most significant to local members — and marking it as a red letter day, was the very special conference guest, Elsie Yarter, Cheyenne, Wyoming, international president of Quota Club.

Acting Mayor James M. Barnes, whose wife, Peggy, is a local Quotarian, welcomed the visiting members to Klamath Falls. Margaret Baile, Klamath County club president, gave the official Quotarian welcome, followed by an official message from Elsie Yarter, president of Quota Club International, Incorporated, and presentation of program and conference rules by Laverne Slusser, Klamath Falls, general chairman of the 1957 conference.

Local Quota Club President Margaret Baile presided at the 12:15 luncheon in the Camas Room — and Helen Majors was chairman. The afternoon meeting at 1:45 was a routine district conference session.

BANQUET

Ninon Nyback, banquet chairman, used a lavish and artistic hand in creating the beautiful and unusual room and table decor for the reception and formal dinner Saturday night at Reames Golf and Country Club. A plastic wading pool, transformed into a realistic lily pond, reflected large fern fronds and other green foliage in the exotic setting. Especially lovely was the effective combination of pink roses and lighted wax-candle water lilies floating on the pond surface.

Table bouquets were of pink Aristocrat and contrasting deep wine Happiness roses, trailing green sprays of foliage and lighted pink tapers.

The head table was centered with an epergne table-fountain that played a fascinating and ornamental jet of water over an arrange-

ment of roses. Grace notes were two ornamental fake peacocks flanking the epergne and lighted candles. Their outline-heads and arched necks were of pink velvet flaring tubing and their colorful crests were small clusters of bouvardia. Real peacock feathers formed their natural looking and elegant "folded fans."

A half-hour reception preceded the formal dinner served at 7 p.m. Elsie Yarter, top officer of Quota Club, was honored guest of the evening. Ardath Danielson, district lieutenant governor, presided. She paid tribute to the Klamath County Club's 10th anniversary, and recalled that it was she, in 1947, who presented the club charter to Alice Vitus, first Klamath County president.

Speakers for the conference banquet were James Martin Pitman, exchange instructor at OTI from Hawaii, and President Yarter. Instructor Pitman's interesting talk on "Sharing Educational Serv-
